\*S5M-13701 Patrick Harvie: Social Enterprises Working to Tackle Child Poverty—That the Parliament congratulates the Glasgow-based social enterprise, ApparelXchange, which aims to promote reuse and recycling of school uniforms to reduce costs to families and prevent the waste of resources; notes that the social enterprise worked with a number of schools to run a successful series of summer pop-up shops across Glasgow offering reused items of school uniform; recognises that many families struggle to meet the costs of school uniforms, which it understands amount to an average of £130 per year; commends the team for diverting over 2,100 garments from disposal in landfill, which it understands made carbon savings equivalent to four return flights from Edinburgh to New York; considers that UK Government welfare policies have increased the number of children living in poverty; values the work done by the Child Poverty Action Group and others on the costs of the school day; considers that child poverty has a deeply damaging effect on young people's education and life chances, and recognises both the valuable contribution that social enterprises make to tackling child poverty and the need for all levels of government to act positively to eliminate it.

\*S5M-13705 Kenneth Gibson: Dependency on Coal Contributes to Rise in Global Carbon **Emissions—**That the Parliament notes with concern reports that coal consumption in Asia grew by 3.1% each year from 2006 to 2016 and that the continent now accounts for almost threequarters of the world's demand for the most polluting fossil fuel; understands that India in particular is dependent on coal, consuming an additional 27 million tonnes in 2017, a rise of 4.8% on 2016, contributing to the first increase in global coal consumption in four years; notes that prices for thermal coal are at their highest since 2012, having more than doubled in the last two years, which it understands is largely due to growing demand from India, China, Bangladesh, Pakistan, the Philippines and South Korea; believes that increasing coal consumption contributed to 2017 being the first year since 2013 that global emissions of carbon dioxide rose, thwarting efforts to limit climate change; is concerned that coal's share of global electricity generation, which is by far the largest at 28%, has not shrunk in over 20 years, despite the rise in gas and renewable energy production; recognises that, according to India's submission to the International Energy Agency ahead of the 2012 Paris Summit, the country expects its electricity demand to triple between 2012 and 2030, which is of particular concern given that coal generates more than threequarters of the country's electricity; understands that India's dependence on coal will be complex to resolve, as coal mining and production accounts for a tenth of India's industrial output with an estimated 500,000 people employed in the industry, while it also supports the country's railway network, which employs over 1.5 million people; considers that, while India ratified the Paris Agreement in 2016 and committed that, by 2030, at least 40% of its electricity will be generated from non-fossil sources, the state-owned coal mining company, Coal India, plans to increase production from 560 million tonnes in 2017 to 1 billion tonnes by 2020, and up to 1.9 billion tonnes by 2030; believes that, while nations such as Scotland have set a target of a 90% reduction in carbon emissions by 2050, this progress will be eclipsed if nations around the world do not dramatically reduce their dependency on coal and other fossil fuels, and urges the world's developed economies to assist nations such as India to diversify their energy production and utilisation.
