*S5M-12861 Rhoda Grant: Review of Government Fol Handling and Record Keeping—That the Parliament notes the concerns raised on Scottish Government transparency in the intervention report from the Scottish Information Commissioner; notes the key findings that the Scottish Government's Fol policies and procedures are not clear enough regarding the role of special advisers in responding to Fol requests; believes that the Scottish Government takes longer to respond to journalists' Fol requests than other requests; considers that a number of areas have been highlighted for action, including clearance procedures, quality assurance of Fol responses, training, case handling and case records management, monitoring Fol requests and review procedures, and calls for an independent review of both Fol handling and the recording of information from meetings.

*S5M-12856 Anas Sarwar: Access to Vital Medicines—That the Parliament calls on the Scottish Government, as a matter of urgency, to bring NHS National Services Scotland, the Scottish Medicines Consortium and the relevant pharmaceutical companies together to deliver access to the life-prolonging medicines, Perjeta and Orkambi, for patients in Scotland who need them; notes the commitment that was made by the Scottish Government in December 2016, following the Review of Access to New Medicines (the Montgomery Review), to improve ways of negotiating with drug companies on the cost of medicines, and calls for a new system of negotiation to be implemented now.

*<u>S5M-12862</u> Lewis Macdonald: Hanover Street School, Aberdeen, UK Champions—That the Parliament congratulates Hanover Street School, which is in Aberdeen, on being named UK Champions at the Better Energy School Awards and winning the £5,000 top prize at a ceremony that was held at London Zoo on 14 June 2018; understands that it won this recognition for its

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project, HSS Flying Eco Pigs Change the World!, which sent out environmentally-friendly messages on the wings of flying papier-mâché pigs, which were then given to businesses that agreed to the pupils' requests to stop providing single-use items, such as plastic straws and cutlery; recognises that the awards are a nationwide competition for 5- to 11-year-olds and were launched in 2007 by the Young People's Trust for the Environment in partnership with Total; notes that they are designed to generate interest in the environment and raise awareness of the need for sustainable energy sources; commends the hard work of all the staff and pupils at the school, and welcomes the contribution that they have made to ensuring that Aberdeen is a more environmentally-friendly city.

The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
