March 15, 2023: MSPs 3, non MSPs 49. Total: 52

Three MSPs: Rona Mackay, chairing, Rachael Hamilton, Clare Adamson.

Industrial action at Holyrood that day affected MSP attendance.

Non MSPs 49. Total present: 52

Rona Mackay MSP, chairing, welcomed more new members – including "More than Fibro" and Ehlers-Danlos Scotland.

Secrecy continued as a major concern. The meeting was called after the revelation that officials had excluded patient volunteers, replacing them with paid people recruited by a marketing & recruitment firm. Paid £200 each. This shocked many. For almost a year, our group and others hadn't been told of pain patient recruitment. Our voluntary secretary had to use FOI to discover that Clinical Priorities officials had commissioned a "patient panel" and report costing £40,000. (PQ statement)

FOI disclosed instructions from Scottish Government officials that anyone who was a "patient advocate" was not to be included. Also excluded was anyone with language difficulties needing an interpreter. There were objections to exclusions and to the report's "unusual" figures.

It claimed 3 out of 16 said pain had no impact on them and only 6 out of 16 had "high impact". By contrast, Healthcare Improvement Scotland found only one in 92 claimed no impact.

FOI showed the "Pain Taskforce" has around 20 officials but no patients are allowed at meetings on patient services. The one "patient rep" is not from patients but a doctor appointed by officials.

The meeting was deeply concerned that changes which might affect 800,000 sufferers in Scotland

could be recommended by officials with no patients present to challenge. Even the paid recruits were kept separate.

Linda Pollock, interim director. Healthcare Directorate, was a speaker but said she did not know that some advertisements for pain sufferers were on Facebook. Ian Semmons, chair of Action on Pain, stated: "In 26 years of running a charity. I've never known a switch from volunteers to paid patients" Waiting times: One patient reported a year's wait to see an NHS physiotherapist, another waited 2.5 years between injections meant to be six monthly and another was sent to NHS England for help.

The meeting agreed that, if matters did not improve, a formal complaint should be made.

June 20 meeting

Minister Jenni Minto (speaker, briefly)

The recently appointed public health minister Jenni Minto attended.

The previous health secretary and deputy twice met three MSP conveners, but no patients. Ms Minto was welcomed as the first health minister to visit in four years. She apologised that she could only stay for 30 minutes but listened. Secrecy: Patients informed her of their serious concerns over lack of inclusion and lack of transparency.

They asked the "Why" to such questions for later response.

- *Patients did not know who was on the Taskforce making recommendations on their services. FOI showed around 20 officials and no patients.
- *The minister's officials had not given patient groups information for a year during which they
- set up a "Pain Taskforce" and seven working groups. Why were these unnamed? *Patients were now asked to comment on a second year of work but had no information about the first year.
- *FOI disclosed that patient "advocates" (supporters) were not to be recruited. Although it's claimed they wanted "little heard" patients, those needing an interpreter were

also excluded,

- *Volunteer patient reps elected by fellow sufferers were replaced by people selected by a marketing firm and paid £200 each. "Patients" were advertised for on social media.
- *A retired consultant had been appointed by officials as a patient rep, not a patient.

The minister said we could write to her as she had little time tonight. But she had officials taking notes. Linda Mawson said ""There is nothing solid about the Framework plan, no clarity, no practical proposal. Is this just another talking shop?

Ms Minto said "I don't want this to be a talking shop. I don't think there has been any secrecy. My officials will answer questions as I have to go to another engagement"

After the Minister left, official Nicki Motiang said there was no new budget money for staffing or other help for chronic pain services with Boards, This greatly concerned the meeting, as patients fear cuts to specialist pain services. The meeting agreed to keep up pressure to get proper funding for clinics, and to challenge lack of information. The meeting was summed up by an email sent by experienced members with chronic pain:

Secrecy

- * Discussion again centred on secrecy , officials on the "Pain Taskforce" and on seven sub groups remain nameless.
- *Concerns again raised about NHS Highland, where Highland's top rated specialist pain service is already losing some treatments, despite opposition from patients. Only existing patients are allowed injections and infusions not suitable newcomers. Again, little information on the future.
- *Patients still not allowed to sit with officials when officials discuss their patient services.
- *The man whom women pain patients complained about making disturbing online posts against some women patients in 2021 has now been re-appointed to speak for patients.
- *Despite protests, there are still no patients allowed to sit with officials on the Taskforce.

CPG voluntary work with the Parliament has become harder - the Parliament's IT people would not allow us to open this meeting's recording, which everyone had agreed as usual should record for minutes. This meant the voluntary secretary had work doubled, contacting many to check names and content.

Work all year*

*Our voluntary secretary was invited to address the STUC congress in Dundee in April, seconded by UNITE on a motion against secrecy and for FOI strengthening backed by Glasgow NUJ.

She received unanimous backing against FOI decisions being made by any department being questioned under FOI (as happens with pain),

- *The secretary compiled numerous FOI requests pain services and five review appeals after scant FOI information, which is handled by Clinical Priorities.
- *Other research meant hundreds of emails and letters plus individual contact with concerned patients.
- *Some members attended two identical "briefing" meetings of one hour with officials but there was a shortage of answers.

Some members also attend CPGs on Women's health, Arthritis & MSK conditions.
