*S5M-11269 Gordon MacDonald: Ratho Medical Practice to Open—That the Parliament welcomes the news that Ratho Medical Practice will be opening its new premises at 11 Wilkieston Road on 16 April 2018; notes that the last working day in the surgery at Baird Road will be 13 April; appreciates that a duty doctor is available to deal with urgent problems on 13 April and the morning of 16 April during the transition period; appreciates that the practice will be extended to provide improved accommodation for the community to meet the demand for healthcare services from the growing local population; further appreciates that the new Ratho Medical Practice will see an increase in capacity, will have five consultation rooms, one treatment room, a waiting area and a staff meeting room, and recognises the efforts of the community in its long campaign for this new practice.

*S5M-11268 Gordon MacDonald: St Wilfrid's Way—That the Parliament recognises the great pilgrimage route, St Wilfrid's Way, which runs through Colinton, Kingsknowe and Longstone, on its route from Hexham to Edinburgh via Rosslyn Chapel and culminating in St Andrews; notes that St Wilfrid's Way is managed by the Way of St Andrews, an initiative dedicated to the revival of the ancient pilgrimage to St Andrews; understands that friends, families and groups go on pilgrimages as an activity to improve their wellbeing while trying new experiences; considers that the appetite for long distance walking is growing and, with Scotland's outstanding scenery, this provides ideal locations for this activity, and believes that the many long distance walks, such as St Wilfrid's Way, are a valuable contribution to Scottish tourism.

*S5M-11267 John Mason: Death of Sudan, Last Male Northern White Rhino—That the Parliament notes with sadness the news that the last male northern white rhino has died in Kenya at the age of 45; understands that Sudan passed away following his condition "worsening significantly", which meant that he could no longer stand; deplores the actions of poachers that have led the species to the brink of extinction; believes that Sudan was the last of his kind to be born in the wild; believes that the case of Sudan and the northern white rhinos highlight the negative impact that humankind can have on the many animal species with whom they share the planet, and also the importance of redoubling efforts to conserve species that are in danger of extinction, and hopes that the attempts to use IVF to save the northern white rhinos will meet with success.

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*S5M-11266 John Mason: Anti-racism March—That the Parliament welcomes that a march against racism organised by Stand Up To Racism (SUTR) took place in Glasgow on 17 March 2018; notes that members from throughout Scotland of the Confederation of Friends of Israel Scotland (COFIS) sought to participate in the march in order to oppose antisemitism; regrets, however, that COFIS members were reportedly blocked from taking part in the main march by demonstrators who appeared to be against any participants sympathetic towards Israel; considers that criticism of Israeli policies and antisemitism can be easily confused and difficult to distinguish from each other; regretfully believes that this and other events suggest that antisemitism is alive in Scotland in 2018, and calls on everyone to reflect on their attitudes towards Israel and the Jewish community in Scotland.

*S5M-11265 Gordon Lindhurst: UK and EU Stand Together Against Russia—That the Parliament welcomes the outcome of the first day of the European Council summit, during which, it believes, it was made clear that the UK and EU stand shoulder-to-shoulder in the face of security threats; understands that the European Council has condemned the nerve agent attack in Salisbury and has agreed with the conclusion that it is "highly likely" that Russia was to blame; believes that, as a result, the EU has recalled its ambassador to Russia to consult regarding the attack; considers that such attacks harm the fundamental rules-based system that the UK and its international partners are built upon; believes that the UK and EU share joint values, which will continue to be shared into the future, and looks forward to continuing a strong relationship with Europe based on common interests, such as security and trade.

*S5M-11262 Daniel Johnson: March for Our Lives: Edinburgh—That the Parliament commends the March for Our Lives: Edinburgh protesters taking to the streets on 24 March 2018; notes that the march is one of over 800 worldwide showing solidarity with the Parkland students' campaign to end gun violence and mass shootings in schools in the United States; congratulates

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the organisers of the event, Kiara Sarner, Caroline Lill, Nora Washbourne and Beth Monahan Brown, who are from Edinburgh, Phoebe Hancock, from Dundee, and Jennifer Payne, from Glasgow, which is taking place outside the US Consulate in Edinburgh; understands that it will be a family-friendly, peaceful protest, which will include speeches from family members of victims of the Dunblane massacre, as well as poetry and live music, and encourages members of the public to get involved by attending the march.

Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
