S5M-03651 Ross Thomson: Impact on North East Businesses of the Hike in Non-domestic Rates—That the Parliament understands that, as a result of the 2015 revaluation, businesses across the North East Scotland region are facing enormous increases in their non-domestic rates; believes that this impacts on companies across a range of sectors, including hospitality, oil and gas, engineering and retail, with some being subjected to increases in excess of 200%; considers that this represents a substantial hike in charges that will render it extremely difficult for some to avoid liquidation; welcomes the *Press & Journal* campaign, which, it understands, aims to highlight a number of compelling examples of businesses that will be adversely affected by the increase, and notes the calls for the Scottish Government to take expedient and meaningful action to address this issue and to seek a solution to ease the impact of this.

Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S5M-04643 Ben Macpherson: UK Government Housing Benefit Changes for 18 to 21-yearolds—That the Parliament expresses concern at its understanding that 18 to 21-year-olds in Edinburgh and across Scotland will face restrictions in financial support for housing benefit from 1 April 2017; notes the calls on the UK Government to reconsider what it believes is its ill-conceived and harmful plans that will increase the likelihood of young people being made homeless and undermine the preventative approach to homelessness taken by local and national government in Scotland; believes that these changes are being imposed while discussions continue between the UK and Scottish governments on how the policy can be fully mitigated within existing powers; notes its disappointment with the UK Government's short timescale for change despite assurances that options for Scotland would be considered further, which it believes makes it impossible for full mitigation arrangements to be put in place before this change comes into force; acknowledges the report, The withdrawal of support for housing costs under Universal Credit for young people: more pain for little gain?, from the homelessness charity, Crisis, and Sheffield Hallam University, which suggests that many of those affected are "likely to be made more vulnerable, less secure and less able to rebuild their relationship with their parents or to keep or find a job than they were before"; notes the research of Heriot-Watt University, which estimates that, if more than 140 young people are made homeless, the policy will cost the UK Government more than the estimated and supposed savings, and believes that not all young people have the option of living with their parents and, for those who may be in a desperate or difficult situation and facing homelessness, housing support can provide stability, security and enable them to lead independent and fulfilling lives.

*S5M-04625 Patrick Harvie: Divesting and Reinvesting Council Pension Funds—That the Parliament welcomes the report, *Divest Reinvest, Scottish council pensions for a future worth living in*, which has been published by Friends of the Earth Scotland, UNISON Scotland and Common Weal; notes its findings that Scotland's local authorities hold a £1,683 million stake in fossil fuel companies through their pension funds, which represents £3,300 for every scheme member; welcomes the action by the Strathclyde, Falkirk and Lothian pension funds to invest £234 million in renewable energy and social housing, and notes the view that moving public pension funds away from fossil fuels and toward socially and environmentally beneficial projects can

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protect pension value, meet councils' fiduciary duty and benefit pension holders through community development and tackling climate change.

*S5M-04646 Clare Haughey: Lanarkshire Credit Union Achieves Living Wage Employer Status—That the Parliament commends Lanarkshire Credit Union for its accreditation as a Living Wage Employer by the Living Wage Foundation; understands that the credit union's employees, both permanent employees and third-party contractors, will receive a minimum hourly wage of at least £8.45, which is higher than the national minimum wage of £6.95; considers that earning a living wage is essential to the wellbeing and prosperity of workers and families, yet one-in-five people in Scotland do not receive a living wage, and encourages all employers to follow Lanarkshire Credit Union's example and become accredited as a Living Wage Employer.

*S5M-04645 Neil Findlay: The Mesh Shambles—That the Parliament is very concerned at the reports that another person has resigned from the independent review group that was established by the Scottish Government to look at the safety of mesh implants; understands that the consultant, who does not wish to be named, stepped down following the revelation that an entire chapter of the final report had been removed, and believes that this report has been completely undermined by what it sees as manipulation of the evidence provided.

*S5M-04644 Alexander Stewart: Alloa FC's Jim Goodwin, Ladbrokes Manager of the Month—That the Parliament congratulates the Alloa Athletic FC manager, Jim Goodwin, on being named the Ladbrokes League One Manager of the Month for February 2017 after leading his side to three wins and a draw, the latter against title rivals, Livingston; understands that Jim has suggested that this notable turnaround in form has been down to him dropping himself from the starting line-up; notes his comment that "when you're out there playing and trying to manage at the same time, you're trying to do everyone's job rather than concentrating on your own"; understands that he took over as manager in October 2016, and that the club recorded just four wins across all competitions between then and January, before the recent improvement in results, and wishes Jim and his players the very best of luck with their future fixtures.

*S5M-04642 Jackson Carlaw: Scottish Tourism Week 2017—That the Parliament welcomes that 23,000 people in over 650 businesses involved in Scottish tourism have undertaken customer service training programmes; notes that WorldHost customer service training programmes were run by People 1st and funded by Skills Development Scotland; supports the importance of a well-trained workforce in the Scottish tourism sector; applauds the achievements of four cities, over 70 towns and two sets of islands across 12 regions in Scotland now using the world-renowned WorldHost customer service programmes to train local businesses in hospitality and tourism; notes that this training represents an investment of over £2 million since it was launched in 2014, and recognises the businesses, towns and regions that are currently working towards WorldHost accreditation to ensure that visitors receive a warm welcome and high standard of customer service to help set Scotland apart as a visitor destination.

*S5M-04641 Alexander Stewart: £1 Million Specialist Residency for Adults with Autism in Clackmannanshire—That the Parliament welcomes the news that a £1 million specialist residency for adults with autism is to be developed in Clackmannanshire; believes that the construction will have three one-bedroom flats, three two-bedroom flats, 24/7 bespoke onsite care, with one flat being used for respite; understands that the charity, Scottish Autism, which seeks to help people diagnosed with autism to lead full and enriched lives, has purchased the former Kilncraigs House for the project; notes that it intends to invest additional money, generated in part through fundraising activity, to convert the Alloa premises into a fit-for-purpose residency, and recognises that this will provide accommodation for up to nine autistic adults and will be suitable for people who also live with mobility problems and other health-related issues.

*S5M-04640 Alison Harris: Forth Valley Sensory Centre Café Tiki—That the Parliament congratulates the Forth Valley Sensory Centre's Café Tiki on having received its Healthy Living certificate; understands that this acknowledges the social enterprise café as one of Falkirk's healthiest eating spots; acknowledges that the café is maintained through determination and hard work; notes that it is regularly staffed by volunteers, and wishes the café continued luck in its future endeavours.

*S5M-04639 Anas Sarwar: European Court of Justice Ruling and its Impact on Religious Hatred—That the Parliament expresses its disappointment at the European Court of Justice's decision that it believes allows employers to ban their workers from wearing items at work that they regard as religious symbols, including headscarves, skull caps and turbans; considers that this ruling will make it even more difficult for people from religious communities, including Muslim women who wear a headscarf, Jewish men who wear and skull cap and Sikhs who wear a turban, to enter the job market in the future; agrees with Amnesty International that this will open a backdoor to prejudice at a time when identity and appearance have become a political battleground and when people need more protection against prejudice, not less; considers that this is part of a worrying trend of increasing religious prejudice, particularly Islamophobia and anti-Semitism, across mainland Europe; expresses concern at the rising support for parties and politicians who it considers openly incite religious hatred, such as Geert Wilders in the Netherlands and Marine Le Pen in France; believes that everyone must redouble their efforts to confront all forms of religious discrimination, and calls on the Scottish Government to set out what implications this ruling will have for employees in Scotland and its courts.

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the whole premise on which the independence referendum is being called will be fundamentally undermined, and calls on the Scottish Government and First Minister to provide what it believes would be clarity over this issue.
