**\*[S6M-07832](#) Alex Cole-Hamilton: Chinese State Surveillance**—That the Parliament notes the reported shooting down of a Chinese state surveillance balloon over the United States on 5 February 2022; understands that this is not the first occasion that such a balloon has been deployed over the sovereign territory of another state; considers this to be a worrying expansion of attempts by the People's Republic of China to monitor and gather information in a covert way; expresses concern about the reported implications of China's National Intelligence Law regarding the ability of the state to gather private data and information from within the UK, including through those companies required to cooperate; notes the reported call by Alicia Kearns MP, Chair of the UK Parliament's Foreign Affairs Committee, for UK citizens to delete the TikTok app from their phones; further notes the reported remarks of the UK Biometrics and Surveillance Camera Commissioner, who likened the use of Hikvision technology in public surveillance infrastructure to "digital asbestos"; understands that such technology is used by public bodies across Scotland, including in Edinburgh; notes the reports of the intimidation of dissidents, challenges to freedom of expression and the existence of unofficial so-called "Chinese police stations", including in Glasgow, and notes the calls for both the Scottish and UK governments to undertake a comprehensive investigation into the reach of Chinese surveillance in Scotland.

**\*[S6M-07634](#) Evelyn Tweed: Vitamin D Supplement Provision in Scotland**—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the importance of taking vitamin D supplements for all residents in Scotland, including in the Stirling constituency, as vitamin D helps to regulate the amount of calcium and phosphate in the body, which is important for bone, teeth and muscle health; understands that, for most people in Scotland, supplements are required from October to March each year when there is not enough of the right kind of sunlight for people's bodies to make vitamin D; notes that NHS Scotland recommends that everyone in Scotland should consider taking a daily supplement containing 10 micrograms of vitamin D during winter months, and that pregnant and breastfeeding women, infants and children under five years old, people who have low or no exposure to the sun, and people from minority ethnic groups with dark skin, such as those of African, African-Caribbean and south Asian origin, are recommended to take 10 micrograms of vitamin D throughout the year; further notes that breastfeeding women, and children up to three years old in Scotland can obtain free vitamin D supplements containing the recommended daily amount, whilst the general population must purchase these at supermarkets, pharmacies, or online; recognises, however, that financial barriers to accessing vitamin D supplements may exist for some, and notes the calls for the Scottish Government to consider ways to improve access to vitamin D supplements for all.

**\*[S6M-07640](#) Brian Whittle: The Role of Scotland's Marine Environment in Addressing the Climate and Nature Crises**—That the Parliament recognises what it sees as the importance of Scotland's marine environment to nature, people and the economy of the South Scotland region and across the country; further recognises what it considers to be the valuable role that the marine environment plays in addressing both the biodiversity and climate crises; considers that several key policy areas related to the preservation and use of marine habitats are fully within the control of the Scottish Government, including marine planning, fish stock assessments, and the gathering of baseline ecological data; notes the calls from stakeholders for the Scottish Government to do more to support fishermen in delivering a just transition; acknowledges that these include calls for improving access to training pathways for young people, re-skilling programmes, grants and funding for changes to equipment, and considering more detailed spatial management plans, as well as ecosystem and species management plans; notes what it considers to be the threat posed by destructive fishing practices, which can include dredging and bottom trawling, and which have reportedly been found to contribute to carbon emissions and habitat destruction; appreciates what it sees as the direct and indirect contributions that healthy inshore ecosystems provide for human wellbeing and quality of life, as well as the marine environment's potential, when managed effectively, to aid in the transition to sustainable supply chains; notes the calls supporting the inclusion within the carbon budget of carbon stored in marine and coastal ecosystems, known as blue carbon, to ensure that efforts to achieve net zero are informed with the best possible data; acknowledges the calls on the Scottish Government to collect a higher volume and quality of data in this area to build a robust body of evidence, which can be used to inform science-backed policy, and notes the calls for policy in this area to be developed in conjunction with marine industries and third sector organisations to deliver practical, pragmatic solutions to address the biodiversity and climate crises.

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.
