Response: Any potential breach of a Tree Preservation Order (TPO) can be reported in a variety of ways:

a. By telephone to the Council's Customer Service Centre – calls would be put through to the Planning Service duty officer to deal with or would be recorded in the Customer Centre Service system and emailed to Planning to respond to if a customer requested a call back.

b. By email – email addresses of officers, enforcement officers and the service in general are available online. Any email submitted would be filed in our planning enforcement database and allocated to an officer to investigate.
