Agenda item 2

School gardens presentation (Professor Donald Gray, Donald Gray, University of Aberdeen, Laura Colucci-Gray, University of Edinburgh, Jonathan Hancock, University of Edinburgh).

After the group expressed concern over funding, he pledged to write to the Health Secretary on behalf of the group over therapeutic gardens support being allocated. The Minister was also questioned on the devolved issue of peat and he asked the group about what suitable support would look like and what the industry would do if given 4 years before a ban. DL, SF and SG explained current progress, trials and challenges. Also asked about support for education providers. Happy to be contacted by group on issues and will raise them on groups behalf.

Agenda item 5

Jim McColl (Stan Green)

SG provided a fitting and moving account, alongside memories of Jim, the 'Grandfather of Scottish Horticulture' whose funeral he had attended earlier that day along with many other CPG Members who hold Jim McColl in the highest regard for contributions to gardening and their careers. The CPG puts on record this tribute.

Recognising the immense contribution to horticulture of the late Jim McColl MBE Born in Kilmarnock in 1936, he trained at the West of Scotland College, near Ayr. As a horticultural advisor, a job in broadcasting was far from his mind. Jim's maiden television appearance was on Tomorrow's World while he was involved on a project for Glen Garioch Distillery in Aberdeenshire where he talked about heating greenhouses for tomatoes... and of course whisky.

Jim was somebody who became a TV personality after presenting in front of the BBC's cameras in the garden with his Beechgrove colleagues. Over the course of more than 40 years, Jim McColl, who died at the age of 89 last month, dispensed pearls of wisdom alongside his dry sense of humour. "Every day's a school day, and everybody can become a gardener." Were his battle cries. It was a message which millions took to heart, and it not only transformed Jim's life but the life of thousands throughout Scotland. Beechgrove was first screened in April 1978 and was hugely successful, down to the chemistry and mutual respect between Jim and George Barron. Two couthy characters.

Jim was a consummate professional. During the 1980's, alongside his TV career, he was instrumental in setting up the annual "Scotgrow" exhibition for the trade. Later, he was also a great supporter of the National Garden show, the charity "Tellis Scotland" and a very active member of The Calyx project. The Calyx was an unsuccessful attempt to have a national focus for gardening in Scotland, marrying both of Jim's passions namely Scotland and horticulture. He was made an MBE in 1996 and was recognised by the Royal Horticultural Society who awarded him the prestigious Victoria Medal of Honour in 2020. In 2016, the Royal Television Society Scotland Award was presented to Jim and Tern TV to celebrate 1,000 episodes of Beechgrove.

Oft mentioned as the "Grandfather of Scottish Gardening" ... he was a one off, such a wealth of knowledge, and so generous with his time and enthusiasm spreading the joy of gardening. Jim was a gardener, but his other passion was music and Jim along with his accordion could often be heard leading a good old-fashioned sing along after a long day's recording.

Those wellies will be impossible to fill.

Our thoughts go to Jim's wife Billie and the family.
