*S5M-04559 Neil Findlay: The Miners' Strike, the Need for a Scottish Inquiry—That the Parliament notes the release of 18 Home Office files relating to the 1984-85 miners' strike; believes that files confirm what a lot of people have suspected for a long time that the then Conservative administration compromised the neutrality of the police through what it considers its politically-motivated interference in their operations during the dispute; further believes that the files demonstrate that, following the dispute, there was an intransigent reluctance by the UK Government to assess the role and behaviour of the police; considers that this effectively prevented truth and justice being provided; believes that the papers suggests to observers that an establishment cover-up took place; reiterates that there is a need for a full inquiry into the incidents at Orgreave and the full role of the police during the strike; calls on the Scottish Ministers not to replicate what it sees as the actions of the UK Government in seeking to deny truth and justice to miners who still feel wronged as a result of police, government and security service tactics; urges the Scottish Government to conduct its own inquiry into the role of the police in Scotland at that time; looks forward to the release of a further 15 files from the Home Office and 65 from South Yorkshire Police, and calls on the Scottish Government to release any files regarding the strike that are held by Police Scotland or the National Archives of Scotland.

As soon as a Public Bill (i.e. a Government, Committee or Member's Bill) has completed Stage 1, amendments for consideration at Stage 2 may be lodged; and as soon as Stage 2 is completed, amendments for Stage 3 consideration may be lodged. The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
