S5M-10202 Mary Fee: Celebrating Scotland's Gypsy/Traveller Community—That the Parliament celebrates what it sees as the rich social and cultural contribution that the Gypsy/Traveller community has made to society in Scotland since the 12th century; acknowledges that the Equality and Human Rights Commission has estimated that the country's Gypsy/Traveller population is between 15,000 to 20,000; understands that the term, "Gypsy/Traveller", refers to distinct groups, including Romany Gypsies, Scottish and Irish travellers, and others who regard travelling as being part of their ethnic identity; believes that they experience a variety of issues related to provision of adequate housing and access to public health services, with a much higher proportion rating their health as "bad' or "very bad" compared with the national average; believes that this contributes to a male life expectancy of 55 years, 12 years shorter than the average; understands that they are a disproportionately marginalised and discriminated group and are stigmatised by inaccurate myths and stereotyping about their culture; notes with distress that the most recent statistics from the Scottish Social Attitudes Survey suggests that 31% of people would be "unhappy or very unhappy" about a close relative marrying a Gypsy/Traveller, and that 35% said that a Gypsy/Traveller would be "very/fairly unsuitable" as a primary school teacher, and notes the calls on the Scottish Government to increase its commitment to eliminating discrimination against the Scottish Gypsy/Traveller community in West Scotland and throughout the country through strengthening existing equality legislation and providing greater support for inclusivity and equality training to ensure greater protection.

*S5M-12415 Jamie Greene: Future Potential for Hydrogen Fuel Technology on Scotland's Transport Network—That the Parliament welcomes the announcement by the French train manufacture, Alstom, on 14 May 2018, that it would convert a fleet of Class 321 train carriages to run on hydrogen fuel; understands that this is the first instance in the UK where any trains would be powered using hydrogen technology; recognises that hydrogen generally does not emit CO2 and that its only major exhaust is condensed steam and water; understands that Germany expects to launch the Cordinia iLint model onto its railways this year with a view to rolling them out to its commercial fleet in the coming years, becoming the world's first hydrogen-powered consumer train service: underlines that hydrogen trains do not require full electrification lines and carriages. potentially minimising the potential cost or disruption that occurs in large-scale electrification projects and offering a viable alternative to diesel-driven carriages; notes the view that Scotland's transport strategy must be future-proofed, for the benefit of passengers in the West Scotland region and across the country; further notes the view that investment decisions should take into account the potential that hydrogen fuel can play in rail, marine, aviation and road strategies; understands the significance that this technology could have, and notes the calls for there to be a sensible, wide-ranging conversation at policy and government level on the potential that hydrogen technology can bring to the transport network.

*<u>S5M-12396</u> Neil Findlay: Portugal's Approach to Addressing Record Drug Deaths—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the effectiveness of Portugal's change in drugs policy since 2001, when it decriminalised the possession of all drugs for personal use as a major part of its fight against overdose deaths, HIV infection and drug-related crime; commends its decision to treat possession and the use of small quantities of drugs as a public health concern rather than a criminal matter; understands that, rather than being arrested, people who are caught with a personal supply are given a warning, a small fine or have to appear before a local commission to discuss treatment, harm reduction and support services; believes that, since this policy was introduced, HIV infection rates have fallen from an all-time high in 2000 of 104.2 new cases per million to 4.2 new cases per million in 2015, and that the adult death rate has fallen to three per

million, compared with approximately 78 per million in 2001; understands that the Portuguese policy rests on three pillars, firstly, that there is no such thing as a "soft" or "hard" drug, only healthy and unhealthy relationships with drugs, secondly, that having unhealthy relationships with drugs often conceals users having frayed relationships with loved ones, themselves and the wider world and thirdly, that the eradication of all drugs is an impossible goal, and notes the view that it is essential to learn from this approach in Lothian and across Scotland to effectively address the reported record levels of drugs deaths, which saw 867 users across the country die in 2016.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
