*<u>S5M-21878</u> John Mason: Immigration Statistics, Positive but with Concern—That the Parliament welcomes data from the National Records of Scotland showing that there has been a rise of 36,000 in the number of non-British nationals residing in Scotland between 2018 and 2019, taking the total to 388,000; recognises however that, although EU migration has remained stable over the last two years, net EU migration has fallen from a peak of over 200,000 in 2015 to 49,000; believes that Scotland does not have enough babies being born to either maintain and grow the population in future or to fill all the jobs required, and seeks to promote the country as a destination for migrants, both from and outwith the EU, to increase its international outlook, cultural diversity and economic viability.

*S5M-21877 Gordon MacDonald: WHALE Arts Receives Supporting Communities

Fund—That the Parliament welcomes the £20,000 from the Scottish Government Supporting Communities Fund that WHALE Arts in Wester Hailes has received to distribute to organisations, projects and community groups in the area; understands that small grants of up to £1,500 will be available to be spent by the end of September 2020; notes that, in order to receive a grant, applicants are required to apply by 5 June stating how the money will be used to improve lives during the COVID-19 lockdown; appreciates that WHALE Arts will facilitate unconstituted groups without bank accounts by making necessary purchases for them; recognises that WHALE Arts is also providing a food provision service locally in south west Edinburgh, including food banks, community meal takeaway, shopping services and food deliveries, and applauds WHALE Arts for its continued service to the community during the COVID-19 lockdown.

*<u>S5M-21876</u> Stuart McMillan: Remembering Saint-Valery-en-Caux—That the Parliament acknowledges that 12 June 2020 will be the 80th anniversary of the 51st Highland Division's surrender at St Valery in 1940; remembers the sacrifice of the soldiers of that Division, many of whom died or spent years as prisoners of war; recalls that the soldiers involved were forced to surrender to German forces at 10am on 12 June 1940 and included men of the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders, the Black Watch, the Gordon Highlanders, the Seaforth Highlanders, the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, RAMC, RASC, RA and other supporting and attached troops from other parts of the UK, and supports the calls made by Legion Scotland, Poppy Scotland and

the Royal Caledonian Education Trust for pipers and other musicians to play *The Heroes of St Valery* at 10am on 12 June in recognition of the sacrifice made by those who died.

*<u>S5M-21875</u> Rona Mackay: Bishopbriggs Piper Entertains Care Home Residents—That the Parliament commends Robin Hay, a piper from Bishopbriggs, who has been playing for residents of care homes across East Dunbartonshire during the COVID-19 pandemic; notes that Robin has been entertaining residents from the grounds outside to raise the spirits of those unable to see family during this time; understands that he is an accomplished professional piper, but has been offering this service free of charge and of his own initiative to provide comfort and happiness to care home residents, and acknowledges that a spokesperson from one of the care homes relayed that the event had brightened the residents' day considerably and were greatly appreciative of Robin's kind act.

*S5M-21873 David Torrance: Celebrating the Life of Desert Rat, Jimmy Sinclair—That the Parliament marks the sad passing of Jimmy Sinclair at the grand old age of 107, and recognises his decorated military career during his time as a gunner with the elite Chestnut Troop, 1st Regiment Horse Artillery, of the 7th Armoured Division; notes that, on leaving school, Jimmy joined the Territorial Army, serving with the Newburgh platoon of the Black Watch from 1931 to 1934 before signing up with the Royal Artillery in Perth at the outbreak of the Second World War and heading to the South of England to train with the Royal Horse Artillery; further notes the many commendations he received for his service during the Second World War and with the Allied Control Commission in Berlin, which included medals for his role in the siege of Tobruk and for his contribution to the assaults on Monte Cassino in Italy in which he was badly injured and spent several weeks in hospital recovering; understands that Jimmy steadfastly refused to wear any of his medals out of solidarity for those he served with that were lost, and acknowledges the passion with which Jimmy lived his life, the laughter he brought to every conversation, and his belief that the secret to a long life was "a dram of whisky and bowls of porridge".

S5M-21865 Kenneth Gibson: UK Government Must Not U-turn on Promised £70 Million for Scotland—That the Parliament notes that, on 2 May 2020, the UK Government announced a £617 million extension to business grants, which it advised would generate £60 million of funding consequentials under the Barnett Formula to help businesses across Scotland weather the COVID-19 crisis; recognises that such funding was then duly committed by the Scottish Government to its COVID-19 business response: understands that the UK Government subsequently informed the Scottish Government in the week of 18 May that this additional £60 million of funding would not now materialise, increasing the pressure on the Scottish budget; considers that this outstanding £60 million is in addition to another £10 million of consequentials that remain unpaid from when the UK Government announced £35 million for Scotland in respect of charity support direct grants, which then reduced to £25 million; expresses great concern at what it sees as the UK Government's pattern of behaviour of not paying Scotland the funds it is entitled to while equivalent funding is being spent elsewhere in the UK, as well as what it perceives to be a cavalier attitude towards Scotland's finances and the Scottish Government's need for certainty amidst a deadly pandemic, and urges the UK Government to pass on the £70 million of Barnett consequentials to the Scottish Government without further delay so that the people of Scotland receive the support previously pledged in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Scotland—As an amendment to motion S5M-21865 in the name of Kenneth Gibson (UK Government Must Not U-turn on Promised £70 Million for Scotland), leave out from "notes" to the end and insert "acknowledges the more than £330 billion of support that it understands the UK Government has provided across the four nations since the start of the COVID-19 crisis, including the furloughing of approximately 8.4 million people across the UK and the substantial additional funding allocated to local authorities; believes that this substantial financial package and unprecedented financial intervention from the UK Government is a reminder of the benefits that the Scottish Government enjoys through devolved autonomy while remaining part of a wider fiscal framework of support in the UK, including receiving £3.5 billion in Barnett consequentials to help

mitigate the impact of the virus, and calls on the Scottish Government to ensure that it passes on all Barnett consequentials that arise from UK funding to the people of Scotland and does not seek to unduly retain any funding, which it deems to be surplus, including what it believes is the £155 million due to local authorities that the Scottish ministers still have not passed on, despite specific assurances from the Scottish Government that it has already done so."
