*<u>S5M-10278</u> James Dornan: Save the Hampden Roar Campaign—That the Parliament notes the *Evening Times*' campaign, Save the Hampden Roar, to retain Hampden Park as the home of Scottish football; understands that the SFA is to make a decision on whether it will renew the lease of the national stadium; recognises that Hampden Park has been the country's home football ground since 1903 when it was opened as the largest stadium in the world; highlights that it has played host to countless memorable international and club football games, including being the venue of the 1960 European Cup final where Real Madrid defeated Eintracht Frankfurt 7-3, and the scene of the famous Zinedine Zidane goal in the 2002 Champions League final; looks forward to the stadium showcasing four matches at the 2020 European Championships; notes that, in addition to football matches, Hampden Park has held other major sporting events, including for the 2014 Commonwealth Games, and been the venue for major concerts; acknowledges the significant economic benefit that it believes Hampden Park brings locally and to the wider Glasgow area; notes the comments by the Glasgow City Council leader, Councillor Susan Aitken, that the case for the national stadium to retain its Glasgow home of 115 years is compelling, and further notes the calls on the SFA to commit its future to Hampden Park.

*<u>S5M-10281</u> Gordon MacDonald: UK's Inflation Rate Nearly Double the EU's—That the Parliament notes the international inflation figures for December 2017 from Eurostat and ONS, which it understands highlight that UK inflation, at 3.0%, is almost double the 1.7% EU inflation rate for the same period, using the standard Harmonised Index of Consumer Prices; understands that UK inflation has been substantially higher than the EU for the whole of 2016 and 2017; considers that this is in part due to the reduction of the value of Sterling following the Brexit referendum in 2016, and believes that people in Scotland are facing higher inflation than their European cousins despite voting by a margin of 62% to 38% to remain in the EU.

*<u>S5M-10279</u> Pauline McNeill: Increase in Homeless Refugees—That the Parliament is concerned regarding the increase in homeless refugees in Scotland in recent years; understands that, in 2014-15, the Scottish charity, Refugee Survival Trust, gave out 336 grants, while in 2017, it was more than 1,000 for the first time; believes there needs to be reform of the asylum system so that fewer individuals and families fall through the gaps in the system and find themselves destitute; understands that homeless refugees face particular difficulties outside the immigration system with no access to work or housing, and agrees with Owen Fenn, manager of Govan Community Project, that the Home Office's agenda "continues to punish the most vulnerable in our society".

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.

As soon as a Public Bill (i.e. a Government, Committee or Member's Bill) has completed Stage 1, amendments for consideration at Stage 2 may be lodged; and as soon as Stage 2 is completed, amendments for Stage 3 consideration may be lodged. The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
