*<u>S5M-03559</u> Alex Rowley: Citizen's Basic Income Network Scotland—That the Parliament notes the launch of the new charity, Citizen's Basic Income Network Scotland, in Kelty Community Centre on 28 January 2017; welcomes the attendance of Professor Karl Winderquist, who it considers to be one of the world's leading experts on basic income, to the event; understands that the charity is being launched in Fife as a result of the recommendations by the Fairer Fife Commission and the Carnegie Trust to pilot a Citizen's Basic Income Scheme in that area; believes that Fife Council in leading the way in the UK in exploring the potential benefits of a basic income scheme; recognises that a citizen's basic income would see everyone given a set amount of money every month, which could reduce the anxiety that is often faced within the current social security system, and looks forward to seeing the results of the potentially transformational idea that could create a fairer, more equal and kinder society.

*<u>S5M-03558</u> Richard Lyle: Closure of Clydesdale Bank's Bellshill Branch—That the Parliament condemns the closure of the Clydesdale Bank's Bellshill branch; believes that this closure will be yet another blow to the community and its banking opportunities, given the announcement by the Airdrie Savings Bank to close its branch in the town as well; expresses concern that there appeared to be little consultation with the community, customers and other stakeholders in reaching this decision; believes that bank branches are at the heart of communities and are important for the people who depend on their services, and calls on the Clydesdale Bank to reconsider such closures, in particular where branches provide essential front-counter service to small communities.

*<u>S5M-03557</u> Richard Lyle: Closure of the Bellshill Branch of the Airdrie Savings Bank—That the Parliament acknowledges the closure of the Bellshill Branch of the Airdrie Savings Bank; notes that the bank has been at the heart of Bellshill's town centre for many years as one of very few surviving independent savings banks; understands the difficult decision that had to be made by the board of the bank and indeed its wider management in having to close the bank across communities; is concerned that up to 70 staff will lose their jobs over the next few months, and hopes that agencies can work together to deliver continuing employment for everybody involved.

*<u>S5M-03556</u> Brian Whittle: The Great Steward of Scotland's Dumfries House Trust—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the significant contribution that the Great Steward of Scotland's Dumfries House Trust makes to East Ayrshire and to Scotland; understands that, in addition to preserving Dumfries House and Estate, which it considers to be an outstanding part of the country's architectural and artistic heritage, the trust has formed successful partnerships with

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local authorities, businesses, individuals and educational establishments to develop the house and estate as a centre for education, skills and employment; notes that this work includes the operation of a traditional skills centre and hospitality training centre in partnership with The Prince's Trust, and a residential outdoor activity centre and sports complex, which has been used by more than 5,000 young people from around 50 organisations since 2013; further notes that it has an education garden and teaching centre that delivers a horticulture and healthy eating programme to primary school children, and an engineering centre, which aims to deliver practical, interactive lessons to school pupils; acknowledges that it has recently purchased, and is now restoring, New Cumnock Town Hall, and that it is also redeveloping that town's outdoor swimming pool as part of a fitness campus; considers that the model of heritage-led regeneration that the trust operates provides an innovative and highly successful approach to regeneration; acknowledges that it is funded using private philanthropy rather than public money; appreciates the work of Prince Charles, the Duke of Rothesay and Great Steward of Scotland's Dumfries House Trust; congratulates His Royal Highness, the trust's staff, volunteers and sponsors on what it considers their tremendous success and their contribution and commitment to preserving the house and estate in order to make a difference to communities, and wishes them all continued success.
