<u>S5M-04456</u> Iain Gray: The Scottish Government and Education, 10 Years of Letting Down Teachers, Parents and Pupils—That the Parliament notes the evidence submitted to the Education and Skills Committee that many teachers have lost confidence in Education Scotland and the SQA; notes Scottish Government figures, which show falling numbers of teachers and support staff; is disappointed in the results of the OECD's PISA worldwide survey, which show a decline in reading, maths and science scores in Scotland in both absolute and relative terms; notes a number of significant responses to the Scottish Government review of the governance of schools, which question its thrust and direction, and believes that its stewardship of education is failing teachers, parents and pupils.

<u>S5M-04292</u> Ross Greer: Bedouin Villages in Israel—That the Parliament condemns the plans by Israel to demolish the Bedouin villages, Khan al Ahmar and Umm al Hiran; expresses concern at the violence that has accompanied the demolition of Bedouin villages, including the deaths of two individuals following a pre-dawn raid in Umm al Hiran on 18 January 2017; understands that there are at least 35 Bedouin villages considered illegal by Israel and that this causes hardship, including restricted access to basic infrastructure, the continued threat of demolition and the need

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to construct essential structures, such as schools from car tyres and mud to circumvent bans on construction material, and urges Israel to legally recognise these Bedouin villages as home to native peoples who have a right to live without harassment from the Israeli state, cease what it sees as threats of demolition and financial sanctions, and permit these villages to be integrated into national infrastructure.

*S5M-04292.1 Jackson Carlaw: Bedouin Villages in Israel—As an amendment to motion S5M-04292 in the name of Ross Greer (Bedouin Villages in Israel), leave out from "condemns" to end and insert "understands that Khan al-Ahmar is a Bedouin village in Area C, the part of the West Bank in which, according to long-standing agreements between Israel and the Palestinian Authority, including the Oslo agreements, Israel has full responsibility for the enforcement of planning and zoning laws; notes that similar to Europe's traveller community, the Bedouin population in Israel and the West Bank lead nomadic lives and do not adhere to traditional, legal land ownership regulations; believes therefore that the rapid growth of the Bedouin population is a significant challenge for Israel; considers that democratic Israel recognises the traditional lifestyle of the Bedouins and has proposed solutions that are appropriate to their specific needs; further considers that the Bedouin people have been offered plots of similar, or even better, quality in a nearby area that already conforms to planning and zoning laws; believes that building houses there will also improve the petitioners' quality of life, giving them access to infrastructure and educational facilities that are not available in their current illegal locations; further believes that they will be allowed to continue the same agricultural activities on the lands that they currently claim; considers that, just as Israel enforces planning laws in Area C, the Israeli Government also removes Israeli homes built on private Palestinian land in the West Bank; notes that, for example, on 1 March 2017, security forces bulldozed nine homes built on private Palestinian land in the West Bank settlement of Ofra and, in February, Israeli police and border police officers evicted around 50 families from their homes in Amona; understands that Umm al-Hiran is an illegal Bedouin village built on state-owned land in the Negev in Israel; notes that there are 46 other such illegal villages in Israel's Negev region and, while there are no restrictions on where Bedouins can live, towns and villages are structured in a similar way to how town planning works in the UK; considers that Umm al-Hiran is 8 km from Hura, a Bedouin town with approved plans and developed infrastructure, where children of Umm al-Hiran already study and, when Bedouins move to Hura, each family will receive 800 square metres of land from the Israeli Government, and ultimately believes that the Israeli Government is committed to protecting the cultural values of the Bedouins as its largest construction project, costing an estimated half a billion Israeli shekels, which will see the Israel Land Administration, as part of its plan to expand the existing Bedouin towns in the Negev, double the size of the Bedouin town of Rahat.
