*S5M-19652 John Finnie: Israeli Soldier Receives One-month Sentence Over Death of Gaza

Teenager—That the Parliament notes reports of the decision of a military court in Israel to convict an unnamed Israeli soldier over the killing of a 15-year-old Gazan protester during a series of demonstrations in 2018 referred to as the Great March of Return; understands that the protester was identified by Gazan officials as Othman Helles; further understands that the soldier accepted a plea deal of the charge of disobeying an order leading to a threat to life or health, punished with a "month of military labour" and a demotion in rank; considers that this sentence is wholly disproportionate to the death of Mr Helles; notes the comments by Santiago Canton, the chair of
