***S5M-21779 Richard Leonard: Importance of the Oil and Gas Industry**—That the Parliament welcomes the campaign by Unite Scotland to protect offshore jobs in Scotland; recognises the importance of the offshore oil and gas industry to the Scottish and UK economy; considers that the reduction in demand for oil due to the COVID-19 pandemic threatens tens of thousands of jobs in the oil and gas sector; including jobs in central Scotland; recognises the need for ongoing public investment to provide support in return for a public stakeholding; acknowledges calls for a reaffirmation from the Scottish and UK governments and from Oil and Gas UK to the “Roadmap to 2035, A blueprint for net-zero”; regrets what it sees as the attempt by the Offshore Contractors Association to dismantle a collective agreement for 7,000 workers, and supports the central involvement of trades unions both now and in the introduction of new technology and automation.

***S5M-21790 Elaine Smith: Thyroid Awareness Day on 25 May**—That the Parliament acknowledges International Thyroid Awareness Day on 25 May 2020, which starts Thyroid Awareness Week; considers that, despite ongoing parliamentary debates and petitions in the UK, people, the majority of whom are women, are still not being fully listened to; acknowledges that the

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COVID-19 pandemic is adding to this challenge; appreciates the work being done by charities, such as the Thyroid Trust and Thyroid UK, in supporting people to fully understand and manage the disease, and hopes that Thyroid Awareness Day will help encourage ministers and health providers to ensure that all people with thyroid disorders are given full and easy access to all options of treatment, including Liothyronine.

***S5M-21789 Brian Whittle: Cycle Station Supports Big Bike Revival Campaign—**That the Parliament congratulates Cycle Station, a not-for-profit community enterprise based in Newmilns, on successfully securing a £2,000 grant as part of Cycling UK's Big Bike Revival campaign; understands that the grant is intended to enable independent bike shops, recycling centres and mechanics across Scotland to provide free hire bikes, free bike safety checks and minor repairs for key workers who have their own bike; notes that Cycle Station has now provided nine brand new bikes, including one e-bike, to local key workers, free of charge until August 2020, and assisted many others with servicing and repairs; commends Cycle Station and its sister project, Biosphere Bikes, which is based in Girvan, for their participation in this scheme and their wider efforts to promote cycling and provide affordable access to bikes for everyone, and wishes the enterprise and all involved continued success.

***S5M-21788 Claire Baker: Fife Council Preventing Homelessness Caused by Domestic Abuse—**That the Parliament welcomes the steps taken by Fife Council in creating good practice to prevent homelessness caused by domestic abuse; highlights the work involving the council, Scottish Women's Aid and a community research team of women made homeless in Fife through domestic abuse, including the report, *Change, Justice, Fairness, "Why should we have to move everywhere and everything because of him?"*; praises the adoption by the council of a co-production approach, which has resulted in a respectful, individualised and victim/survivor-led strategy for keeping women and children safe in their homes; notes that the council has responded to the lockdown by maintaining its proactive approach by keeping allocations of housing open to enable women and children to safely move home and reduce additional pressure on refuge spaces; appreciates the close working between the council and a coalition of organisations committed to transforming how social landlords respond to domestic abuse, including the development of Scotland's first guidance for social landlords, which takes a human rights approach to housing and homelessness; commends the creative and committed service redesign work undertaken by Fife Council and its response to homelessness and domestic abuse during this pandemic, when women and children experiencing domestic abuse are particularly at risk, and hopes that this approach can be shared with other local authorities as an example of good practice.

***S5M-21787 Clare Adamson: Netherton Care Home Residents Enjoy Traditional Chippy Thanks to Kind-hearted Youngster—**That the Parliament commends 12-year-old Skye Ralton from Wishaw for serving up "chippy food" to residents and staff at Netherton Court Care Home; notes that the youngster decided to take matters into her own hands after discussing the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on people in care homes with her mum; understands that Skye dedicated her time and skills to making and selling sparkling glitter glasses to raise the money to treat the residents and hardworking staff at the local care home, and thanks Skye and her family for supporting the local community during unprecedented times.
