Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S5M-21062 Jackie Baillie: Reinstate Vale of Leven Out-of-hours Service—That the Parliament notes the calls to reject the decision by NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde on 26 February 2020 to close the out-of-hours service at the Vale of Leven Hospital during the evening and at weekends; understands that the out-of-hours service will now only operate between midnight and 8am on weekdays, from Monday to Friday, with patients being redirected to either the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Paisley or the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital in Glasgow; believes that this will further add to waiting times at A&E and will force people to travel over 20 miles to get treatment instead of being seen locally; notes that the health board claims that this temporary measure could last for 18 months to two years; recognises that the board has had five years in which to implement Sir Lewis Richie's review of out of hours, but considers that it has singularly failed to take action; understands that the out-of-hours service at the Vale of Leven Hospital was closed 82 times in 2018 and 179 times in 2019, and that the board's decision affects other out-of-hours services in Glasgow, including the complete suspension of service in Inverclyde, and notes calls on the health secretary to sack the Chair and Chief Executive of the health board for gross incompetence.

*S5M-21061 Willie Coffey: Congratulations to Kilmarnock Photographer, Lynne Harper, Photographer of the Year 2019—That the Parliament congratulates the Kilmarnock photographer, Lynne Harper, on winning several awards recently at the prestigious Guild of Photographer awards, including the highly-coveted overall photographer of the year award for 2019; recognises that the Guild runs an image of the month competition that has received over 13,000 entries in 2019; further recognises that these entries are then scored, with each individual receiving a yearly total score to determine who wins the individual genre groups and also the photographer of the year accolade; acknowledges that Lynne is one of only a few Guild members from Ayrshire and has only competed at this high level for four years; recognises that Lynne also won first place in the maternity genre and the newborn and baby genre, runner-up in the people genre, winner of the image of the year competition in the newborn category and runner-up in the

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children's portraiture category; further congratulates Lynne on this outstanding achievement, and wishes her continued success in the future.

*S5M-21060 Neil Findlay: Public Sector Pay Policy—That the Parliament notes with concern the reported decision of the National Library of Scotland (NLS), and other heritage bodies covered by the Scottish public sector pay policy, to refuse to consolidate the mandated minimum pay award for staff and instead pay the underpin as a one-off, non-pensionable payment; understands that the minimum underpin is intended to address public sector workers earning under £25,000 per year; believes that the 2019-20 public sector pay policy guidance, and surrounding commentary, clearly set expectations among low-paid public sector employees that they would be receiving a minimum annual pay increase of £750; believes however, that while the vast majority of public bodies interpreted this minimum underpin as a consolidated, permanent and pensionable salary increase, the NLS and other heritage bodies others chose not to, with no consequences arising from the government, and considers that this practice has substantially negated the impact of the minimum underpin for low-paid staff on a permanent basis.

*S5M-21059 David Stewart: Stornoway RNLI Crew Recognised for their Long Service—That the Parliament congratulates the Stornoway RNLI coxswain, DI Murray, and crew members, Tony Morrison, Kenny Macarthur, Norman Smith and Donnie Mackinnon, on being awarded 20-year long-service badges, and the station's lifeboat operations manager, John MacDonald, who has been presented with a badge for serving the RNLI for 30 years; notes that, between them, the six have contributed a total of 130 years of voluntary service to the RNLI; commends them on this and their commitment to providing life-saving services to the communities of the west coast, and acknowledges the hard work and importance of the Stornoway station-based, and all other RNLI volunteers, to help ensure that the country's rural communities remain safe and can thrive.

- (1) In determining whether information about a childhood conviction ought to be included in the disclosure under section 5, the Scottish Ministers must have regard to the matters in subsection (4).
- (2) In determining—
 - (a) whether a childhood conviction is relevant for the purpose of the disclosure and whether information about the childhood conviction ought to be included in the disclosure under section 17,
 - (b) whether a removable conviction is relevant for the purpose of the disclosure and whether details of the removable conviction ought to be included in the disclosure under section 28,

the Scottish Ministers must have regard to the matters in subsections (4) and (5).

- (3) In discharging their functions under this Part—
 - (a) the independent reviewer,
 - (b) the chief constable, and
 - (c) any person to whom functions are delegated under section 67,

must have regard to the matters in subsections (4) and (5).

- (4) The matters are—
 - (a) the seriousness of the childhood conviction or removable conviction in respect of—
 - (i) serious harm to a person,
 - (ii) significant breach of trust and responsibility,
 - (iii) exploitative or coercive behaviour,
 - (iii) dishonesty against an individual,
 - (iv) abuse of a position of trust,
 - (b) the amount of time elapsed since the childhood conviction or removable conviction occurred,
 - (c) where there is more than one childhood conviction or removable conviction, the number of childhood convictions or removable convictions,
 - (d) where there is more than one childhood conviction or removable conviction, or where there is both a childhood conviction and other conviction information, the similarity of these convictions in respect of the matters in paragraph (a),
 - (e) the accuracy of the information,
 - (f) the impact of disclosure on the Convention Rights of the individual or of a third party.

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- (5) The matters are—
 - (a) the purposes of the disclosure by an accredited body under section 16,
 - (b) the prescribed purposes under section 19,
 - (c) the purposes of disclosure under section 20,
 - (d) the relevance of the childhood conviction or removable conviction to the purposes stated in paragraphs (a) to (c) in respect of risk of—
 - (i) serious harm to a person,
 - (ii) significant breach of trust and responsibility,
 - (iii) exploitative or coercive behaviour,
 - (iii) dishonesty against an individual,
 - (iv) abuse of a position of trust,
 - (e) the impact of disclosure on the Convention Rights of the individual or of a third party.
- (6) The Scottish Ministers may from time to time issue guidance to the persons listed in subsection (3) on how they are to discharge their functions in accordance with this Part.
- (7) Guidance issued under subsection (6) must be published in such manner as the Scottish Ministers consider appropriate.
