*S6M-15657 Elena Whitham: Report on Alcohol Use Disorder in the Justice System—That the Parliament notes the publication of the Scottish Health Action on Alcohol Problems' paper, Alcohol (In)justice: Position on people with an alcohol use disorder in the justice system; is concerned that it is estimated that almost two-thirds, 63%, of people in prison have an alcohol use disorder, with almost half of those, 31%, possibly dependent on alcohol; is further concerned that the risk of death from alcohol causes is three times higher in men and nine times higher for women who have been in prison than for the general population; understands that the paper sets out why and how people with alcohol use disorders who come into contact with the justice system should have the best opportunities to access treatment and support, and that this could reduce reoffending and pressures on the justice system, tackle inequalities, improve the health and lives of the people concerned and the lives of their families and wider communities; believes that there are examples of innovative practice across Scotland, including Glasgow's Alcohol Court; acknowledges that the paper further sets out several potential standards that could be implemented across the justice system, and understands that accountability for such standards is required in order to make a difference to the health and lives of people in Carrick, Cumnock and Doon Valley and across Scotland with alcohol problems who are being dealt with by the justice system.

*S6M-15654 Kenneth Gibson: Opposition to the Post Office Closure Plan—That the

Parliament notes the opposition to the proposal set out in the Post Office's Transformation Plan on 13 November 2024 to consult on closing its 115 remaining crown branches; understands that these proposals would involve the closure of 10 branches in Scotland, including the branch in Saltcoats town centre; notes the opposition of the Communication Workers Union, which has characterised the proposal as being "as tone deaf as it is immoral"; believes that crown branches provide a range of vital services that are not available in all Post Offices; notes the view that, at a time when more and more shops and services are leaving the high street, there is a case for more crown branches, not fewer, and conveys its sympathy to the estimated 1,000 Post Office employees whose jobs are now at risk.

*<u>S6M-15675</u> Sandesh Gulhane: New Affordable Homes in Finnieston, Glasgow—That the Parliament welcomes the completion of 55 affordable new homes in the Finnieston area of Glasgow; notes that the development, built by JR Group for Glasgow West Housing Association, in Dover Street began in 2021 and will now provide safe, environmentally friendly, sustainable housing as the city approaches its one-year anniversary of declaring a housing emergency on 30 November 2023; congratulates JR Group on its support for the local community through the provision of donations to local primary schools, Anderston Primary School and Glasgow Gaelic School, and the provision of welcome packs to the new tenants moving in, including kitchenware, bedding and toiletries, and considers that more such developments will be required across Glasgow to meet demand and end what it considers to be the practice of boarding people presenting as homeless in temporary accommodation such as hotels.

*<u>S6M-15674</u> Sandesh Gulhane: Major Extension Proposed to Glasgow Fort — That the Parliament notes the submission of a planning application to construct a major extension to the Glasgow Fort shopping centre in the east end of Glasgow; understands that the proposal for 60,000 additional square feet of retail and leisure development at the location is an additional expansion on new phases constructed in 2013 and 2015, and that this phase would mark the full completion of the development, which was first opened in 2004; welcomes this proposed economic development in the east end of Glasgow and the consequent job creation that would be generated, and understands that there will be public consultation events on 11 December 2024 and 16 January 2025.

*<u>S6M-15673</u> Sandesh Gulhane: Glasgow Taxis Cup—That the Parliament notes that more than 700 students across Glasgow's universities will compete in the Glasgow Taxis Cup on 26 March 2025, with 21 events taking place across Glasgow on that day; welcomes the promotion of sport in the city as competitors participate in the 16 different disciplines taking place on the day, including athletics, basketball, rugby, cross-country, fencing, snow sports and powerlifting, and congratulates last year's winner, Strathclyde University, as it competes to defend its title against students representing the University of Glasgow and Glasgow Caledonian University in the contest sponsored by Glasgow Taxis Ltd.

*<u>S6M-15672</u> Sandesh Gulhane: Lung Cancer Awareness Month—That the Parliament recognises that November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month; understands that lung cancer is the most common cancer in Scotland and that there are more than twice as many cases in the most deprived areas as there are in the least deprived areas of the country; believes that there are around 4,000 lung cancer deaths in Scotland every year; welcomes Cancer Research UK-funded research into new ways of diagnosing lung cancer using technologies like AI and blood tests that

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can detect tumour DNA, which Cancer Research UK helped pioneer through the TRACERx study; recognises that, in September 2022, the UK National Screening Committee (UK NSC) formally announced its recommendation that targeted lung screening is implemented for people aged 55 to 74 with a history of smoking across the UK; understands that lung cancer screening aims to find lung cancer at an early stage, when treatment is more likely to be successful; notes the calls from Cancer Research UK for the urgent roll-out of a national targeted lung cancer screening programme in Scotland; acknowledges the commitment in the Cancer Strategy for Scotland 2023 to 2033 to take forward the UK NSC recommendation on targeted lung screening, and notes Cancer Research UK's call for the Scottish Government to make a commitment to rolling out a national targeted lung cancer screening programme, including investment to tackle shortages in the workforce and diagnostic equipment, to ensure that everyone who needs it can benefit. **R**

A member seeking to introduce a Member's Bill must first lodge a draft proposal, together with a consultation document (or a statement of reasons why consultation is not considered necessary). Subsequently, the member may lodge a final proposal, in broadly similar terms to the draft, accompanied by a summary of consultation responses (or the statement of reasons). The member secures the right to introduce a Bill to give effect to the proposal if the final proposal secures, within one month, the support of at least 18 other members from at least half the political parties or groups represented in the Parliamentary Bureau, and provided no statement is made that the Scottish Government is planning equivalent legislation.

The last lodging day for amendments at Stage 2 is four sitting days before the meeting at which those amendments will be considered (e.g. Wednesday for a meeting on Tuesday); at Stage 3 it is five days before.
