The mechanisms in place for reporting a potential breach of a Tree Preservation Order (TPO), including how such information is recorded and analysed.

Breaches are reported to the Environment Team in many forms. On receipt of an initial report the claimed breach is investigated by an officer from the Environment Team as per the Unauthorised Tree Work process map. A record of the investigation is retained in the Unauthorised Tree Work Report & Record document. This standard document is a relatively new development for the Environment Team and is currently in the process of being modified and improved.
