*<u>S5M-23328</u> Monica Lennon: Period Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Bill—That the Parliament agrees that the Period Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Bill be passed.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

*S5M-23337 Dean Lockhart: Congratulations to Stirling Workstart of Forth Valley College—
That the Parliament congratulates the Stirling-based volunteer group, Stirling Workstart of Forth Valley College, on winning the Path Skillz Group of the year at the 2020 Paths for All Volunteer Awards; understands that the group received the prestigious award for significantly transforming path links in the local area, namely by clearing a blocked path in Plean Country Park by chopping down overgrown branches and creating drainage areas; notes that the volunteers were faced with a number of challenging weather conditions during the project such as heavy rain, wind and snow; further understands that Paths for All works with the Scottish Government and 30 partners in order to support and deliver national policies, such as the National Walking Strategy and other active travel initiatives; recognises that the charity also awards thousands of pounds of grants to other similar projects, and wishes Stirling Workstart and other similar volunteer groups the best of luck in their efforts to promote walking and improve environments for people to be active in.

*S5M-23336 Alexander Stewart: Clackmannanshire Third Sector Interface Techshare Scheme—That the Parliament commends Clackmannanshire Third Sector Interface (CTSI) on its Techshare scheme, which aims to provide people with recycled internet-enabled devices and help them to get online; understands that people can donate their old devices, which will be wiped and factory reset, to be given to those in need; acknowledges that many people in Clackmannanshire do not have internet access at home or a device with which to go online, and that this situation has been brought to the fore by the COVID-19 pandemic as people who previously accessed libraries or community groups now have no means of getting online; considers that this, along with a greater reliance on the internet during the pandemic as people seek to access help and keep in contact with families, means that vulnerable people, job seekers and older people have become more disadvantaged; understands that the scheme, which is by referral only, has been supported by the National Lottery Community Fund and the Corra Foundation, and has, by the beginning of

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November 2020, been running for four months and seen 44 devices donated so far, received 53 individual requests for help and distributed 43 devices, with 34 individuals receiving Techshare devices and a further nine people receiving Connecting Scotland devices, and congratulates CTSI on its sterling levels of service to Clackmannanshire communities.

*S5M-23335 Alexander Stewart: Stevie Preston of the Station Hotel, Alloa—That the Parliament commends Stevie Preston, who is the licence holder of the Station Hotel in Alloa, and his family, on spending Remembrance Sunday 2020 by delivering meals to veterans after the usual commemorations were curtailed because of the COVID-19 pandemic; understands that Stevie is well known across the community for the generous support that he provides, including the hosting of veterans at the hotel on Remembrance Sunday, where he has provided entertainment and a hot meal, which was impossible this year because of the pandemic; notes that he has previously been honoured by the Clackmannanshire British Legion for the help he provides to serving military personnel and veterans by being presented with an engraved shell casing from the Edinburgh Castle One O'clock Gun, and congratulates Stevie, and his family, for their enormously magnanimous work for the benefit of Wee County veterans.

LGBT Youth Representative—That the Parliament thanks Owen Brand MSYP who is stepping down from his role representing LGBT Youth Scotland in the Youth Parliament; notes the outstanding work that Owen has carried out to promote the mental health of LGBT young people, including lodging a successful motion with the Youth Parliament; congratulates Owen on co-hosting an event in the Parliament, which celebrated LGBT History Month and was attended by current and former Scottish Government ministers, MSPs and other distinguished guests, and wishes Owen good luck in his future endeavours.

*S5M-23330 Jamie Greene: Falkland Islands Cleared of all Landmines—That the Parliament welcomes the news that the Falkland Islands have been cleared of almost all landmines, 38 years following the conclusion of the 1982 conflict; pays tribute to the specialist team, many from Zimbabwe, which has removed tens of thousands of mines and bombs since 2009 as part of a £36 million UK-funded programme that will set further demining efforts taking place in Afghanistan, Angola, Cambodia, Iraq, Laos, Lebanon, Myanmar, Somalia, Sudan, South Sudan, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Yemen, and Zimbabwe; understands that the islanders will mark the moment of the ceremonial detonation of the final landmine with games of football and cricket on reopened beaches and be declared mine-free on 14 November 2020, and notes that by upholding the anti-personnel mine ban convention, to which the UK is a signatory, states are obliged to destroy both stockpiled and emplaced anti-personnel mines and commends the hard work and perseverance of those tasked with the dangerous and difficult task of demining the world over.

*S5M-23329 Alison Johnstone: Nature Prescriptions Pilot in Edinburgh—That the Parliament welcomes the introduction of a five-month Nature Prescriptions pilot being run at five GP practices in Edinburgh; understands that East Craigs Medical Centre, Leith Mount Surgery, Inchpark Surgery, St Triduana's Medical Practice and Mill Lane Surgery are taking part; notes that it is part of a new collaboration between RSPB Scotland and Edinburgh and Lothians Health Foundation; understands that the participating practices will prescribe nature to patients as part of their treatment; believes that the initiative is inspired by growing evidence that connecting with nature makes people healthier and happier and provides a range of health benefits, including improved cardiovascular health, enhanced immune function, reductions in stress, anxiety and fatigue, improved concentration and increases in life satisfaction and happiness; acknowledges that Nature Prescriptions started in Shetland in 2017 as a partnership between RSPB Scotland and NHS Shetland and was successfully rolled out to all 10 GP practices across Shetland in 2018; notes that the Edinburgh pilot aims to investigate whether Nature Prescriptions can be delivered in a similar way in an urban environment, and to explore the potential for extending it throughout Scotland, and acknowledges what it sees as the important role that social prescribing has to play in supporting self-management of health conditions and enhancing holistic approaches to addressing health, wellbeing and mental health problems.

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*S5M-23327 Patrick Harvie: Celebrating Living Wage Week 2020—That the Parliament recognises that 9 to 15 November is Living Wage Week 2020; considers that the real living wage of £9.50 per hour is based on the real cost of living, unlocks people from poverty, and allows people to meet their everyday needs; commends the 1,800 employers across Scotland that are accredited Living Wage employers, including the 180 employers that have been accredited since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic; celebrates that 45,600 workers in Scotland have had a pay rise as a direct result of Living Wage accreditation; notes that Living Wage accreditation has put over £240 million of additional pay back into low-paid families' pockets; notes that, in Scotland, 350,000 workers still earn less than the real living wage; considers that the living wage is right for business, right for workers and families and right for society, and believes that more employers should be encouraged to become Living Wage accredited employers to help ensure that Scotland is a nation where everyone can earn a decent standard of living.

*S5M-23326 Rachael Hamilton: Understanding the Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic on Loneliness and Social Isolation—That the Parliament recognises the damaging impact of social isolation and loneliness throughout the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic; considers that it has had a pronounced effect on older and vulnerable people; understands that studies have shown that, in the long term, it can be as bad for human health as smoking or obesity; acknowledges the recent University of Stirling study, which found that 56% of people said social distancing had made them more lonely; notes the concerns raised in the recent British Red Cross report, *Lonely and left behind: Tackling loneliness at a time of crisis*, that 32% of UK adults agree that they worry something will happen to them and no one will notice; commends the British Red Cross's work, especially in Ettrick, Roxburgh and Berwickshire with the Coronavirus Resilience Calendar, and calls on the Scottish Government to consider the report's recommendations in full in order to tackle social isolation and improve mental health and wellbeing.
