#### Other new and altered motions and amendments

\*S5M-21227 Kenneth Gibson: 95 Years of Murrayfield Stadium—That the Parliament commemorates the 95th anniversary of the inaugural match at Murrayfield Stadium, the home of Scottish Rugby, which took place on 21 March 1925; notes that England were the first team to visit, with 70,000 people watching Scotland win both the match and the country's first Five Nations Championship Grand Slam; recognises that the stadium now has a seated capacity of 67,144, which is the largest in Scotland, but that its record attendance of 104,000 was set on 1 March 1975, when Scotland defeated Wales 12–10 during the 1975 Five Nations Championship and that this attendance stood as a world record until 1999; understands that, during the Second World War, the stadium was taken over by the Royal Army Service Corps and used as a supply depot and that, for decades since, Murrayfield has not only hosted rugby matches but also various other large events including, American football matches, association football matches and music concerts by artists such as David Bowie, Oasis and Madonna, and wishes Murrayfield and Scottish Rugby every success for the years ahead.

\*S5M-21226 Emma Harper: Dumfries and Galloway Arts Festival—That the Parliament congratulates Dumfries and Galloway Arts Festival on its programme launch for Scotland's largest rural performing arts festival, which takes place from 22 to 31 May 2020; notes that the festival consists of 41 performances taking place across 29 venues across the length and breadth of Dumfries and Galloway; congratulates the community engagement team on bringing Vision Mechanic's STORM, which is a 10-metre mythical goddess who tells the story of the oceans in crisis and who initiates a battle on the climate emergency, to a free public event in Dumfries; notes that the launch saw talented performances from Galloway Violin Studio, Liv McDougall and Craig Carruthers as well as poetry from Daniel Gillespie; acknowledges the high quality of performances brought to the region, including The National Theatre of Scotland's sell-out show, The Cheviot, The Stag and The Black, Black Oil at Annan Academy; congratulates the team at DG Arts on positively engaging with local schools and acknowledges the significant contribution made by the region's young people and the festival's Young Promoters Group, who have all played a key role in delivering the fantastic series of events; acknowledges the economic contribution of Dumfries and Galloway Arts Festival, which injects a £9 return on every £1 invested, and wishes all involved every success for 2020 and beyond.

\*S5M-21225 Emma Harper: James Clerk Maxwell to be Celebrated in Parton—That the Parliament welcomes a series of events that will take place on 13-14 March 2020 in Parton, Dumfries and Galloway, to honour the life of the renowned scientist, James Clerk Maxwell; notes that Maxwell, often described as "Scotland's Einstein", was born in Edinburgh in 1831 and moved to Parton as a very young child; understands that he attended university in Edinburgh and Cambridge where his scientific talent was soon recognised, particularly in the field of physics; notes that he is credited with proposing the concept of electromagnetic radiation, bringing together for the first time electricity, magnetism and light as different manifestations of the same phenomenon; acknowledges that Einstein held Maxwell in high esteem, giving his photo pride of place in his study, and that his work helped with the development of the theory of relativity; recognises that Maxwell returned to Parton when retired; notes that he died in the village in 1879 and was buried in the local kirkyard, where many of the celebratory events are set to take place, and wishes Dumfries and Galloway Council, Galloway Glens Partnership and all others involved with the events and workshops every success.

\*S5M-21223 Kenneth Gibson: Remembering Dr John Macleod—That the Parliament commemorates the 85th anniversary of the death of the Scottish biochemist and physiologist, John Macleod, who was born in Clunie in 1876 and died on 16 March 1935; understands that he studied medicine at the University of Aberdeen before obtaining a PhD in medicine in 1898 and spending a year studying biochemistry at the University of Leipzig, Germany, on a travelling scholarship; notes that he devoted his career to diverse topics in physiology and biochemistry, but was primarily interested in carbohydrate metabolism; acknowledges that his work on the discovery of insulin in 1921 led to him being jointly awarded the Nobel Prize for Physiology or Medicine with Frederick Banting in 1923; recognises that the discovery of insulin completely transformed the treatment of diabetes, saving millions of lives worldwide, and believes that this anniversary should be used to recognise and celebrate the important impact of this influential Scot on modern medicine.

# <5FA Anonymity orders: proceedings relating to making of female genital mutilation protection order

- (1) Where civil proceedings relating to the making of a female genital mutilation protection order are before the court, the court—

    - (i) any person in respect of whom the anonymity order was made,
    - (ii) any person who is a protected person (if not a person mentioned in sub-paragraph (i)), and
  - (b) have regard to any such views (taking into account the person's age and understanding).
