*<u>S5M-08003</u> Annie Wells: Raising Awareness of Diabulimia—That the Parliament notes the work being carried out to raise public awareness of diabulimia, which is a little known, but extremely dangerous, eating disorder among people with Type 1 diabetes (T1D), who avoid taking their insulin in an attempt to lose weight; understands that, due to its unique nature, it is not officially recognised as a medical condition and that, consequently, many people do not receive the support that they need; notes that it impacts on men and women in Glasgow and across the country; understands that, in the UK, an estimated 40% of young women aged 15-30 with T1D have the condition, and notes the calls for a greater understanding of diabulimia and the provision of new and improved specialist support.

*S5M-08029 Gil Paterson: Clydebank Pupils' Soup Kitchen Wins Award—That the Parliament congratulates St Peter the Apostle High School pupils on receiving a Queen's Award for Voluntary Services for the running of their soup kitchen volunteer project; notes that the Lord Lieutenant for Dunbartonshire, Michael Gregory OBE, presented the medal to John Sangster, principal teacher for pupil support, and pupils in a ceremony in Clydebank Town Hall; welcomes that the pupils collected donations of food, toiletries and clothes to assist The Mother Teresa Missionaries of Charity based in Glasgow, and have spent time at the Bellgrove and Salvation Army hostels distributing hot soup, food, toiletries and clothes to the men who live there, and also took the time to talk to residents; believes that it is positive for West Dunbartonshire Council to have a school under its authority that is praised so highly, and notes that the school has been running the project since 2013, has received a Provost Civic Award and was the runner-up for the Young Scot Award in 2015.

<u>S5W-11702</u> Richard Lochhead: To ask the Scottish Government whether the UK Government has asked it to be a formal consultation body regarding ship-to-ship licensing applications in Scotland's waters.

<u>S5W-11703</u> Richard Lochhead: To ask the Scottish Government what action it can take to ensure that ship-to-ship oil transfers do not proceed in areas where communities have raised ecological concerns.
