S6M-16128 Liz Smith: 300 Years of The Black Watch—That the Parliament marks the tercentenary of the origins of The Black Watch: understands that, in 1725, six companies were raised by General George Wade, comprising of "loyal" clans, including the Campbells, Grants, Frasers and Munros, and formed the Highland watches to police the Highlands following the 1715 Jacobite rebellion; notes that a further four companies were raised in 1739 to form the Regiment of the Line, which first mustered at Aberfeldy; understands that, throughout this period, the companies began being referred to as Am Freiceadan Dubh or The Black Watch; believes that this term was likely due to the dark tartan uniform that was worn by its soldiers; recognises what it sees as the significance of the regiment's involvement throughout the UK's most important and consequential military campaigns, ranging from, but not limited to, the Seven Years' War, the American War of Independence, the Napoleonic wars, the Crimean War, the Boer War, the First and Second World Wars, the Korean War, the Troubles in Northern Ireland and the Gulf Wars; acknowledges what it sees as the fearless and renowned reputation that The Black Watch established and reinforced over the course of these conflicts, as well as the countless stories of individual gallantry, particularly the 14 soldiers who received the UK's highest military decoration, the Victoria Cross; commemorates all who have served and died in the historic regiment, who have predominately come from across Perth and Kinross, Fife, Dundee and Angus, but also the rest of Scotland and beyond, and offers its full support to the veterans, and their families, who are alive today. **R**

*S6M-16957 Audrey Nicoll: Marking Andy Hogg's Passing—That the Parliament expresses its sadness at the passing of the former Scottish Assistant General Secretary of the Prison Officers Association (POA), Andy Hogg; appreciates his very long service and association with the Scottish Prison Service and his various roles within the POA over three decades; considers that he was a well-respected national official of the POA, and that he will be sorely missed, and offers its deep sympathy and condolences to his family and friends as they attend his funeral on 26 March 2025.

*S6M-16924 Marie McNair: Clydebank Groups Receive £250,000 in National Lottery Community Funding—That the Parliament commends seven groups across Clydebank for securing £252,595 from the National Lottery Community Fund; understands that Improving Lives in Dalmuir received £20,000, which will be used to fund a Digital Communications Worker; notes that Dalmuir Barclay Church received £20,000 to help support fuel costs for its volunteer-run warm space, as well as one-off help for fuels costs for individuals attending who are struggling financially; understands that Bags Full of Love also received £20,000, which will be used to help the charity keep a stock of new clothing and personal items such as new backpacks for children attending school; further understands that Community Links Scotland received £149,920 to help it continue delivering a programme of activities to bring together socially isolated and vulnerable groups; notes that Kilpatrick School received £16,200 to help increase the number of children with severe and complex needs that can benefit from Nordoff Music Therapy at the school, with an estimated 180 children and young people benefiting from this over two years; further notes that Faifley and Duntocher Parish Church received £19,661 to revamp its hall, which is used for community activities; recognises that Aspire 2 received £6,814, which will allow the group to reduce the costs of participation and extend the range of activities on offer to people in its area who are struggling with the mental health challenges of loneliness and isolation, and congratulates all staff and volunteers who have helped to secure this vital funding for their organisations as they continue their amazing work in making the local community a greater place.

*S6M-16922 Clare Adamson: Network Rail and Scottish Football Association Show Trespassing the Red Card—That the Parliament notes that, in 2024, nearly 45,000 young people and 61 grassroots football clubs took part in rail safety football workshops that were delivered by Network Rail and the Scottish Football Association (SFA); acknowledges that railway trespassing

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is a serious concern in Scotland, with 356 incidents recorded in 2024 involving under-18s, which is the equivalent of one incident per day; considers that combining railway safety messaging with football sessions supports physical activity and teamwork as well as potentially saving young lives; notes that Network Rail and the SFA have been working in partnership since 2018 and have so far reached a total of 180,000 young people since this initiative began; further notes that around 20% of participants last year were female, reflecting an increasing interest amongst women and girls in grassroots football, and hopes that the next two years of the partnership, which is funded until 2026, will continue to reach its target of supporting 30,000 young people each year. **R**

*S6M-16921 Maurice Golden: Welcoming the Release of a New Set of Surface Water Flood Maps from SEPA—That the Parliament welcomes the release of a new set of surface water flood maps from SEPA with an enhanced level of detail to include small watercourses; notes that the maps integrate both rainfall data and climate change projections, along with local authority data to increase the accuracy in recognising which areas are likely to be worst affected by heavy rainfall; considers flooding to be the biggest climate change adaptation challenge in Scotland and that surface water is the most widespread flooding risk; recognises what it sees as the importance of accurate information in helping both residents and businesses to understand the level of risk that they face from flooding, and which is crucial to help mitigate both loss of life and damage to property, and encourages the public to make use of these new maps, available through the SEPA website, to assess their own flood risk.

*S6M-16919 Monica Lennon: Congratulating Aldi as the First UK Supermarket to Introduce Free Period Products in Toilets, in Partnership with Bloody Good Period—That the Parliament congratulates Aldi on introducing access to free period products within all in-store toilets for customers and employees; believes that this is an important contribution to efforts to normalise menstruation, promote period dignity and reduce period poverty; understands that the initiative is available to anyone who needs it, with no need for a code or proof of purchase, and that Aldi seeks to make a meaningful difference to anyone who needs access to period products; notes that this initiative is part of a wider collaboration between Aldi and Bloody Good Period, a leading charity focused on menstrual equity, and that the scheme will donate over one million period products to support the charity's vital work in addressing period poverty and ensuring that menstrual products are viewed as a basic human right, not a luxury; acknowledges what it sees as the positive impact of the Period Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Act 2021 in improving access to free period products; commends Aldi for demonstrating leadership and commitment to period dignity, and encourages other supermarkets and businesses to play their part.

*S6M-16918 Annabelle Ewing: Benarty Citizen of the Year Award—That the Parliament congratulates all the winners at the recent Benarty Citizen of the Year Awards; notes that Distinguished Service Awards were given to Ross Gavin and Santa's Elves for the outstanding work that they do for the Benarty community, Craig Cooper was awarded the Gordon Mackie Friend of Benarty Shield, and the volunteers at the pantry@brag were awarded the Group Citizens of the Year Shield; recognises that, at only seven years old, Rio Early was named Young Citizen of the Year for his actions in saving his mum's life; further recognises that the Ann McCallum Benarty Citizen of the Year award was won by Isabell McShane for her outstanding volunteering within the community, for many groups and over many years; agrees that all were worthy winners, and extends thanks to the organisers of the awards event.

*S6M-16913 Jackson Carlaw: Maths Tutoring Centre Opens in Newton Mearns—That the Parliament welcomes the opening of "Mathnasium", a maths tutoring centre at Ayr Road in Newton Mearns; understands that the key aims of establishing Mathnasium is to provide a setting where young people are able to feel passionate about maths and improve their skills in this vital schools subject; further understands that the services provided at the maths tutoring centre are tailored towards supporting young people aged from five to 16 and to catch up, keep up or get ahead with developing their abilities in maths; notes that Mathnasium is based within the premises of the former IL Gelato Di Piero, a popular ice cream shop in Newton Mearns, and wishes the maths tutoring centre every success in supporting school pupils with improving their skillset in maths.

*S6M-16912 Jackson Carlaw: Woodfarm High School's Girls Volleyball Team Reach Scottish School's Cup Final—That the Parliament congratulates the girls volleyball team at Woodfarm High School in Eastwood for reaching the final of the Scottish Schools Cup; understands that the Schools Cup is one of the longest running volleyball competitions in Scotland and that the 2025 final in the girls senior category is to take place on 17 April; notes that the Scottish Schools Cup offers pupils the opportunity to compete nationally against young people from other schools, with the chance of winning the tournament; agrees that reaching the final is a great achievement for the girls volleyball team at Woodfarm High School, and wishes the pupils the very best of luck as they aim to win the competition.

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*S6M-16911 Jackson Carlaw: Mother Earth Hindu Temple Organises Activity for British Science Week—That the Parliament congratulates Mother Earth Hindu Temple in Newton Mearns for its efforts to celebrate British Science Week 2025 and engage young people with scientific issues; understands that, to mark British Science Week, Mother Earth Hindu Temple hosted a two-hour event on 12 March for S2-S6 pupils, and that it involved the young people working together in teams to deliver a presentation on a science topic; recognises that British Science Week took place from 7 to 16 March 2025 and that it is an annual event with the aim of encouraging participation in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM), and understands that schools, community groups and organizations throughout Scotland and the UK are able to take part in each annual event through activities such as workshops, exhibits, experiments and presentations.

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*S6M-16910 Jackson Carlaw: Willamwood High School Pupils Win Maths Competition— That the Parliament congratulates both the senior and junior teams from Williamwood High School in Busby on finishing in first place at the Naboj maths competition hosted by the University of Glasgow; understands that Naboj is a team competition designed for secondary school pupils where young people attempt to solve mathematical problems; acknowledges that the competition at the university took place on 14 March 2025 to coincide with the annual Pi Day, and commends the pupils at Williamwood for their excellent achievement in winning both the senior and junior events.

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*S6M-16909 Jackson Carlaw: The Malletsheugh Named as Best Restaurant at People's Choice Business Awards—That the Parliament congratulates The Malletsheugh in Newton Mearns on winning the Best Restaurant award at the 2025 People's Choice Business Awards in Glasgow; understands that The Malletsheugh opened less than two years ago, in August 2023, and the restaurant also won the prize of Best New Restaurant at the 2024 Scottish Curry Awards; acknowledges that The Malletsheugh serves both Indian and traditional Scottish meals and it is a family-run business; recognises that the People's Choice Awards provides an opportunity for members of the public to reward businesses by nominating and voting for them to receive one of the prizes on offer, and believes that The Malletsheugh winning the award of Best Restaurant demonstrates that the business is a key part of the local community in Newton Mearns and its recognition is well deserved.

*S6M-16907 John Mason: Heathrow Airport—That the Parliament notes the major disruption caused by a fire at the substation supplying Heathrow Airport, which resulted in widespread flight cancellations due to the loss of power on 21 March 2025; believes that this incident highlights the risks of over centralising the UK's aviation infrastructure around a single hub or airport; notes reports that the UK Government continues to promote the expansion of Heathrow, including a third runway, as a benefit to Scotland, but considers that this approach only reinforces reliance on one airport; considers that investment in direct flights from airports across Scotland to overseas destinations, would provide greater resilience, connectivity, and economic benefits, and hopes that the UK Government and Scottish Government prioritise improvements to aviation infrastructure across the country rather than focusing solely on Heathrow.

*S6M-16906 Colin Smyth: Securing and Maintaining Scotland's Status as a Fair Trade Nation —That the Parliament acknowledges what it sees as the crucial role played by grassroots campaigners, schools, faith groups, businesses, and local authorities in securing and maintaining Scotland's status as a Fair Trade Nation; recognises the dedication of volunteers and advocates across the country who, it understands, work tirelessly to promote ethical trade and global justice; believes that local action is vital in strengthening Scotland's commitment to fairness and sustainability in international trade, and encourages individuals and communities who care about global solidarity to get involved in the Fair Trade movement, supporting efforts to ensure trade works for people and the planet.

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*S6M-16905 Jeremy Balfour: Celebrating the 100th Anniversary of Murrayfield Stadium— That the Parliament celebrates the 100th anniversary of Murrayfield Stadium, the home of Scottish rugby since its opening in 1925; recognises its significance as one of the most iconic sporting venues in Scotland, hosting generations of memorable matches, including historic Six Nations victories, international test matches, and club rugby finals; acknowledges what it sees as its role in fostering a deep passion for rugby across the nation and inspiring future generations of players and supporters; notes its importance as a multi-purpose venue that has welcomed world-class concerts and events, bringing cultural and economic benefits to Edinburgh and Scotland as a whole, and sends its best wishes to all those celebrating this milestone, including Scottish Rugby, players past and present, fans, and all those who have contributed to Murrayfield's rich history over the past century.
