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own theatre company that would later go on to be known as Project Theatre, the ethos behind which was to provide classes and skills workshops to help prepare young people who may be too nervous to audition, helping encourage them to offer their skillset to the industry; notes that Project Theatre has developed throughout the years from its first performance in 2010 at Bo'ness' Barony Theatre; understands that, as Artistic Director, Jamie has now directed 12 shows at Falkirk Town Hall and two at Grangemouth Town Hall; congratulates Jamie once again on being named Personality of the Year, and wishes him the best of luck as he continues to contribute towards theatre and performing arts opportunities for young people across the district.

*S6M-12614 Jamie Greene: Success for Greenock in the Scottish Restaurant Awards—That the Parliament congratulates Greenock restaurants, The Exchange, Tonino's, and Scotts Bar and Restaurant, on being recognised at the Scottish Restaurant Awards, which took place on 18 March 2024; notes that The Exchange was awarded first prize in the European Restaurant category; understands that Tonino's received a highly commended award in the Pizza Restaurant of the Year category; further understands that Scotts Bar and Restaurant was also highly commended in the Family Restaurant of the Year category; believes that these awards and recognitions reflect the quality of food and hospitality available in Inverclyde; celebrates what it considers to be the diversity of cuisine on offer in Greenock, and wishes all three businesses every success in the future.

*S6M-12613 Paul Sweeney: The Impact of Health and Social Care Budget Reductions in Glasgow —That the Parliament notes with concern the reported confirmation of over £36 million in reductions to the Glasgow City Integration Joint Board (IJB) budget; understands that the cuts will see the loss of at least 90 NHS jobs and 62 council posts; further understands that there will also be an increase of 5% on service charges and a 12.8% rise in hot meal charges to make up the budget shortfall; notes the reported reduction of £3.3 million from prescribing services, of £3.5 million from funding to help people live independently, and £2.1 million from funding for children and families; understands that, despite the recently reported 41% increase in drug deaths in Greater Glasgow, the Alcohol and Drug Partnership budget is being reduced by 10% as part of this programme of budget reductions; recognises what it sees as the efforts of workers and representative trade unions in opposing these cuts, which, it believes, are being implemented without adequate consultation with both staff and the public; understands that the UNISON, RCN and Unite trade unions have lodged a formal dispute on this matter, and believes that the loss of at least 152 jobs in health and social care undermines the capacity to provide community-based care and make early health interventions to improve outcomes for patients, and that this risks compounding pressure on what it sees as already stretched key workers who are trying to meet demand with less resource.

*S6M-12611 Stuart McMillan: Inverclyde Royal Hospital Workers Recognised for Completing 100 Years of Service—That the Parliament thanks Glen Stevenson and Anne King for having both worked with the NHS for 50 years, accumulating 100 years of service between them; understands that Glen, a night shift porter, and Anne, a health care assistant, are both based at Inverclyde Royal Hospital; further understands that Anne could retire, but that she is choosing to keep working as she says that she would miss it, and the reward of helping patients and seeing them get better, too much, and that Glen also has no immediate plans to retire, citing how he enjoys working alongside his porter colleagues; appreciates that hospital bosses organised a celebratory tea party for both Glen and Anne in recognition of their career milestones; believes that Glen and Anne's experience and many years of service is invaluable to NHS Greater

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Glasgow and Clyde, and thanks them for what it sees as their continuing hard work and dedication.

*S6M-12610 Stuart McMillan: Inverclyde HSCP Awarded Gold Level Two Digital Telecare Implementation Award—That the Parliament congratulates Inverclyde Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) on being awarded the Gold Level Two Digital Telecare Implementation Award in recognition of the recent progress of its analogue to digital telecare transition project; understands that to achieve this, a telecare service provider must have successfully rolled out a live digital telecare service to 50% of service users and be operating successfully without serious issues or call failures for at least six weeks; recognises that Inverclyde HSCP works with Bield Response 24 (BR24), its Alarm Receiving Centre, to provide its telecare service, which goes to 1,791 people in the community; applauds Inverclyde HSCP for successfully transitioning from analogue to digital across 1,148 homes, and believes that achieving this award reflects the overall functionality and effectiveness of Inverclyde HSCP's digital telecare solution.

Olsen Renewables, which quantifies the economic impact of its operations in Scotland; notes that the organisation has delivered more than 866 green jobs, that it has awarded contracts totalling £920 million to Scottish businesses, and that it contributed £465 million to the Scottish economy to date; highlights the impact that it believes the organisation is having in helping progress Scotland's target to reach net zero by 2045, whilst contributing to national ambitions on energy security, clean economy and the creation of hundreds of green jobs; recognises the impact that its community benefit funds are reportedly having in local areas; commends the organisation's continued efforts to place collaboration at the heart of its activities in Scotland, and wishes it all the best with its future work.

*S6M-12607 Elena Whitham: Sir James MacMillan Awarded the Ivors Academy Fellowship— That the Parliament applauds Sir James MacMillan, originally from Cumnock, for being awarded the Ivors Academy Fellowship; understands that the Fellowship is the highest honour bestowed by the Ivors Academy to recognise excellence in music creation; further understands that several notable names have received the Fellowship, including Sir Elton John and Annie Lennox; recognises that Sir James grew up in Cumnock and founded The Cumnock Tryst, an annual music festival, which, in 2024, celebrates its 10th anniversary; considers that this award recognises what it sees as the many musical achievements of Sir James, including composing music for the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II; commends Sir James for his work, and wishes him the very best for the future.

*S6M-12606 Paul O'Kane: Debt Awareness Week 2024—That the Parliament notes that Debt Awareness Week runs from 18 to 24 March 2024, and aims to highlight the experiences of people who are dealing with problem debt; welcomes the work of the Aberlour Children's Charity and others in helping families that are struggling with debt; notes Aberlour's Family Financial Wellbeing Tayside Pilot, which it understands has taken innovative steps to help families that are struggling with debt, including paying off debts owed to public bodies; understands that 75% of the debts that have been paid off in the pilot were to public bodies, which it believes highlights the central role that the state can play in imposing financial burdens on disadvantaged families; recognises what it sees as the benefits experienced by families who were supported by the pilot, and calls for all

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governments to re-evaluate the way in which debt collection by public bodies is prioritised to better support families.

*S6M-12604 Bill Kidd: Dr Julie McElroy, Pioneering Female Frame Runner Set to Make History at the 2024 London Marathon—That the Parliament congratulates Dr Julie McElroy on her achievement of being set to become the first female frame runner to participate in the London Marathon, which takes place on 21 April 2024; understands that despite being diagnosed with cerebral palsy as a baby and her parents being told that their daughter may never walk, Julie went on to take up mainstream sports, alongside completing a ground-breaking PhD in Assistive Technology to investigate the learning experiences of students with disabilities within tertiary education, and also becoming a champion for disability rights; believes that Julie is an inspirational figure for anyone who is facing difficulties in their life, and wishes her every success in the marathon.
