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100,000 signatures from people across the region and the world for its petition to the UK Secretary of State for Transport, Chris Grayling; notes the calls for the devolution of powers over licences for at-sea ship-to-ship oil transfers, and further notes the view that any oil transfers that are considered necessary should continue to take place in the relative safety of the Cromarty Port.

*S5M-05410 John Mason: Scotland's Population Reaches New High—That the Parliament welcomes the figures released by the National Records of Scotland, which show Scotland's population reaching a new record of 5,404,700; understands that this shows an increase of 31,700 over the year to June 2016; further understands that this increase is in large part down to migration, with 31,700 more people moving to Scotland rather than leaving; notes that migration from the rest of the UK was 5,900 higher than from overseas, however, 20,000 more people left Scotland to live in the rest of the UK when compared to those moving overseas, leading to a net gain of 22,900 from overseas and 8,800 from the rest of the UK; believes that these positive figures show that Scotland is a highly desirable country to live in, and considers that this highlights the need for Scotland to continue to be a welcoming outward looking country that is able to attract people here to live and work.

*S5M-05409 Bill Bowman: Congratulations to Monifieth High School—That the Parliament sends its congratulations to the members of Monifieth High School's engineering club on reaching the finals of two major UK competitions; understands that the pupils competed in the finals of the F1 in Schools and Tomorrow's Engineers EEP Robotics Challenge competition; recognises the importance of extra-curricular science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) activities in encouraging young people to decide to follow careers in science or engineering for example, and wishes the staff and pupils every success for the future.

*S5M-05408 Jackson Carlaw: Cross Party Group on Palestine—That the Parliament notes with astonishment the purported statements of the Treasurer of the Cross Party Group on Palestine at a meeting on 25 April 2017; understands that Philip Chetwynd refused to discuss the definition of anti-Semitism in Scotland in the presence of "representatives of three Zionist organisations"; believes that Mr Chetwynd went on to call these representatives "ideological terrorists" and that he felt "intimidated"; considers that Scotland's Parliament must be open to all and that political debate is weakened by an unwillingness to engage with those with whom we disagree; considers that the alleged comments of Mr Chetwynd could potentially be construed as anti-Semitic given that, of the three representatives referred to, one was Jewish and another an Israeli national living in

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Scotland; thanks MSPs, including vice-convener, Sandra White, and other external organisations for opposing the removal of these three representatives from the meeting, and considers that, given what it considers Mr Chetwynd's unwillingness to act in a manner appropriate to maintaining the reputation of the Parliament, he should be removed from his position forthwith.

*S5M-05407 Bill Bowman: Oral Health Success for Two Dundee Care Homes—That the Parliament sends its congratulations to Magdalen House and Ferry House, two Dundee care homes that have been awarded Oral Health Awards by NHS Tayside; understands that these awards were developed by NHS Tayside in 2011 to encourage homes to include new oral health standards as part of the residents' care package; considers that this initiative is a great example of a project to improve the oral health of older people, and congratulates the staff at both care homes for their efforts in achieving this award.

*S5M-05405 Margaret Mitchell: Association of British Bookmakers in Scotland Launches Gambling Risks Project—That the Parliament welcomes the new outreach project from the Association of British Bookmakers in Scotland, which has been supported by bookmakers in Hamilton; understands that the project aims to raise awareness of the risks associated with problem gambling among young people; believes with concern that problem gambling at this age brings a heightened risk of development problems in adulthood; notes that the association is the trade body for high street betting shops and welcomes it leading this initiative in partnership with the Paisley-based charity, the RCA Trust; recognises that the charity has so far spoken to around 700 school pupils around the west of Scotland and aims to meet pupils in Hamilton, and encourages young people and their parents to contact the National Gambling Helpline on 0808 8020 133 if they have concerns about problem gambling.

*S5M-05404 Richard Leonard: Dalziel High School, Motherwell—That the Parliament congratulates Dalziel High School in Motherwell on it being shortlisted in the STEM team of the year category of the 2017 TES School Awards, which celebrate the innovation and commitment shown by teachers across the UK; notes that the staff at the school have been recognised for the positive impact they have on the pupils and the community; recognises the importance of teaching STEM subjects to all pupils; believes that, for too long, women have been underrepresented in the STEM sector and that this has helped fuel the gender pay gap; considers that, until there is an equal number of women and men working in that sector, there will remain an untapped potential

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for growth in economy; notes that the awards will be presented in London in June, and wishes Dalziel High School well.

*S5M-05403 Gail Ross: North Highland Cancer Information and Support Centre—That the Parliament commends the North Highland Cancer Information and Support Centre (NHCISC) on the launch of its new advice service, which is specifically targeted at women of working age; understands that working-age women are far more likely to contract a cancer than men in the same age group; notes the profound implications that cancer has on family life; welcomes the NHCISC adding this to its range of services, and congratulates it on its proactive attitude to assisting women who find themselves in need of support.

*S5M-05401 Miles Briggs: Macmillan Cancer Support—That the Parliament welcomes the publication of a report from Macmillan Cancer Support, *No Regrets*, which looks at ways of improving end-of-life care, which includes talking more openly about the subject; notes that almost two-thirds of people surveyed think that death is not talked about enough; understands that the report also suggests that, with the right support, 64% of people with a terminal cancer would like to die at home, but that only 30% currently do, and that although only 1% indicated that they would like to die in hospital, 38% currently do; notes that it also highlights the charity's project, Building on the Best, which aims for earlier conversations involving people and their families about their care so they can be part of each decision and emphasises the importance of anticipatory care planning; commends all of the country's cancer and palliative care charities on what it considers their outstanding efforts to provide world-class support and care, and believes that this new report is a positive and important contribution to the debate regarding how people with terminal conditions can be better supported, in charge of their care and allowed to die in the location of their choice.

*S5M-05400 Mark Ruskell: Air Pollution Crisis—That the Parliament welcomes the decision of the High Court of Justice to order the UK Government to publish its draft air pollution strategy by 9 May 2017; believes that the draft strategy was initially to be published by 24 April 2017, but that the UK Government sought to delay the publication until after the General Election on 8 June 2017; understands that the new strategy was requested last year, after a court ruled that existing measures to tackle air pollution proposed by the government did not meet the requirements of law; notes that the decision is the latest in a series of legal actions brought against the government by Client Earth, a group of environmental lawyers, who began proceedings after the UK breached EU limits for nitrogen dioxide (NO2) in the air, and calls on the UK Government, the Scottish Government and other devolved administrations to ensure that extensive and immediate action is taken to tackle the air pollution crisis, which is killing 40,000 people in the UK each year.

*S5M-05398 Kate Forbes: Affordable Housing Plans from the Staffin Community

Trust—That the Parliament congratulates Staffin Community Trust (SCT) on its application to build six affordable houses on common land in Staffin, north Skye, following a study that suggested that depopulation could lead to the village's primary school having no pupils within a decade; agrees that, against this backdrop, building new homes to encourage families to stay and new ones to settle is vital; believes that, if granted, it will be the first development of its kind on Skye since the late 1990s; acknowledges that the SCT has worked closely on this with Highlands Small Communities Housing Trust and the Lochalsh and Skye Housing Association; understands that the process was supported by the Scottish Government's Rural Housing Fund and the Scottish Land Fund, and believes that, in order for the Highlands to flourish, affordable and sustainable housing is needed to encourage people to settle there.

Proposals for Members' Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
