S5M-11582 Fulton MacGregor: Support for Families of Missing People—That the Parliament recognises the suffering of thousands of families across Scotland who have experienced, or will experience, a loved one going missing; understands that, every year, over 30,000 children and adults will be reported missing, of which, thankfully, many will return quickly but that, tragically, others will remain missing for weeks, months or even years; believes that, despite the excellent work of Police Scotland in searching for missing people, the families who are left devastated receive little or no emotional, practical and legal support in coping with the disappearance of their missing loved one; acknowledges the campaign of the family of Sean McKenna, who went missing in Coatbridge in 2017, for more support for families of missing loved ones; further acknowledges the National Missing Person's Framework, which was published by the Scottish Government in 2017; notes the view that this should be implemented in every local authority area, and further notes the calls for more to be done to support the families who are living a nightmare to ensure that every person who is missing a loved one is offered support and help.

*S5M-12425 Rachael Hamilton: The Culture and Heritage Value of Agriculture—That the Parliament notes the importance of the almost 200 agricultural shows that are held across the UK: understands that it is estimated that 10% of the population attends at least one of these events each year; notes that these include the Border Union Agricultural Show in Kelso, which has been held for over 200 years, the Berwickshire Show in Duns, and the Newcastleton, St Boswells and Yarrow shows: believes that these are important for showcasing the best of what the agricultural sector has to offer to people from outwith the farming community, driving up standards and preserving and protecting heritage; understands that many farmers can trace their ancestral links with their land that goes back centuries; believes that farmers are best placed to ensure that their land is productive and sustainable, yet understands that they need to be open to the fresh ideas of new entrants; notes what it sees as the importance of the physical heritage of farming, including farmhouses and steadings and the many ruins and derelict buildings, such as shepherd huts, which can be seen around the country; believes that these derelict sites can pose as monuments to the agricultural past but can also get new leases of life as rural housing, shops, B&Bs and other facilities; notes the contribution made by groups such as the Scottish Association of Young Farmers in preserving traditional customs and practices, organising social events and encouraging people to join or stay in agriculture, and wishes them all the best with this work.

*S5M-12436 Richard Lochhead: New Distillery and Visitor Centre in Moray for The

Macallan—That the Parliament congratulates Edrington on the unveiling of The Macallan's £140 million state-of-the-art distillery and visitor centre at Easter Elchies in Speyside, Moray; notes that the project is part of a £500 million investment by Edrington in its brand and that the distillery was designed by the architects, Rogers Stirk Harbour + Partners, whose other works include the Millennium Dome in Greenwich, the Leadenhall Building in the City of London and the Guggenheim in Helsinki; acknowledges that the new facility was built by the Moray-based company, Robertson, which worked with 25 contractors to bring the vision to reality; understands that it gets 95% of its energy from renewable sources and can produce up to a third more whisky than its predecessor, thanks to having 36 new copper stills, which were built by the Morayfirm, Forsyths; notes that the structure, which is set in the naturally sloping contours of the landscape, includes one of the most complex timber roof structures in the world, which is comprised of 380,000 individual pieces, and has been planted with indigenous grass and wildflowers; believes that this impressive distillery and visitor centre will have a significant positive effect on the area's economy in that it will create 60 new jobs and attract visitors from around the world; notes that Edrington is anticipating that the number of visitors will increase each year; commends the company on its vision in producing what it sees as such a magnificent facility, and looks forward to its public opening on 2 June 2018.

The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
