Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S5M-05016 Jackie Baillie: Vale of Leven Hospital GP Out-of-hours Services—That the Parliament expresses its concerns about the future provision of GP out-of-hours services at the Vale of Leven Hospital; notes that a report produced by NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde recommends the withdrawal of the service between Mondays and Fridays due to financial and staffing pressures; understands that the publication of the report follows months of temporary closures at the hospital during weekends as the NHS board is unable to recruit enough medical staff to cover the service; considers that it is unacceptable to force people in Dumbarton, Vale of Leven, Helensburgh and Lomond to travel to the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Paisley to access emergency primary care services; believes that the report identifies a reduction in services at the Vale of Leven Hospital as the preferred option, despite the NHS board's own figures revealing higher attendances at GP out-of-hours services among Dumbarton and Alexandria residents than residents in Paisley; considers that such services are a vital component of any local hospital, and notes calls on the Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport to intervene to ensure that the commitment in the Vision for the Vale agreement to maintaining these services is respected.

*S5M-05014 Brian Whittle: Girvan Youth Trust—That the Parliament recognises the work of the Girvan Youth Trust, which is a not-for-profit charitable organisation based in Girvan, South Ayrshire, whose primary objective is to support young people in Girvan and the surrounding area to make positive, healthy life choices; understands that the trust owns and operates the Z1 Youth Bar, which is a multi-functional youth centre with a non-alcoholic bar, arts and crafts room, stage area, outdoor area and IT facilities, which enables it to operate a range of weekly activities aimed at encouraging young people to be more physically active and develop a range of practical and social skills that will benefit them for life; considers the trust has a strong commitment to supporting young people into apprenticeships and employment; notes its ambition to participate in Project Search, which is an initiative that aims to bring more people with learning disabilities into employment; commends William Grant & Sons distillery for the significant support that it has provided to Girvan Youth Trust over a number of years; thanks everyone involved in the trust for their efforts and the significant contribution that the organisation makes to the area, and wishes them continued success.

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*S5M-05012 Colin Smyth: Snaring—That the Parliament acknowledges the recent Scottish National Heritage report, *Review of Snaring for the Scottish Government*, which offers what it sees as only a limited number of recommendations to strengthen the legislation on snaring; understands that the League Against Cruel Sports considers the review to be a "wasted opportunity" given its limited scope and that OneKind has said that the report was "destined to fail' as it excluded consideration of whether snares should be used at all; notes that the October 2016 report, *Cruel and Indiscriminate: Why Scotland must become snare-free*, which was commissioned jointly by the League Against Cruel Sports and OneKind, suggested that, regardless of any future tweaks to the legislation, snares would continue to be cruel and indiscriminate; further notes that this paper cited instances of evisceration, strangulation and agonising deaths experienced by the animals, including non-target animals such as Scottish wildcats, mountain hares, badgers, hedgehogs, deer, otters, and even family pets, and notes the calls for the Scottish Government to consult on an outright ban on snaring in the South Scotland region and across the country. *S5M-05008 Brian Whittle: Heritage and Environmental Conservation Charities Support for Outdoor Learning—That the Parliament acknowledges the work of various national conservation charities, including RSPB Scotland and the National Trust for Scotland, in the provision and promotion of outdoor education; believes that outdoor education should be seen as an important component of the curriculum, with meaningful benefits to both pupils' learning and their health; considers that sites such as Culzean Castle in South Ayrshire, which is run by the National Trust for Scotland, the RSPB's Mersehead Reserve in Dumfries and Galloway, and the Dumfries House Estate in East Ayrshire endeavour to work with local schools to arrange visits to their sites, along with various educational activities; understands that many organisations have seen a marked decline in the number of pupils participating in recent years; believes that, while visits are often provided at little or no direct cost to schools, the cost of transport has become prohibitive as school budgets have been squeezed; notes the calls on schools across Scotland to consider making use of schools attainment funding to support greater use of outdoor education, and thanks RSPB Scotland, the National Trust for Scotland and other similar organisations for their commitment to supporting outdoor learning.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

*S5M-05020 Annie Wells: Subway Fare Hike for Glasgow's Older People—That the Parliament is aware that Strathclyde Partnership for Transport, which runs the Glasgow Subway, is set to increase concession fares from 3 April 2017; notes that this is the first such increase in four years, and understands that older people will have to stump up more to travel, with a single fare increasing from £0.90 to £1.00, and a return from £1.30 to £1.40.

*S5M-05019 Ash Denham: Cancer Research UK—That the Parliament commends the 2,989 people who participated in Cancer Research UK's 2016 Race for Life events at Holyrood Park, raising £210,444 for research that it hopes will help beat cancer sooner; encourages the people of Edinburgh to take part in the 2017 events that take place on 25 June, including the new family 5K event, which allows men to take part for the first time, and applauds Cancer Research UK's work as the biggest funder of research into the condition in Scotland.

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*S5M-05018 Annie Wells: Re-opening of the World Record-holding Glasgow Tower—That the Parliament acknowledges the long awaited re-opening of the Glasgow Tower to the public on 1 April 2017; notes that the 127 metre-tall attraction consists of glass-fronted elevators and viewing cabins, offering panoramic views of Glasgow; understands that it is the only structure that is capable of rotating 360 degrees and holds a Guinness World Record for being the tallest fully rotating, free standing structure in the world; notes that visitors will be able to learn about the history of Glasgow and the site that the tower is built on, and further notes that the tower is open daily from 11.00am to 4.30pm, but is closed when wind speeds rise above 25mph.

*S5M-05017 Fulton MacGregor: Inspiration Award for Muirhead and District Seniors Forum—That the Parliament congratulates the Muirhead and District Seniors Forum on being presented with an Age Scotland inspiration award; notes that these awards recognise the work of those who support older people to help them love life; commends the forum in engaging its over-55 group in social activity to compliment health and wellbeing; notes that the varied range of activities offered include tea dances, keep fit walking groups, holidays and excursions, which provides opportunities to help them socialise and keep active, and wishes this group, and others like it, every success.

*S5M-05013 Dean Lockhart: Success for Morgan Faulds and Cara Hayes—That the Parliament congratulates Morgan Faulds and Cara Hayes, who are S2 pupils at Kirkcaldy High School, on winning the Fife heat of the Crown Office Procurator Fiscal Public Speaking Competition, defeating teams from Inverkeithing, Auchmuty and Queen Anne High Schools; understands that the theme of the evening was, The age at which a child should be treated as an adult in law; congratulates Morgan and Cara on the praise that they received from the judges for their clarity of delivery, excellent presentation skills and strong teamwork, and wishes them luck in the Sheriffdom finals for Central Tayside and Fife, which take place in Perth in April 2017.

*S5M-05011 Gillian Martin: Friends of Anchor's 20for20 Dream Big Initiative—That the Parliament congratulates the talented artists who were recently selected to design 19 of the 20 anchors as part of the Friends of Anchor's 20for20 Dream Big initiative, which aims to raise £1 million to help the University of Aberdeen recruit a world-class cancer research team; understands that the 20th anchor will be decorated by one of the designs submitted by primary school children in the catchment area of Aberdeen Royal Infirmary; recognises that the anchors will be displayed in Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire, Moray, the Highlands, Orkney and Shetland between July and October 2017 before being auctioned off; commends the work of all at Friends of Anchor, and wishes the charity and the 20for20 Dream Big initiative every success.

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*S5M-05010 Alison Johnstone: Benefit Cuts—That the Parliament understands that a whole raft of cuts to benefits and tax credits take effect on 1 April 2017; considers that these include a significant reduction in benefit for new Employment Support Allowance recipients in the Work Related Activity group, who it understands will collectively lose around £70 million by 2021; believes that this is fundamentally unfair as it does not recognise the higher costs that sick and disabled people face when looking for work; considers that the Scottish Government's ambition to reduce child poverty will be undermined by the limiting of Child Tax Credit to families with two children, which it understands will eventually remove around £100 million a year from families in Scotland according to figures from the Scottish Parliament Information Centre (SPICe); understands that further cuts to benefits aimed at children come in the form of the abolition of the Family Element of Tax Credits and the First Child Element of Universal Credit; believes that these cuts are part of a broader package of benefits cuts that are estimated by Sheffield Hallam University to be worth £2 billion by 2020-21, and considers that the powers that the Parliament now has over social security can be used to return fairness to the benefits system.

*S5M-05009 David Torrance: Kirkcaldy Race for Life 2017—That the Parliament commends the £104,778 raised by the 1,478 participants in Cancer Research UK's Race for Life event in Fife in 2016; notes that the event was part of a series across Scotland to raise money for research into 200 types of cancer; encourages people in Kirkcaldy to take part in the 2017 Pretty Muddy and Race for Life events, which take place in the Beveridge Park on 24 and 25 June 2017, and praises all the participants across Fife, and Scotland, who unite at these events to join the fight against cancer.

*S5M-05007 Miles Briggs: 400th Anniversary of the Death of John Napier—That the Parliament notes that 4 April 2017 marks the 400th anniversary of the death of the mathematics genius, physicist and astronomer, John Napier from Merchiston, who discovered logarithms, invented Napier's bones and made common the use of the decimal point in arithmetic and mathematics; understands that, as part of a number of commemorative events, a public memorial service will be held at 1.30pm on 4 April at St Cuthbert's on Lothian Road, Edinburgh; notes that this has been organised jointly by Edinburgh Napier University and the Clan Napier Society; understands that the novelist, Alexander McCall Smith, has composed a new poem, *A Cosmos of Numbers*, which will be read out at the service; welcomes the commemorations that are being held; wishes all involved in organising these well, and appreciates that Napier's brilliance, innovation and influence continues to be important, not least through the success of what it believes is the world-class Edinburgh Napier University.

*S5M-05006 Neil Findlay: Campaign to Save Dalkeith Playscheme—That the Parliament expresses its concern regarding the proposed closure of a playscheme that is held during the school holidays at Saltersgate School in Dalkeith for children with additional support needs; understands that Capability Scotland has pulled out of supporting this and that Midlothian Council has failed to secure a new provider after putting the service out for tender; calls on the council to find a viable solution that will provide the parents and children with continuity of service, and recognises the important and positive impact that it believes the playscheme has on the children who attend it.

*S5M-05004 John Mason: Growth in Wealth Not Felt by People on Lower Incomes—That the Parliament notes the reported comments from EY Item Club economists that lower income households will not see any positives from the 12.5% jump in the net financial wealth of people in the UK; understands that this huge growth in the last year has come from increasing share prices outpacing rising inflation and slow wage growth; further understands that this means that only the relatively well-off who own financial assets are likely to see any benefit, while people on lower incomes will feel the bite of increasing inflation; believes that people on lower incomes will be hit even harder by rising prices as they tend to spend more of their income than high earners, and further believes that the expected 2.8% increase in prices, with just 0.1% real terms growth in household incomes, shows that economic growth and recovery must be broad and include everyone in society, regardless of income.
