*S5M-00705 Alexander Stewart: Section 75 of the Pensions Act 1995—That the Parliament notes the concerns raised by small business owners and employees about changes made in September 2005 to Section 75 of the Pensions Act 1995 in relation to when an employer ceases to be part of a pension scheme; recognises that the new requirement that employer debt is calculated at full buy-out levels has placed a large financial burden on employers who sell up or cease to operate their business, for example, in the event of their retirement; acknowledges the particular impact that this has had on employers in the Scottish plumbing sector, including those in Mid-Scotland and Fife, who have used multi-employer, defined benefit, "career average" occupational pension schemes since 1975, and welcomes the fact that the Minister of State for Pensions and the Department for Work and Pensions are trying to find a solution to this issue and have undertaken a detailed scrutiny of the evidence in relation to this matter to determine whether a change to the current legislation would be appropriate.

*S5M-00687 Lewis Macdonald: Protecting Jobs and Prosperity in the North East

Economy—That the Parliament welcomes the Oil and Gas Summit held by Aberdeen City Council on 30 June 2016 to discuss the ongoing oil jobs crisis and the involvement of employers, trade unions, ministers in the Scottish and UK governments, regulators and other public and private sector organisations, including the council's private sector partner, Opportunity North East (ONE); understands that the summit, which followed the previous summit organised by Aberdeen City Council in February 2015, discussed progress made since then with the Aberdeen City Region Deal and other agreed initiatives, and what more needs to be done to grow employment and export earnings in the long term; agrees with Sir Ian Wood of ONE, who concluded that there is still a need for "urgent focus" to support the oil and gas sector in the face of the continuing risks to jobs and the regional economy of north east Scotland; considers that the continuing low oil price also impacts on the wider Scottish and British economies, and that Oil & Gas UK estimates that 120,000 direct, indirect and induced jobs will have been lost across Britain by the end of 2016; further recognises that trade unions continue to reflect workforce concerns about offshore safety, and believes that the safety of workers in the North Sea must never be compromised by cost reduction; commends Aberdeen City Council for organising and hosting this important event, and

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notes calls for decisive action from the Scottish and UK governments and other partners to protect jobs and prosperity in the north east and across the wider economy.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
