*S5M-20151 Keith Brown: Decrease in the Projected Life Expectancy of Children Born in the UK—That the Parliament notes with concern the decrease in projected life expectancies of children in the UK by three years that has been reported by the Office for National Statistics; understands that life expectancy has stopped rising in the UK since 2018; believes that this can be attributed to what it sees as callous austerity measures by the UK Government, including cuts to the welfare state; agrees with the UN Special Rapporteur for Extreme Poverty and Human Rights that cuts to public services since 2010 have resulted in "tragic social consequences"; believes that the most vulnerable continue to feel its damaging impacts and that stalling life expectancy for children is a consequence of what it considers to be the Conservative Party's ideological commitment to austerity; recognises that rising life expectancy for children is a marker of a healthy society, and supports the Scottish Government initiatives, such as the Baby Box, the Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods, that aim to ensure that children across Scotland get a healthy start to life, regardless of their background.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
