*<u>S5M-17771</u> Alex Cole-Hamilton: Remembering the Grenfell Tower Two Years On—That the Parliament acknowledges the second anniversary of the Grenfell Tower disaster, which occurred on 14 June 2017; remembers with sorrow the 72 lives that were lost; recognises the continued impact of this tragedy on families that were affected and the wider community; understands that more than 200 high-rise buildings in England with cladding similar to that used on Grenfell Tower are yet to have work to remove it; welcomes the reported recognition of the UK Government that more needs to be done to support the families still in temporary accommodation, and that reform

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of fire safety systems is required; supports the review of the Scottish Fire Safety Regime for Domestic High Rise Property, which highlights six recommendations for high-rise buildings, including the introduction of Scottish guidance regarding fire safety in purpose-built blocks of flats, and hopes that the Scottish Government will be able to implement all recommendations by the end of November 2019, as highlighted in the review.

*<u>S5M-17770</u> Bill Kidd: Food Crisis in North Korea—That the Parliament notes with concern reports of a food and humanitarian crisis in North Korea; acknowledges what it sees as widespread calls for international aid to be given from other countries to help alleviate the food shortage, which the UN predicts will effect 10 million civilians, following the worst North Korean harvest in 10 years; believes that the groups most vulnerable are children and pregnant or lactating women; recognises the provision by the South Korean Government of \$8 million to the World Food Programme's nutrition support programme for North Korean children and pregnant women and UNICEF's maternal and child health care project; acknowledges what it sees as the commitment of the South Korean Government to continue to provide humanitarian aid for the people of North Korea, regardless of political circumstances on the peninsula, and believes that the South Korean peace organisation, the People's Solidarity for Participatory Democracy, has carried out positive work in increasing awareness in Scotland of the North Korean food crisis.

*<u>S5M-17768</u> James Dornan: Democracy and Human Rights in China and the Extradition of Taiwanese Nationals—That the Parliament understands with regret that recent protests in Hong Kong against an extradition bill have resulted in violence and injuries; believes that, during its annual human rights dialogue with China, the EU raised concerns regarding human rights, including the need to ensure civil and political rights and judicial reform; supports calls for such reform; considers that peace and dialogue are vital to safeguarding universal shared values, which include the right of people to pursue their own freedom, democracy and way of life; understands that, two days after the 30th anniversary of the Tiananmen Square incident, 94 Taiwanese were extradited to China from Europe, and calls for a reconsideration of such extradition of people from Taiwan, Hong Kong, Macao, Tibet and Uyghur to China.

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seeks to promote a better understanding of why people claim sanctuary; warmly welcomes refugees and asylum seekers; recognises how they can contribute and enrich communities, including in Clackmannanshire and Dunblane; believes that it is a human right to claim asylum; commends the organisers of Refugee Week on their efforts to give refugees and asylum seekers a platform to be seen, heard and valued; welcomes the work done by the Scottish Government in relation to refugees, including extending the Best Start Grant Pregnancy and Baby Payment to young asylum seekers, taking what it sees is a fair and proportionate share of refugees as part of the Syrian resettlement programme, its work with unaccompanied children and the New Scots Refugee Integration Strategy, and reaffirms Scotland's commitment to offering sanctuary to the world's most vulnerable people.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no indication is given that the Scottish Government or UK Government is planning equivalent legislation.
