*<u>S5M-10587</u> James Dornan: Pollokshaws Methodist Parish Church Job Club—That the Parliament congratulates the Pollokshaws Methodist Parish Church Jobs Club on its work; notes that it is part of Christians Against Poverty (CAP), which works with people from all faiths and none and all ethnic backgrounds; thanks its volunteers; understands that, since it was established in September 2014, it has become the biggest CAP-run club in the UK, has worked with over 800 people and assisted more than 260 into work, many of whom had been unemployed for over 20 years, with over 200 finding long-term employment; believes that 95% of its referrals are from the DWP and that over 75% of its participants are aged between 55 and 63; understands however that, although many of the people referred to it have been signed-off as fit for work, in many cases they are clearly unable to do so and consequently struggle to find jobs; welcomes what it sees as the great service that the club provides, and notes the view that it should be used as an example for others to follow.

*S5M-10578 Christine Grahame: Peebles and Hendaye Celebrate 20 Years of

Twinning—That the Parliament congratulates Peebles and the French town of Hendaye on the 20th anniversary of their twinning partnership; notes that a charter was signed in Peebles on 20 February 1998 to establish a link between Peebles and Hendaye, which is situated in the Basque region of south-west France; supports the principles behind town twinning arrangements between Scottish communities and others across the EU; welcomes the contribution that it considers town twinning arrangements make in developing social, cultural, sporting and educational links across the EU, and wishes the Peebles-Hendaye Twinning Association every success for the next twenty years of its partnership with Hendaye.

*<u>S5M-10577</u> Jackie Baillie: End Stop-skipping on ScotRail Services—That the Parliament notes calls on the ScotRail Alliance to introduce immediate measures to reduce the level of stopskipping on rail services in Dumbarton, Vale of Leven, Helensburgh and across Scotland; believes that there has been an increase in complaints regarding stop-skipping from passengers since Abellio won the ScotRail franchise; understands that this practice used to be a much rarer occurrence during times of large-scale disruption on the network but considers that its usage has expanded to cope with relatively minor delays; further considers that parts of the network are disproportionately affected, particularly the Balloch and Helensburgh lines; believes that it was a mistake not to include standards on stop-skipping in the terms of service for the franchise, and notes calls on the Minister for Transport and the Islands to ensure that ScotRail implements a clear and robust framework to dramatically reduce the level of stop-skipping and seek reassurances that the practice will be abolished at stations where the impact on passengers is greatest.
