*S5M-20776 Shona Robison: Dundee Hosts Major Leadership Seminar—That the Parliament commends Dundee-based Kanzen Karate Scotland for bringing the world-renowned sports performance consultant, Allistair McCaw, to speak at a seminar in Dundee; notes that, throughout his career, Allistair has worked with Fortune 500 companies, Olympians, PGA golfers, Grand Slam champions and professional sports teams; recognises that the event sought to help attendees develop their leadership skills; understands that the event, hosted by Abertay University, attracted over 350 guests from across sport, business and community organisations, and congratulates all involved on a successful event.

*S5M-20775 Gail Ross: Recognising Babies' Rights During Children's Mental Health Week—That the Parliament supports the work of NSPCC Scotland to raise awareness of the distinct attachment needs of babies during Children's Mental Health Week; believes that mental health difficulties often arise in infancy; notes that babies who grow up without positive and stable relationships are at greater risk of mental health problems and other poor outcomes throughout their lives; further notes that very young children are particularly vulnerable to abuse and neglect and the impact of trauma on a young child's development can be profound; believes that looking after the mental health of babies who have experienced trauma is key to ensuring that they recover and reach their developmental milestones; acknowledges that, with the right support, a baby's recovery from trauma can be rapid and remarkable but the earlier this happens the better; agrees that mental health services targeted at babies, young children and families are one of the most cost-effective ways of making a positive impact on child development outcomes, and believes that infant mental healthcare, comprising primary, secondary and tertiary interventions, should be an essential part of the current drive to reduce childhood adversity in Scotland.

*S5M-20774 John Finnie: Emma Roddick's Campaign for an NHS 24 Mental Health Helpline Option—That the Parliament congratulates Emma Roddick, who is a member of The Highland Council, on the success of her campaign to introduce a dedicated mental health option on the out-of-hours NHS 24 helpline menu after her petition calling for this received more than 25,000 signatures; acknowledges that this will provide people selecting the option with valuable assistance by allowing them to talk to someone directly about their issues; understands the importance of treating mental ill health as seriously as physical ailments; hopes this change will go some way to breaking down stigma, and applauds Emma for this.

*S5M-20773 Jeremy Balfour: Simon Lloyd and Network Rail Donate Bikes to Abbeyhill Primary—That the Parliament commends Simon Lloyd and Network Rail for donating safety equipment and 17 reconditioned children's bikes to Abbeyhill Primary School in Edinburgh; notes that this is part of a wider Edinburgh Waverley station initiative with GameChanger, which is a partnership that uses football as a platform to deliver projects that provide mental health benefits to vulnerable people; understands that the bikes were reconditioned voluntarily by Simon, who is a

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customer support assistant with Network Rail at Waverley; notes that Simon has gifted over 300 bikes to charities, including Cycle Africa and several organisations in Edinburgh that assist disadvantaged communities and homeless people; notes that Network Rail has also donated helmets, high visibility safety vests and straps for use with the bikes and that the contractor, Story, transported all the bikes to the school, and sends its best wishes to Simon, Network Rail and all involved with this initiative.

"94A Election meetings on the prison estate

- (1) A candidate at a local government election in Scotland or Scottish parliamentary election may hold a meeting in furtherance of the candidate's candidature on the prison estate subject to meeting the requirements set out in subsections (2) to (9).
- (2) The candidate must make an application to the relevant prison governor not less than 14 days before the date of the meeting.
- (3) An application made under subsection (2) must include a list of the candidates and such other persons who will be attending the meeting.
- (4) Having received an application under subsection (2) the relevant prison governor, or such person as may be nominated by the relevant prison governor, must seek the consent of relevant candidates to the holding of the meeting.
- (5) For the purposes of subsection (4)—
 - (a) where the candidate to attend is a candidate for a constituency in a Scottish parliamentary election, the relevant candidates are the other candidates for that constituency,
 - (b) where the candidate to attend is a candidate for a region in a Scottish parliamentary election, the relevant candidates are the other candidates for that region,
 - (c) where the candidate to attend is a candidate for a ward in an election to be a member of a local authority in Scotland, the relevant candidates are the other candidates for that ward.
- (6) Consent to the holding of a meeting may be given by a relevant candidate or by the election agent of a relevant candidate.
