S5M-10364 Monica Lennon: Incinerators, Public Health and Planning in Scotland—That the Parliament recognises the important role of the planning system in making decisions about future developments and the use of land in communities; believes that planning decisions should always strive to enhance communities and create high-quality, sustainable places that support the health and wellbeing of current and future generations; understands that planning applications for incineration and energy-from-waste proposals are attracting high levels of opposition from the public and that concerns over public health, traffic, safety and impact on residential amenity are commonly raised as grounds for objection by residents in Lanarkshire, as well as other parts of Scotland; agrees that increasing community engagement in the planning process is important and is concerned that the public does not feel adequately informed or reassured when presented with incineration and energy-from-waste proposals; understands that, at a local and regional level, there is apparent widespread public and political opposition to incineration and energy-from-waste planning applications, leading to concerns that Scottish Planning Policy and the statutory planning process is not affording sufficient protection to communities, and notes the calls, as a matter of public interest, on the Scottish Government to update the Parliament on the latest public health information and research that is available on incineration and energy-from-waste technologies, including the impacts on human health and how this informs the Scottish Government's Zero Waste Plan and the expectations of everyone involved in the planning process. \*S5M-10966 Kenneth Gibson: How Polygamy Threatens Global Stability—That the Parliament considers that polygamy, and specifically polygyny, is profoundly detrimental, not only for the individuals involved, but also for the stability of wider society; is aware that the fragile states index, compiled by the Fund for Peace, shows that polygamy is extant in the 20 most violent counties, from Somalia to Niger; understands that scarcity of women leads to a situation in which men with money, skills and education will marry, whereas poor, unskilled and illiterate men are unlikely to, particularly in bride price societies where wealth is unevenly distributed; takes heed of

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research by Yale University, which suggests that polygamous societies experience higher rates of murder, theft, rape, social disruption, kidnapping, sexual slavery and prostitution, as young men struggle to acquire the necessary bride price through legitimate and often illegitimate means, while those with such means may use violence to secure their position, with women and children often the victims; believes there is a link between polygyny and terrorism, whereby terrorists groups such as ISIS and Boko Haram in Nigeria recruit using the promise of arranged marriages for those who would otherwise be unable to find a bride, which in turn leads to instability in society: understands that polygyny is deeply damaging to women, as the quality of their marriage is unlikely to be high and brides are often poorly educated and far younger than their husbands; considers that women are placed in a dangerous situation in polygamous societies, such as in South Sudan, where nearly 80% of people believe it is acceptable for a husband to beat his wife during a minor domestic disagreement; notes that a study of 240,000 children in 29 African countries found that, after controlling for other factors, those in polygamous families were more likely to die young, and encourages the UN to press countries worldwide to adopt marriage systems that protect human rights, encourage stability and equality and are more equitable and harmonious for women, children and men.

# **Members' Bills Proposals**

# **Proposals for Members' Bills**

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.

The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
