Other new and altered motions and amendments

*<u>S5M-21944</u> Richard Lyle: Inauguration of the 15th President of Taiwan—That the Parliament acknowledges the inauguration of the 15th President, Dr Tsai Ing-wen, and Vice President, Dr Lai Ching-te of the ROC (Taiwan) on 20 May 2020; understands that the President won a record 8.17 million votes, representing 57.1% of the popular vote and the highest vote share won by a Democratic Progressive Party candidate in the presidential elections; acknowledges that Dr Tsai Ing-wen is the first woman to hold the vice-presidency and that this success represents her second term; acknowledges that the election had a turnout of 74.9%, the highest among nationwide elections since 2008, and sends its congratulations to the President and Vice President on their inauguration in these challenging times.

*S5M-21943 Kenneth Gibson: UK Government Acts to Discourage EU Citizens—That the Parliament understands that, on 15 May 2020, the UK Government Home Office updated its guidance on naturalisation as a British citizen by discretion; further understands that the new guidance determines that now "grant of settled status (also known as indefinite leave to enter or remain) will not confirm that they were here lawfully under the EEA Regulations during that time, as defined by the British Nationality Act 1981 as this is not a requirement of the EU Settlement Scheme"; believes that Home Office staff are given discretion to "request further information from the applicant to demonstrate this" for those who hold Indefinite Leave to Remain via Settled Status and "must" request it from applicants who hold Pre-settled Status: notes with concern the instruction that "where appropriate", they "must also be satisfied that the person was lawfully in the UK, with comprehensive sickness insurance (CSI)" during periods when they were studying or self-sufficient, a requirement that it understands is not part of the Settled Status nor the Pre-Settled Status application process; denounces that the new policy will, it understands, be applied retrospectively to all current outstanding applications with, it considers, the UK Government effectively moving the goalposts; believes that what it views as an unnecessary and unreasonable requirement was surreptitiously introduced to discourage EU nationals from applying for and obtaining the same basic rights as UK citizens, including both active and passive voting rights in UK Parliament elections and any other elections or referenda under the UK Parliament franchise, and urges the UK Government to reverse what it sees as this damaging policy with immediate effect and to offer refunds of the £1,330 application fee, the £19.20 biometric data fee and the £50 Life in the UK Test fees, and to compensate any legal costs incurred in the process by those who

would not have applied if they had, at the time of their application, been asked to provide evidence of CSI.

*S5M-21937 John Finnie: Commemorating the Anniversary of the Tiananmen Square **Protests**—That the Parliament remembers the anniversary of the Tiananmen Square protests; understands that, on the night of 3 June 1989, the Chinese military opened fire at unarmed student-led protestors around the square, clearing it by dawn; further understands that, although there has never been any independently-verified death toll, the then British ambassador to China estimated that at least 10,000 people were killed as a result of the protests and subsequent crackdown; acknowledges that friends and families of victims are still demanding an explanation from the Chinese Government for what happened; believes that activists who wish to commemorate those killed are at risk of being threatened, harassed and detained by the Chinese authorities; notes calls from Amnesty International for China to publicly acknowledge what it sees as the human rights violations that occurred, and for it to launch an open and independent inquiry to hold those responsible for the events accountable; further notes what it believes to be the Chinese authorities' ongoing attempts to erode human rights protections in Hong Kong and what it sees as the frequent use of excessive force against protestors there; understands that authorities in Hong Kong have banned the annual commemoration of the Tiananmen Square protests, and calls on all governments to recognise citizens' right to freedom of expression and peaceful assembly. R

*<u>S5M-21936</u> Daniel Johnson: Bridgend Farmhouse—That the Parliament congratulates Bridgend Farmhouse on receiving a grant from the University of Edinburgh Community Grants Scheme, which it will use to help provide the infrastructure to create a network in south east Edinburgh that will aim to prevent isolation and mental health problems; notes that the University has now passed on £260,000 of such funding to community groups, many of which are responding to the COVID-19 outbreak in their area; welcomes such positive work in the Edinburgh Southern constituency area, and wishes Bridgend Farmhouse and the Grants Scheme well for the future.

*<u>S5M-21935</u> Monica Lennon: Dementia Awareness Week 2020—That the Parliament acknowledges Dementia Awareness Week, which takes place between 1 and 7 June 2020 in support of people with dementia, their carers and families; notes that more than 90,000 people in Scotland live with dementia and that, while around 60% of Scotland's care home residents have dementia and it is most common in older people, it can affect people in their 40s and 50s and younger; understands that dementia is a terminal illness that affects the brain and is an umbrella term for over 100 different types of illnesses and disease symptoms, including memory loss and difficulties with daily tasks, language and problem-solving; recognises that the COVID-19 pandemic means Dementia Awareness Week is being marked differently this year; encourages people to participate by printing, decorating and displaying Alzheimer Scotland's forget-me-not

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flower in their windows and sharing photos on social media; notes that calls to Alzheimer Scotland's 24-hour freephone dementia helpline on 0808 808 3000 have increased by 30% since lockdown, providing information, signposting and emotional support to people with dementia, families and carers; commends health and social care staff, social workers, unpaid carers, employers, charities and volunteers who work hard all year round to support people to live well with dementia, and agrees that fair dementia care in Scotland should be a reality for all.

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working and contributing economically, socially and culturally to life in Scotland and the UK while being excluded from accessing any public funds; is concerned that these restrictions, which can be a cause of hardship at the best of times, are pushing people and families into destitution during the COVID-19 crisis; acknowledges that people from all backgrounds have found their livelihoods and incomes under threat due to COVID-19 and not all of those affected have been able to access financial assistance through government support schemes; understands that this situation is particularly desperate for those subject to "no recourse to public funds" restrictions, who are also excluded from the social safety net, which would be able to provide support such as housing benefit or universal credit; recognises the work of the Kurdish Development Association and, in particular, Shakha Sattar for their work in highlighting these issues and campaigning for change; believes that it is essential that everyone should have access to a social safety net as a basic human right, and calls on the UK Government to immediately lift the "no recourse to public funds" restrictions and ensure that everyone who needs it can access support during this crisis and the recovery that follows.
