#### Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

\*S5M-10407 Stewart Stevenson: Electronic and Internet Voting—That the Parliament acknowledges that there is an increasingly wide spectrum of applications for digital technology, including those related to internet shopping, banking, travel and automated supermarket checkouts; understands that the latest digital technology has the potential to be developed for electronic and internet voting and deliver electors flexibility in their choice of voting method; considers that the traditional paper voting method has remained virtually unchanged since 1872 and has yet to benefit from advancements in technology; notes the calls by the Institution of Engineering and Technology for government to embrace the latest knowledge in electronic voting, which it believes will encourage more young people in the Banffshire and Buchan Coast constituency and across Scotland to vote and help reduce the costs of the traditional paper voting system; recognises that there are important security considerations relating to confidentiality and eligibility that must first be resolved; believes that when these issues are resolved and public confidence is earned, electronic voting has the potential to deliver lower cost elections and improve voter turnout; acknowledges what it sees as the opportunity presented by the Scottish Government's consultation on electoral reform to further investigate the potential benefits of electronic and internet voting systems, and notes the calls on individuals and organisations to take part.

\*S5M-10404 Alex Neil: Dog Attack Figures—That the Parliament expresses its concern at figures obtained by a recent *Clyde News* investigation, which suggest that, between January and June 2017, 205 children were taken to A&E due to dog bites; understands that the number of people receiving treatment for such bites in Scotland has risen from 1,939 in 2015 to 2,027 in 2016 and that, in the first six months of 2017, 1,057 children and adults in the NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde area went to hospital; considers these figures to be very worrying, and notes calls for a post-legislative review of the Control of Dogs (Scotland) Act 2010, including the degree to which the Act is being effectively enforced by local authorities.

\*S5M-10402 Tom Arthur: Eliminating Hepatitis C in Scotland: A Call to Action—That the Parliament notes the publication of the report, *Eliminating Hepatitis C in Scotland: A Call to Action*,

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by the Hepatitis C Trust; understands that this follows an inquiry supported by a cross-party group of hepatitis C parliamentary champions; believes that Scotland has an ambitious commitment to eliminate the condition by 2030, which an estimated 34,500 people in the country have, 40% of whom are undiagnosed; recognises the challenges to achieving elimination; believes that the report makes a positive contribution to achieving this through both identifying barriers to treatment and making recommendations, and looks forward to a future where hepatitis C is eliminated and no longer a public health concern for people in Renfrewshire South and across Scotland.

#### Other new and altered motions and amendments

\*S5M-10423 Tom Mason: Kaimhill Primary School—That the Parliament congratulates the pupils of Kaimhill Primary School on being the Scottish winners of the LitFilmFest award for their short film, which demonstrates the importance of internet safety; acknowledges that the Litfilm award is run in partnership with A Tale Unfolds to increase literacy among young people through the medium of film; recognises that by winning this award, the pupils were given the opportunity to shoot a professional video to increase the production values of their short film, and wishes the pupils all the best.

\*S5M-10422 Neil Bibby: Renfewshire Council Calls for the Health Secretary to Reverse RAH Kids Ward Closure Decision—That the Parliament notes that, at a special meeting of Renfrewshire Council held on 8 February 2018, a motion was passed by councillors from the Labour, Conservative, Liberal Democrat and independent groups calling for the Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport to reverse her decision made on 19 January 2018 to close the Children's Ward at the Royal Alexandra Hospital (RAH) in Paisley, and endorses this call.

\*S5M-10421 Kenneth Gibson: Inaugural Burns Supper at Garnock Community

Campus—That the Parliament commends the pupils and staff of Garnock Community Campus on successfully organising their first-ever Burns Supper, which took place on 25 January 2018 and was supported by the local community; understands that the entire school was involved in providing the entertainment as the S1 pupil, Logan Aikman, addressed the haggis and the S3 pupil, Hannah Morley, recited the Selkirk Grace, while the former Head of English, John Hodgart, delivered the Immortal Memory; recognises that the Garnock Community Campus ceilidh band provided musical accompaniment to the meal and that many other pupils performed Burns songs in celebration of the Bard's works; congratulates the S6 pupil, Angus MacDonald, on piping in the haggis, which was provided by a local butcher and ceremoniously presented by the S1 pupil, Luke Stalker; notes that pupils were also instrumental to the smooth running of the event, as S2 pupils provided high-quality table service and home economics students prepared the meal, which was enjoyed by all, and wishes Garnock Community Campus every success in turning its outstanding Burns Supper into an annual event.

\*S5M-10416 Stewart Stevenson: My Future Aspirations Art Competition—That the Parliament congratulates the 15 pupils from schools across the north east in reaching the final of the My Future Aspirations art competition; notes that the winner, Jessica Broadrick, is a pupil at Portlethen Academy; further notes that the competition finalist, Ryan Baxter, is from Banff Academy; understands that the competition challenges S1 and S2 pupils from across Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire to create a self-portrait that illustrates personal aspirations for future learning, development and career choices; understands that DYW North East and Thorpe Molloy worked together to showcase the aspirations of young people more publically; acknowledges that the competition complements the curriculum for excellence capacities of being a responsible citizen and effective contributor; notes that it has been running since 2009 and celebrates pupils' artistic talent, creativity and inclusion; commends everyone involved in the competition, and wishes them further success in the future.

\*S5M-10415 Gail Ross: Brora Rangers in the Fifth Round of the Scottish Cup—That the Parliament congratulates the club and supporters of Brora Rangers FC on making it to the fifth round of the Scottish Cup, where it will meet Kilmarnock FC; notes that the team has a very large

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group of locals travelling from Sutherland to Kilmarnock to support their team on 10 February 2018; further notes that this is the first time that the Highland League team has made it to the fifth round of the cup, and wishes both teams and their supporters a fantastic game of football.

\*S5M-10414 Monica Lennon: STUC Women's Committee Research, Menopause and the Workplace—That the Parliament congratulates the STUC Women's Committee on publishing its research, Menopause and the Workplace; commends what it sees as this groundbreaking work; understands that most woman go through the menopause between 48 and 55 and that symptoms can last for over 10 years; believes that Scottish Government data confirms that, since 2008, there has been a 5.5% increase in the employment rates of women aged 50 to 64; is concerned therefore that 99% of the survey's respondents said that their workplace did not have a menopause policy or that they were unaware if one existed; acknowledges that 95% said they would welcome a model policy being developed by the Women's Committee; notes that some respondents described how menopausal symptoms affected their concentration and performance, including through hot flushes that can result in frustration, discomfort and distraction, and heavy periods, which can necessitate clothing changes and trips home; notes the committee's view that employers need to increase their awareness and understanding to ensure that reasonable adjustments are in place to support employees, and calls on the Scottish Government to recognise and support the committee in its drive to improve the experience of women at work who are going through the menopause and to take further action to address the gender inequalities that it believes women face in the workplace.

\*S5M-10413 Annie Wells: Mary Barbour Statue in Glasgow—That the Parliament acknowledges that Glasgow City Council, with the help from campaigning from the Remember Mary Barbour Association, is to unveil a statue honouring the formidable campaigner, and radical social pioneer, Mary Barbour, on 8 March 2018, which also marks International Women's Day (IWD); notes that Mary and her supporters exposed and protested against unscrupulous landlords who tried to hike-up rents to took advantage of war-time poverty and who threatened to evict people unable to pay; acknowledges that "Mary Barbour's Army" succeeded in forcing a change in the rent legislation; notes that Mary campaigned throughout her life for improvements to working people's housing and social conditions, and believe that her role in history chimes perfectly with this year's IWD official hashtag, #PressforProgress.

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\*S5M-10411 Jamie Greene: Bermuda's Decision to Repeal Same-sex Marriage—That the Parliament notes with concern Bermuda's reported decision to repeal same-sex marriage legislation, becoming the first country in the world to do so; understands that the bill was approved following its parliament passing the legislation to do so in December 2017; notes that same-sex couples already married will not have their status annulled but any future couples seeking legal status will only be offered a domestic partnership; believes that this is an unfortunate and significant regression in reaching the goal of global LGBTI+ equality; hopes that the people of Bermuda, its parliament and its government will reconsider this decision in the future and reintroduce same-sex marriage; expresses its support to Bermudian LGBTI+ people; understands that the Prime Minister and UK Foreign Office have expressed disappointment with the decision, notwithstanding that it was a decision made by the country's democratically elected parliament, and hopes that the examples of commitment to marriage equality in other jurisdictions will act as a catalyst to encourage the government of Bermuda to reconsider its position on this move and work towards future LGBTI+ equality.

\*S5M-10410 lain Gray: Dunbar Grammar School Tackles Period Poverty—That the Parliament welcomes the launch of Dunbar Grammar School's new Red Box initiative, which aims to help young women who are struggling to afford sanitary products; notes that the project, which has been developed in conjunction with East Lothian Foodbank and Dunbar and East Linton Area Partnership, makes red boxes containing sanitary towels, tampons and spare underwear available for pupils to access discretely at the school via a nominated member of staff; understands that the initiative takes inspiration from the Red Box Project for tackling period poverty, which started in Portsmouth in 2017and has since spread to towns and cities across the UK; commends the school, food bank and the area partnership for taking this important lead on period poverty, and looks forward to it being expanded to other schools.

\*S5M-10403 Pauline McNeill: Growing Household Debt—That the Parliament notes data from UK Finance, which suggests that the value of outstanding personal loans in the UK has grown four times faster than wages and that, in 2016-17, households had outstanding loans worth £37 billion in total; understands that Christians against Poverty has said that January 2018 was its busiest ever month for helping people seeking debt advice; believes that the £3.7 billion owed on personal loans in the UK was equivalent to £1,384 per household in 2016-17, with the regions that have seen the lowest increases in median pay for full-time workers also experiencing the largest increases in unsecured personal loans, and that unsecured lending amounts has increase by more than 25% in more than half of postcode areas; considers that these figures represent the tip of the iceberg, as they do not include other forms of debt, such as payday loans and car finance; believes that warnings from the Bank of England that sharp rises in household debt pose a danger to the economy should be listened to; considers that this issue further illustrates the serious economic difficulties faced by a great many, and calls on the Poverty and Inequality Commission to recognise that these findings represent a large number of people who are one large bill or missed month of pay from finding themselves in serious financial difficulty.
