He has worked with the World Bank, KPMG, the European Central Bank and the OECD, among others, on measuring economic progress to meet the challenges of this century.

**Denisha Killoh** is a trustee of the Wellbeing Economy Alliance Scotland and represents Scotland at the Future Generations Commission for the UK. She is currently leading the Scottish Government funded National Childhood Bereavement Project delivered by Includem and has previously been a Co-Chair at the Independent Care Review.

**Margreet Frieling** is a senior policy analyst specialised in the use of wellbeing frameworks and evidence to inform and design better public policy. She has extensive experience working across the public sector internationally, including for the OECD, the New Zealand Government, and the Dutch Ministry of Health, Wellbeing and Sport, as well as working with local councils to support a wellbeing policy approach.

**Jen Wallace** is a public policy analyst and writer. She has held a range of positions in the public and voluntary sector and is currently Director at Carnegie UK, where she applies a wellbeing approach to government policy and promotes wellbeing as a narrative for social change. She has written extensively on this topic and has a specific interest and expertise in the role of wellbeing approaches in small jurisdictions.
