*S5M-16069 Shona Robison: The Impact from Celebrity Endorsements of Diet

Products—That the Parliament recognises the petition, "LET'S STOP influencers and celebrities working with products promoting speedy weight loss", which has been organised by the founder of the Empowered Women Project, Mandy Jones, and can be found on change.org; understands that Mandy has launched the petition to highlight the dangers of advertising products that encourage rapid weight loss; believes that many celebrities have stated that weight loss companies require a before and after photo when promoting their products, often taken on the same day, which can construct an inaccurate portrayal of healthy weight loss as a result of using a product; acknowledges the potentially significant damaging effects that portrayals of unrealistic body expectations, which are often perpetuated by, and shared widely across, social media, can have on the mental health of young people and adults; notes that Wellbeing Works, Dundee supports the petition stating that the inaccurate portrayal of healthy weight loss as a result of using a product is just one of many messages that young people might be vulnerable to, and that will impact negatively on their confidence and self-esteem and on the relationship that they have with their bodies, and considers that, in some cases, these negative perceptions and poor self-image could potentially go on to affect young women in their life choices, relationships and career opportunities, and ultimately impact on their mental health and wellbeing as they move into adulthood.

*S5M-16055 Alex Rowley: Remembering the Human Cost of the Wars in Iraq and

Afghanistan—That the Parliament notes that March 2019 marks 16 years since start of Iraq war, and that October will mark 18 years since the start of the conflict in Afghanistan; recognises that many thousands of deaths resulted from these conflicts and pays respect to all those from across the UK who died, including the 19 servicemen from across Scotland who died in Iraq and the 33 in Afghanistan, with many more experiencing injuries, such as post-traumatic stress disorder and other physical and mental health complications; remembers that those who died in Iraq included Lance Corporal Barry Stephen, 31, of Scone, Lance Corporal Andrew Craw, 21, of Alloa, Private Marc Ferns, 21, of Glenrothes, Private Kevin McHale, 27, of Lochgelly, Sergeant Stuart Gray, 31, of Dunfermline, Private Scott McArdle, 22, of Glenrothes, Lance Corporal Paul Lowe, 19, of Kelty, Private James Kerr, 20, of Cowdenbeath, and Private Scott Kennedy, 20, of Dunfermline; further

remembers those who lost their lives in Afghanistan, including Corporal Kevin Mulligan, 26, of Alloa, Sergeant Lee Andrew Houltram, 33, of Cowie, Corporal Thomas Mason, 27, of Rosyth, and Lance Corporal Liam Richard Tasker, 26, of Kirkcaldy; acknowledges the impact on Scotland's communities of these conflicts, including through the loss of young lives, the injuries to many and the ongoing struggles of those who served their country; notes the view that this must remain part of the collective national and community history in order to never forget the sacrifices that were made and to learn about the harsh realities of war and the impact of conflict, no matter how many miles away from Scotland's shores; understands that 58 veterans from across the UK took their own lives in the last year, and notes the calls for better provision of support to veterans to be provided, especially in relation to mental health services, and particularly in light of a number of military charities reportedly stating that they are experiencing difficulty with the increased demand for mental health support.

*<u>S5M-16039</u> Bruce Crawford: Scottish Gigabit Cities—That the Parliament welcomes the £200 million of investment from CityFibre to roll-out a new, modern and future-proof 1 Gbps Fibre-to-the-Home (FTTH) broadband network in Scotland as part of the Scottish Gigabit City Programme; notes that FTTH areas have been announced in Aberdeen, Edinburgh and Stirling as well as a £60 million investment in expanding the core fill-fibre network in Glasgow; understands that construction is under way in Stirling, with 180 km of new network set to pass nearly every home in the city; understands that this infrastructure development in the Gigabit cities will support future 5G connectivity, help households unlock the benefits of smart technology, spark economic growth by opening up business opportunities and make them among the best-connected places in Europe, and commends everyone involved with this.

The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
