*S5M-15458 Angela Constance: 150 Years of The People's Friend—That the Parliament congratulates The People's Friend on its 150th anniversary: recognises that the magazine, which is published by DC Thomson & Co Ltd, is the world's longest-running women's publication, with the first edition appearing on newsagents' shelves on 13 January 1869, becoming a weekly publication in 1870: notes that it currently has more than 32,000 subscribers, a circulation of 173,000 and a readership of over 400,000; acknowledges that it was originally a magazine for the whole family in the days before radio or television; recognises that it was first published almost 50 years before women in the UK achieved the right to vote; acknowledges how it has changed over the years, reflecting the changing roles of women in work and society; notes that the first illustrated cover was on the 11 May 1946 edition and that the publication changed from black and white to colour in the 1970s; recognises that it publishes seven short stories in every issue and still welcomes submissions from anyone; believes that it is possibly the last magazine to do so; notes that Angela Gilchrist is only the 10th editor, and the second woman, in the magazine's history; understands that there will be celebrations throughout 2019, including events at the Mitchell Library in Glasgow, an exhibition of original cover art at the Scottish Storytelling Centre in Edinburgh and a series of talks at the National Library of Scotland; recognises that a collector's 150th anniversary special edition is available; acknowledges its contribution to the social history of the Almond Valley constituency and beyond, and wishes The People's Friend continued success for many years to come.

*<u>S5M-15454</u> Graham Simpson: Housing Through the Lens of Ageing—That the Parliament welcomes the publication in January 2019 of the report, *Housing through the lens of Ageing: Integration, Communication and Community, an analysis of the Age Scotland Housing Project,* which has been co-produced by Age Scotland and the University of Stirling; notes that this builds on previous research and has the aim of constructively progressing the thinking, debate and practice of the role of housing in the quality of life of older people by analysing housing research data gathered via a national housing roadshow and survey; commends the analysis undertaken by the university and, in particular, the input from its team of community researchers; notes that the topics covered in the research explored the views of older people on their current housing situation

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and changing needs, their experience of adaptations and energy efficiency measures, including how these have been funded; and if they had heard of or used their local care and repair scheme; acknowledges the recommendations on six key areas, strategic planning, information and advice, adaptations, housing with care or support, preventative support and new housing; believes that these findings can help to inform the development and implementation of the Scottish Government's housing strategy for older people, Age, Home and Community, and notes the ambition to see collaborative efforts to take this important work forward so that older people in Central Scotland and across the country can live safe, healthy and independent lives at home for as long as possible.

*<u>S5M-15446</u> Daniel Johnson: Importance of the Retail Sector—That the Parliament recognises the importance of the retail sector to the Scottish economy; acknowledges what it sees as the challenging circumstances currently faced by the sector, which it considers were evidenced by the worst real-term December sales figures in 20 years, which were recently published by the Scottish Retail Consortium; notes the view that there is a need for a proactive industrial strategy for the retail sector to be introduced, as advocated by the shop workers union, USDAW, particularly given ongoing political and economic uncertainty; further notes the central role that retail plays to the economy and social fabric in the Edinburgh Southern constituency and across Scotland, and acknowledges the calls for intensive support to be provided to vulnerable areas where retail is the main employer, or in towns that have disproportionately lost jobs in the sector. **R**

*<u>S5M-15465</u> Alexander Stewart: Sauchie Trio's Christmas Lights Raise Over £2,000 for Strathcarron Hospice—That the Parliament congratulates a couple and their long-term family friend from Sauchie on their Christmas lights raising £2,023 for Strathcarron Hospice; understands that Denis and Elizabeth Hinchcliffe have been decorating their home and garden with hundreds of lights for a number of years with the help of John White; believes that the tradition has evolved into a large attraction for the local community, with people turning up every night over the festive period to see the latest display, which features Disney's *Frozen* on a projector and a nightly visit from a Santa Claus character; notes that the money was hand-delivered to the hospice's Tillicoultry shop as Denis and John both grew up in the town, and commends all three for their highly generous gesture.

*S5M-15464 Monica Lennon: Unite Extends Construction Sector Period Dignity

Campaign—That the Parliament commends Unite on expanding its period dignity campaign to the construction sector; understands that gender inequality is a serious issue for that sector, with women making up only 2% of its UK workforce; notes Skills Development Scotland's 2017-18 statistics record women representing only 1.4% of apprenticeship starts in construction frameworks; congratulates the union on its four-point plan, which asks employers to improve facilities for women in the workplace, including ensuring that a designated female toilet facility is always accessible, regularly cleaned and lockable, that handwashing facilities with running water and soap are provided in all welfare facilities, along with the provision of sanitary bins that should be cleaned and emptied regularly, and that free period products should be provided; believes that

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the action taken by Unite was informed by a survey of women construction members, who reported that a lack of suitable facilities was a major issue for many workers during menstruation; welcomes the University of Glasgow campus development that is being built by Multiplex as being the first signatory to the campaign, and encourages other construction sites and employers to sign up. **R**
