*<u>S5M-14601</u> Jackie Baillie: Helensburgh Pier Closure—That the Parliament notes the temporary closure of Helensburgh Pier to all marine traffic, following health and safety concerns that were highlighted in a report to Argyll and Bute Council; notes that the director of the Helensburgh and Lomond Chamber of Commerce has called for the pier to be transferred into public ownership; believes that the closure could have a detrimental impact on the area's economy, including the loss of the additional visitors to the town who arrive when the PS Waverley uses the pier, and hopes that the local authority will consider all options to restore the pier, including a community buyout.

*<u>S5M-14600</u> Jenny Gilruth: Allan Bryant, Fifth Anniversary—That the Parliament acknowledges that 2018 marks the fifth anniversary of the disappearance of Allan Bryant, who was last seen outside Styx nightclub in Glenrothes on 3 November 2013; understands that, despite Allan's disappearance being one of the largest police searches ever undertaken in Scotland, he has not been seen since he was captured on CCTV leaving the nightclub in Glenrothes in the early hours after a night out with his friends; notes with disappointment that, despite the appearance of his parents, Allan Bryant Sr and Marie Dugan, on the BBC's *Crimewatch* programme earlier this year, no new information came from the appeal; believes that the family is continuing to remain optimistic, and notes that they have vowed to keep the campaign going as long as it takes to find out what happened to their son.

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*<u>S5M-14599</u> James Dornan: Jeely Piece Club—That the Parliament congratulates the Jeely Piece Club on its recent £10,000 Awards for All Scotland grant, which the group will use to host a three-hour evening community event in Castlemilk woods. **R**

*<u>S5M-14598</u> Anas Sarwar: Oral Cancer in Scotland—That the Parliament believes that increasing rates of mouth and throat cancers in Scotland are a matter of serious concern; considers that the wide variations in oral cancer incidence and survival rates between different areas and social groups in Scotland are unacceptable, with, it understands, someone in Glasgow being twice more likely to be diagnosed with oral cancer than someone in Fife; welcomes the long overdue decision to vaccinate boys in Scotland against HPV and hopes that a gender-neutral vaccination programme can be rolled out without any further delay; applauds the Scottish Government's commitment in its Oral Health Improvement Plan to ensure that the oral cancer clinical pathway across Scotland is safe, consistent, clear and effective, but is concerned regarding the potential impact that the proposed extension of dental recall intervals to 24 months might have on dentists' ability to detect symptoms of oral cancers early; commends the British Dental Association Scotland and the wider dental profession on their work to raise awareness of oral cancer, and urges the Scottish Government, NHS Scotland and other stakeholders to develop sustainable and innovative approaches to oral cancer care and work effectively to improve the prevention, detection and treatment of this condition.

*S5M-14594 Stuart McMillan: Ferguson Secures Contract to Build Air Cushion Barge—That

the Parliament congratulates Ferguson Marine Engineering on securing a contract to build the world's first self-propelled air-cushioned barge; notes that Ferguson will build the 55m by 24m vessel capable of carrying up to a 150-ton payload over tundra, swamps, ice and water for Mangistau ACV Solutions Ltd, which is part of the CMI Offshore Ltd Group; believes that this

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contract will help support shipbuilding jobs in Inverclyde and is further evidence that Ferguson's current diversification strategy is having a hugely positive impact on the business; understands that these types of contracts are essential in helping secure the long-term future of the yard, and thanks the Scottish Government for its continued support for shipbuilding on the Clyde.

*S5M-14593 Kenneth Gibson: Acquittal of Asia Bibi—That the Parliament welcomes the decision by the Supreme Court of Pakistan to overturn the death sentence of Asia Bibi, a Christian woman convicted of blasphemy in 2010 who has spent most of the last eight years in solitary confinement; understands that the conviction stemmed from an argument Asia Bibi had with a group of women in June 2009 while harvesting fruit, after the women said that they could no longer touch a cup because Asia Bibi's Christian faith had made it unclean; recognises that Pakistan's blasphemy laws, first codified in 1860 and expanded upon in the 1980s by the military government of General Zia-ul Haq, carry a potential death sentence for anyone who insults Islam; understands that, shortly after Asia Bibi's conviction in 2008, the Punjab Governor, Salman Taseer, was murdered for speaking out in support of her and calling for Pakistan's blasphemy laws to be reformed; notes with concern that, even after Asia Bibi is freed, the legacy of this case will continue and Christians living in Pakistan will still be vulnerable to what it considers a climate of intolerance and a legal system that is frequently used to seek revenge after personal disputes; is aware that the Islamist movement, Tehreek-e Labbaik (TLP), had previously vowed to take to the streets if Asia Bibi was released, and that protests broke out in Islamabad and Lahore soon after the ruling was announced, and calls on the Pakistani Government to put an end to the use of blasphemy laws against minority religious groups and journalists critical of the Pakistani religious establishment.

*<u>S5M-14591</u> Maureen Watt: Maryculter Community Hall Association—That the Parliament congratulates the Maryculter Community Hall Association on its £7,500 Awards for All Scotland grant, which it will use to help upgrade the hall's toilet facilities, including adding a new female cubicle; notes that Storm Frank, which caused devastation across the north east in December 2015, brought damage to the hall's inner walls, floor and kitchen and the community defibrillator; acknowledges the benefit that the upgraded facilities will have to the many groups that use the hall, and commends everyone who has been involved with its restoration.

*<u>S5M-14590</u> Alison Johnstone: A Real Fox Hunting Ban—That the Parliament notes that, 16 years after the implementation of the Protection of Wild Mammals (Scotland) Act 2002, mounted fox hunting continues in Scotland; believes that the many "exceptions" to the offence of hunting a wild mammal with a dog act as loopholes, which allow mounted fox hunting to continue much as it did prior to the legislation; considers that the Scottish Government process of reviewing the Act has failed to result in meaningful progress; believes that the Scottish Government proposal of a voluntary code of practice for fox control is inadequate; considers that a legislative, rather than voluntary, route is required to end what it sees as animal suffering as a result of fox control, and calls on the Scottish Government to urgently bring forward legislation that would ban fox hunting.
