S5M-19234 Maurice Corry: Commonwealth War Graves Commission—That the Parliament recognises the work of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission in honouring the 1.7 million men and women of the Commonwealth forces who died during the First and Second World Wars, through construction and perpetual maintenance of war cemeteries, memorials and plots; understands that this work consists of immaculately planned and groomed landscapes and the conservation of headstones and memorials through teams of specialists around the world; acknowledges the extensive effort that the Commonwealth War Graves Commission makes to properly identify and respectfully bury all remains, ensuring that every individual is memorialised by name whether it be on a personal headstone or memorial; commends these vital efforts by the Commission in remembering the fallen; understands that over 175,000 Scots are respectfully commemorated and remembered by the commission in foreign countries, while over 20,000 of the total war graves cared for by the commission are spread across 1,200 locations in Scotland, including in West Scotland, and notes calls for all MSPs to join the Commission in its active remembrance of all those who paid the ultimate price.

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IFAN published statistics suggesting that the number of emergency parcels distributed by the country's independent food banks was nearly double the previous figure recorded by the Trussell Trust; understands that further research published on 8 January 2020 records 596,472 emergency parcels were handed between April 2018 and September 2019, an increase of 22%; believes with sadness that these statistics represent only the tip of the food insecurity iceberg, as they do not reflect the other types of emergency food aid provision or the number of people going hungry without accessing help at all, and calls for renewed efforts to tackle food poverty and its damaging effects on families and communities across Scotland.

 - "(4A) A person is not capable of voting as proxy at a Scottish parliamentary election if on the date of the election the person is a person to whom section 3(1A) of the 1983 Act (exception to disenfranchisement for offenders sentenced to term not exceeding 12 months) applies.".

"Additional requirements for applications for a proxy vote for a particular or indefinite period based on detention in a penal institution

 - (a) that the applicant is eligible to vote by proxy at Scottish parliamentary elections on grounds relating to the applicant's detention in a penal institution, and
 - (b) the name of the penal institution at which the applicant is detained.".
 - (b) in paragraph 7 (additional requirements for applications for a proxy vote in respect of a particular election), after sub-paragraph (7) insert—
 - "(7A) Sub-paragraph (7B) applies where an application under article 9(2) to vote by proxy at a particular election—
 - (a) is made on grounds relating to the applicant's detention in a penal institution, and
 - (b) is made after 5pm on the sixth day before the date of a poll at the election for which it is made.
 - (7B) The application must, in addition to providing the information required by sub-paragraph (1), state—
 - (a) that the applicant is detained in a penal institution, and
 - (b) the name of the penal institution at which the applicant is detained.".>

The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before. Amendments may be lodged until 4.30 pm on any sitting day, except on the last lodging day for each Stage, when the deadline is 12 noon.

A Hybrid Bill is subject to the same rules except in the case of Stage 2 where amendments for consideration may be lodged no earlier than the completion of any consideration of evidence at Stage 2.

Amendments to Private Bills are subject to different deadlines. These are set out in Rule 9A.12 of Standing Orders.

Members are advised to lodge amendments in good time before the beginning of a Stage and as early as possible during the day.
