*S5M-20214 Sandra White: 225th Anniversary of the Glasgow Royal Infirmary—That the Parliament welcomes the 225th anniversary of Glasgow Royal Infirmary (GRI), which was celebrated with the unveiling of a commemorative mural documenting its rich history and positive impact on healthcare; notes the GRI has been serving the public since 1794 and symbolises one of the busiest and best equipped healthcare facilities in the country, serving a catchment area of more than 320,000 people; understands it was recently recognised by Newsweek as one of the top 100 hospitals in the world, the only hospital in Scotland to make the list, and has an international reputation as a teaching hospital and healthcare hub with more than 1,000 beds; notes the GRI has paved the way for medical innovations, including by Dr Joseph Lister, its most famous resident, who pioneered the use of antiseptics in the 1860s, Rebecca Strong, who developed the first training school for nurses in 1895, which then became the standard across the world, Professor Jackie Taylor, the current consultant geriatrician and first-ever female President of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, Sir William MacEwan, a pioneer in brain surgery and key player in the development of the "Erskine limb" for amputees, and Professor David Wheatley, who performed Scotland's first cardiac transplant in 1992; commends everyone involved in the GRI over its 225-year life, and wishes them continued success.

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*S5M-20212 Monica Lennon: Anniversary of the Findlay Family Tragedy, and the Need for the Reform of Culpable Homicide Law—That the Parliament acknowledges that 22 December 2019 marks the 20th anniversary of the tragic deaths of a Larkhall family, Andrew and Janette Findlay, and their children, Stacey, aged 13, and Daryll, aged 11, following an explosion at their family home, which was caused by a leaking gas main; acknowledges that the utility firm, Transco, pled guilty to health and safety charges and was convicted of failing to maintain the iron gas main that ran through the family's garden; notes that the main was found to be extensively corroded and leaking, and that a fine of £15 million was imposed; recognises however, that the firm was initially charged with culpable homicide, but that these charges collapsed; believes that involuntary homicides in work-related settings should not be immune from being investigated as culpable homicide and that there is a long overdue need for a change in the law; urges Members therefore to support the proposed Culpable Homicide (Scotland) Bill, which has been lodged by Claire Baker MSP, which it believes will help bring wider public debate on culpable homicide and deaths caused by work-related activities, and hopes that this will lead to an improved culpable homicide law that will see companies and individuals face charges where evidence justifies prosecution.

<Power to change date of referendum if UK election on same date

Power to change date of referendum if UK election on same date

- (1) The date of a referendum must not be the same as the date on which any other election or poll is scheduled to be held throughout Scotland.
- (2) If the date of a referendum is the same as the date of a UK election, the Presiding Officer may appoint a later date on which the poll at that referendum is to be held.
- (3) The date appointed under subsection (2) may not be more than 6 weeks later.
- (4) The Presiding Officer may appoint a date under subsection (2) only if the Scottish Parliament is dissolved or in recess.
- (5) Before appointing a date under subsection (2), the Presiding Officer must consult the Electoral Commission.
- (6) The Presiding Officer must publish a statement of the date appointed under subsection (2).
- (7) In this section—

"date of a referendum" means the date on which the poll at a referendum is to be held in pursuance of provision made by or under an Act of the Scottish Parliament,

"date of a UK election" means the date appointed as the polling day for an early parliamentary general election under section 2 of the Fixed-term Parliaments Act 2011.>

< Consultation on the role of referendums in the democratic process

Consultation on the role of referendums in the democratic process

(1) The Scottish Ministers must, before the expiry of the period of 3 months beginning with the day of Royal Assent, issue a consultation about the matters in subsection (2).

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- (2) The matters are—
 - (a) the role of referendums in the democratic process in Scotland,
 - (b) the regulation of campaigning using social media and other online services in a referendum,
 - (c) the consequences (in terms of criminal penalties that may be imposed on a person and in terms of the effect on the validity of the result) of making or publishing false campaign statements in relation to—
 - (i) the conduct of the poll for a referendum (including in particular, but not limited to, the date of the poll, who is entitled to vote, registration for voting, the manner of voting and the manner of counting of votes),
 - (ii) matters connected to the question on which the referendum is being held,
 - (iii) the consequences of a particular outcome to the referendum,
 - (d) such other matters relating to referendums, conduct rules and campaign rules as the Scottish Ministers consider appropriate.
- (3) To comply with subsection (1), the Scottish Ministers must in particular—
 - (a) lay a copy of the consultation before the Scottish Parliament,
 - (b) allow a period of no less than 90 days after the consultation is laid before the Parliament for representations to be made to them,
 - (c) take reasonable steps to—
 - (i) publicise the consultation to the general public,
 - (ii) provide sufficient opportunities for the general public to consider, and make representations in relation to, the issues raised by the consultation.
- (4) Following the consultation under subsection (1), the Scottish Ministers must—
 - (a) prepare and publish a report—
 - (i) on representations received in response to the consultation,
 - (ii) setting out any action they propose to take as a result of the consultation, and
 - (b) lay a copy of the report before the Scottish Parliament.>

Proposals for Members' Bills

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
