*<u>S5M-21631</u> **Neil Findlay: International Mesh Awareness Day—**That the Parliament recognises that 1 May 2020 is International Mesh Awareness Day, which marks the beginning of International

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Mesh Awareness Month; understands that the awareness month provides an opportunity to remember people who have been fitted with a mesh implant in order to treat urinary stress incontinence and pelvic organ prolapse, and have consequently suffered debilitating and lifealtering injury or illness; further understands that the injuries and illnesses associated with mesh implants have led to loss of income, relationship breakdown, mental ill-health and contribute to the deaths of some patients; notes that the use of transvaginal mesh devices have been suspended in Scotland; further notes, however, that full and complete mesh removal, a procedure that has in many cases relieved or reversed much of the damage caused by mesh, is still not available in Scotland, despite the world-leading surgeon, Dr Veronikis, offering to come here to offer his expertise, and calls on the Scottish Government to indefinitely ban mesh implants and to take immediate action to ensure that mesh-injured women can have access to full mesh removal here in Scotland.

*S5M-21630 Pauline McNeill: After the Applause, Fair Pay for Key Workers —That the Parliament commends the contribution of the key workers who have kept essential services and industries going during the COVID-19 outbreak; regrets the low status, recognition and value that it believes had been placed on many of these workers, mostly the women; acknowledges estimates that 294,000 such workers in Scotland are paid less than £10 per hour; supports the campaign, After the Applause, which was launched by GMB Scotland on 30 April 2020; understands that this has already been backed by thousands of key workers and their families; notes that it calls for an immediate £2 per hour increase pay increase for these workers, including those employed in social care, retail, the NHS, food production, refuse services and many other areas where low pay is the perceived "norm" and were risks to health during the current crisis are among the highest; calls on the Scottish Government, local authorities and private sector employers to recognise that a fair pay rise, alongside all possible health and safety protections, is the least that key workers deserve, and acknowledges the call by the STUC for the UK Government to raise the legal minimum wage, for all workers, to £10 per hour.

*S5M-21629 Angus MacDonald: Scottish Book Trust Awards, Learning Professional Award **2020—**That the Parliament congratulates Yvonne Manning, Principle Librarian of Children's Services for Falkirk Council, on winning the 2020 Learning Professional Award from the Scottish Book Trust Awards; understands that Yvonne was nominated for the award by her colleagues, who have described her as an "inspiration to all who work with her," with her passion and hard work having, it believes, a significant impact on every educational establishment in the Falkirk Council area, despite facing financial challenges; notes that Yvonne manages the Learning Resource Service, which supports schools to develop a reading-for-pleasure culture; recognises the importance of storytelling, and setting aside time to read favourite stories, at a time when people can be overwhelmed with reports, documents and information; considers the positive impact that Yvonne has had on children across Falkirk district in establishing and running the RED Book Awards for Falkirk high schools; notes that RED stands for Read, Enjoy, Debate and that it encourages reading for enjoyment and stimulating lively debate about books: further notes that, as Bookbug Coordinator, Yvonne models Bookbug gifting events for nurseries and trains staff and parents in storytelling; thanks Yvonne for her contribution to children's learning experiences across the years; congratulates her on winning this award, and looks forward to seeing more of her work in the future.

*S5M-21626 Kenneth Gibson: 160th Anniversary of the Birth of JM Barrie—That the Parliament commemorates the 160th anniversary of the birth of the novelist and playwright, JM Barrie, who was born in Kirriemuir on 9 May 1860 and died on 19 June 1937; understands that Barrie had a keen interest in writing from an early age, producing material for school magazines and drama groups, before studying literature at the University of Edinburgh, where he had articles published in local newspapers; acknowledges that, upon graduating, Barrie worked as a journalist before he published his first novel, Better Dead, in 1888 and soon wrote several popular novels set in Scotland before turning his hand to writing plays; recognises that Barrie's early works were marked by their Scottish dialect and whimsical humour and sentimentality but that he is best known for *Peter Pan*, both in the form of a 1904 play and 1911 novel; notes that Barrie's memory is kept alive today by a statue of Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens, London, and another in his hometown, Kirriemuir, where he is also buried, while the house in which he was born has been preserved as a museum by the National Trust for Scotland; understands that, before he died, Barrie gifted the copyright of the stage play of *Peter Pan* to Great Ormond Street Hospital so that, every time the play is performed, the hospital benefits, and believes that this anniversary of his birth should be used to recognise the legacy of this important Scot and his cultural impact.

*S5M-21625 Kenneth Gibson: 130th Anniversary of the Death of James Nasmyth—That the Parliament commemorates the 130th anniversary of the death of Scottish engineer, philosopher, artist and inventor, James Nasmyth, who was born in Edinburgh in 1807 and died on 7 May 1890; understands that Nasmyth learned to work in various metals from a young age and, after leaving school, put these skills to good use when he built his first steam engine at the age of 17; recognises that, by the age of 20, he had produced a steam carriage capable of carrying eight people for a mile; acknowledges that Nasmyth is best remembered for his work on the development of the steam hammer but that he also manufactured more than 100 steam locomotives, many small high-pressure steam engines, and a variety of pumps, hydraulic presses and other machines; is aware that Nasmyth's work changed the landscape of the industrial world before he retired at the age of only 48 in order to spend more time painting and pursuing his interest in astronomy; notes that, in memory of his renowned contribution to the discipline of mechanical engineering, the Department of Mechanical Engineering building at Heriot-Watt University is called the James Nasmyth Building, and believes that this anniversary should be used to recognise and celebrate the work of this influential Scot and how he helped shape engineering across the world.
