**S5M-20261** Lewis Macdonald: Sustainable Development Goals in Scotland, On Target for 2030?—That the Parliament welcomes the publication of *On target for 2030?*, a report from civil society organisations co-ordinated by the UWS-Oxfam Partnership and the SDG Network Scotland; understands that this report aims to offer a snapshot analysis of progress in Scotland against each of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, which officially came into force on 1 January 2016, from expert organisations operating within each relevant field; considers that the negative effects of slow progress on achieving Sustainable Development Goals are felt disproportionately by low-income households, including in the North East Scotland region, and that this undermines the pledge made by UN Member States to ensure that "no one will be left behind"; acknowledges that the report encourages Scotland to do more to meet its Sustainable Development Goals, and understands that progress in this area is not the responsibility only of government but also of business, the third sector and individuals, if Scotland is to fulfil its commitments by 2030.

\*S5M-20457 Neil Findlay: Whitburn Academy's Be Herd Group, Shattering Mental Health Stigma—That the Parliament acknowledges the success of Whitburn Academy's pupil-led Be Herd group, which aims to raise awareness of, and remove, stigma regarding mental health issues; understands that it was launched after the opening of the Mental Health and Wellbeing Hub in the school library, which can be used as a quiet safe place to relax or a place to talk to a mental health ambassador; notes that its work includes presentations at school assemblies, at which pupils, staff and parents can tell their personal stories, support sessions for anyone from the school community affected by mental health problems and events promoting the project; acknowledges that, in September 2019, it was awarded a West Lothian Council Stellar Award, which was followed in October by a COSLA Gold Award for tackling inequalities and improving health; recognises that SAMH has said that 25% of the population will experience a mental health problem; notes the view that it is paramount that early intervention programmes are in place to tackle mental ill health among young people and that schools play a major role in this, and commends the Be Herd group as an excellent initiative by Whitburn Academy's pupils and staff with an ambitious aim to shatter the stigma of mental ill health and offer help and support to their peers and the wider community.

## Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

\*S5M-20468 Bruce Crawford: 700th Anniversary of the Declaration of Arbroath—That the Parliament celebrates the 700th anniversary of the Declaration of Arbroath, the Scottish declaration of independence sent to Pope John XXII and dated 6 April 1320; notes that the Declaration followed the First Scots' War of Independence and sought to confirm the Scottish nation's status as an independent, sovereign state; understands that the document is believed to have been sent from Arbroath Abbey by the Chancellor of Scotland and Abbott of Arbroath, Bernard of Kilwinning, and was signed and sealed by 51 magnates and nobles; notes that the surviving letter, the Declaration of Arbroath itself, is one of three written to the Pope at the time, with one other letter from King Robert the Bruce, and one from four Scottish Bishops supporting Scotland's independence; commends the Declaration being placed on UNESCO's Memory of the World Register in 2016; notes that the Declaration is considered by many to have influenced the drafting of the American Declaration of Independence as recognised by the Senate having designated 6 April as Tartan Day; welcomes the work of the Arbroath 2020 Group and its sixmonth festival starting in April 2020 and running until September, celebrating Arbroath's future and its history, and notes the view that it is vital that the memory and legacy of the Declaration of Arbroath is carried through to future generations as a defining moment in Scottish history and culture.

Opening—That the Parliament recognises that it is 50 years since the Royal Commonwealth Pool opened in Edinburgh in 1970; understands that the pool was commissioned by the city council under a plan by the then Lord Provost, Sir Herbert Archbold Brechin, in 1966, as part of a wider project to bring the Commonwealth Games to Edinburgh, with construction of the pool by Robert Matthew Johnson Marshall, with structural input from Ove Arup & Partners; believes that the "Commie Pool" is Edinburgh's only 50-metre pool and is the only Olympic-standard diving facility in Scotland; notes that it was used for elite diving events hosted in Edinburgh, including the 2014 Commonwealth Games and the inaugural 2018 European Championships, both hosted in Glasgow; further notes that the pool also features fitness studios, a gym, soft play, a café and much more, and was re-opened in 2012, following extensive refurbishment, which saw the building
