*<u>S5M-15207</u> John Mason: Christmas Day—That the Parliament notes that 25 December marks Christmas Day and is celebrated by Christians as the birth day of Jesus, whom they believe was born without Mary and Joseph having sexual relations and was both completely human and completely divine; acknowledges that Christians believe that Jesus lived for some 33 years in what was then Roman-occupied territory and fulfilled his main purpose of dying by crucifixion in order to pay for the sins of past and future generations; considers that Christianity has had a huge impact in Scotland over many centuries and that this faith has a valid place in present day society and will continue to do so in future, and wishes everyone well as Christians celebrate this important day in their calendar.

*<u>S5M-15206</u> Monica Lennon: Network Rail Removes Toilet Charges—That the Parliament welcomes Network Rail's proposals to scrap toilet charges at Glasgow Central and Edinburgh Waverley station from 1 April 2019, removing the charge of up to 50p per person to use the facilities; understands that Network Rail manages 20 major train stations across the UK, and has previously scrapped charges at Leeds, Manchester Piccadilly and Liverpool Lime Street; believes that this action is part of a series of improvements being made to stations, which also include installing water fountains and investing in more help points, to make them more accessible, and also welcomes the steps toward providing free access to period products in station toilets.

John Willie carried out two years' national service in the RAF, where he was part of the mountain rescue team; further understands that he then went on to complete his BSc degree at the University in Glasgow, where he played shinty with distinction, winning Littlejohn Vase medals and the Southern League title, as well as being awarded a Blue; notes that, following this, he had a career in teaching for 33 years at Inverness Royal Academy, Millburn Academy and Crown Primary School; further notes John's contribution to shinty's history through written accounts of the Lochcarron, Inverness and Strathglass clubs, in addition to being a broadcaster reporting and commentating on the playing side of the game for the BBC from 1968 to 1991; believes that he is rightfully seen as one of the most significant figures in the world of shinty in the 20th century, and passes its condolences to his wife, Margaret, his older sister, Mairi, his son, Donald, his daughter, Shona, his five grandchildren, Eilidh, Rory, Peter, Hannah and Catherine, and his extended family and friends in Skye and elsewhere.

*S5M-15200 Clare Adamson: Assistant Chief Officer Lewis Ramsay Awarded The Queen's Fire Service Medal—That the Parliament congratulates Assistant Chief Officer (ACO) Lewis Ramsay on receiving the Outstanding Contribution to Fire and Rescue Service award at the Excellence in Fire Emergency Awards held in London recently; recognises that ACO Ramsay joined the fire service in 1989 as a firefighter and went on to become an officer, carrying out operational roles that were associated with health and safety, training, operations and personnel; further recognises that, with his promotion to ACO in 2008, he has become a champion of community work safety, where he has dedicated much of his professional and personal time to initiatives aimed at fire prevention and saving lives; notes that he has been instrumental in implementing the recommendations in the Scottish Government's Scotland Together Report, which has led to the forming of a partnership unit to encourage agencies to work together to improve safety; understands that this has led to the fire service experiencing the lowest number of fire deaths and casualties recorded in its history, and wishes ACO Ramsay well in all future endeavours. **R**

*S5M-15199 Kenneth Gibson: 80th Anniversary of the Launch of Kindertransport—That the Parliament commemorates the 80th anniversary of the initiation of the Kindertransport programme, which brought close to 10,000 unaccompanied child refugees escaping violence against Jews to the UK in December 1938; considers that, following Kristallnacht on 9 November that year, Jewish leaders in London petitioned the then Home Secretary, Sir Samuel Hoare, to rescue children, and it was decided that an unspecified number of Jewish children would come to the UK temporarily as refugees until the end of hostilities; understands that most of the children travelled from Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, and the Free City of Danzig, to be fostered in the UK; notes that the very last transport from the continent, with 74 children, left the Netherlands on 14 May 1940 and travelled to Harwich, as occupation of the Netherlands was imminent with the country capitulating the next day; further notes that, sadly, often children who came to the UK did not later reunite with families as their parents had been murdered by the Nazis or their collaborators; recognises that, during the war years, many Kindertransport children served in the British armed forces, nursing professions, in food production and in war-related industries; further recognises that several thousand remained in the UK when the war ended, and, as adults, made considerable contributions to the development of their adopted country; is aware of what it considers to be Germany's belated decision to give an estimated 1,000 elderly survivors, half of whom still reside

in the UK, a very modest €2,500 (£2,249) each in compensation for their suffering, and recognises the warmth of Scotland's contribution to supporting child victims of the Holocaust and Nazi persecution.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
