**S5M-15011** Gordon Lindhurst: Remembering the Korean War—That the Parliament remembers the UK service personnel who fought and died in the Korean War, including the thousands of veterans who were held as prisoners; notes that 2018 saw the 65th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice on 27 July 1953 between representatives of the UN Command, the Korean People's Army and the Chinese People's Volunteer Army, which put into place the demilitarized zone close to the 38th parallel and a cease-fire that brought to an end the armed conflict that had lasted since June 1950; recognises that almost 100,000 British troops fought in the war, with more than 1,000, including over 230 Scots, losing their lives and that around 1,000 were taken prisoner; acknowledges that many veterans have expressed the feeling that they were part of a "forgotten" war and have said that, on return home, people did not want to hear their story; welcomes the Scottish Korean War Memorial, which was opened on 27 June 2000 in the Bathgate Hills, West Lothian; appreciates the project, West Lothian and the Forgotten War, which was set up in 2008 and worked for two years with veterans and children from a school in the area to educate the young people about the campaign; recognises the recent action taken by West Lothian Council to install more signage in relation to the memorial, and notes the calls by the Korean War Memorial Trust for Transport Scotland to place signage on the M8 and M9 so that veterans and visitors can more easily access the site.

## **Motions for Debate**

\*S5M-15126 Christina McKelvie: Demonstrating Leadership in Human Rights—That the Parliament reaffirms its long-standing commitment to human rights and human dignity and to the principles of equality, democracy and the rule of law; notes with approval that 2018 is the 70th anniversary of the adoption by the UN of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights; further notes similarly that Scotland has enjoyed 20 years of the vitally-important human rights safeguards that are contained in the Human Rights Act 1998 and the Scotland Act 1998; expresses its wish that all of Scotland should work in concert to promote and vindicate human rights for all, keeping pace with progressive international standards and demonstrating global leadership; notes the publication on Human Rights Leadership; welcomes the report and recommendations of the Equalities and Human Rights Committee, which was published on 26 November 2018, following the human rights inquiry that it carried out, and agrees that the Scotlish Government should now take action, in partnership with civil society, the Parliament and all parties, to ensure that Scotland continues to lead by example across the full spectrum of civil, political, economic, social, cultural and environmental rights.

## Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

\*<u>S5M-15125</u> Colin Smyth: Unemployment Rise in Dumfries and Galloway—That the Parliament expresses its concern at the latest unemployment figures for Dumfries and Galloway, which were published by the Office of National Statistics and show that there are 2,130 people in the region claiming out-of-work benefits; understands that this means there are now 650 more people claiming out of work benefits compared with November 2017; further understands that Dumfries and Galloway is the lowest paid region in the whole of the UK and that the region has suffered a number of economic shocks over the last year, including the closures of Pinney's in Annan, the move of the Edinburgh Woollen Mill headquarters from Langholm to Carlisle and the closure of M Corson's four bakery shops; notes the view that urgent action is required by both the UK and Scottish governments to increase skills, tackle low pay and create jobs by providing funding immediately for the Borderlands Growth Deal; further notes the suggestion that Motions & Questions Gluasadan agus Ceistean Legislation Reachdas

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the Parliament must listen to local communities, as well as to both Dumfries and Galloway and Scottish Borders Council in setting up a strong and transformational South of Scotland Enterprise Agency, which must ensure that Dumfries and Galloway receives a fair share of infrastructure funding so that investment can be made into the A7, A75, A76 and A77 to allow for economic benefits to be unlocked, and notes the argument that investment must be made in digital connectivity to give a boost to rural economies, and that cuts to local councils must end to allow Dumfries and Galloway Council's economic development service to continue its work with communities and local businesses in growing the local economy, creating jobs and implementing the council's Regional Economic Strategy.

\*<u>S5M-15128</u> Annabelle Ewing: Congratulations to Fife Sailability—That the Parliament notes the success of Fife Sailability on being awarded £18,000 from sportscotland's latest Sports Facility Fund funding round; further notes that this will allow the club, which is based at Lochore Meadows, to purchase a power boat adapted to allow disabled people to enjoy access to water; notes that this will allow for an extra 600 one-hour sessions; congratulates Fife Sailability on the excellent work that it does for the local community, and wishes it continued success in the future.

\*<u>S5M-15127</u> Rona Mackay: School Raises £3,186 at Christmas Fayre—That the Parliament recognises the impressive efforts of staff, pupils and parents of Lenzie Meadow Primary School in East Dunbartonshire who have raised an incredible £3,186 for school funds at their Christmas fayre, and notes that this fantastic event was organised by the school's Parent and Teacher Association who have thanked everyone involved for making the event so successful.

# **Members' Bills Proposals**

## **Proposals for Members' Bills**

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
