Members' Business motions that have not achieved cross party support

*S6M-16978 Neil Bibby: BBC Scotland's Decision to End River City and Close its Dumbarton Studios—That the Parliament notes with regret the reported decision by BBC Scotland to end the programme, *River City*, which it understands is Scotland's only homegrown soap; believes that this will have a disproportionately negative impact on performers in Scotland, many of whom, it understands, get their first TV job on *River City*, as well as on the wider Scottish production landscape; considers that the reported £9 million annual budget for the show is excellent value for money, given the hours of programming produced throughout the year for what it sees as a successful show, which, it understands, attracts a regular audience of 500,000 per episode, outperforming other TV series by more than two and a half times; believes that the Glasgow-based show is well loved by Scottish audiences and enjoys strong ratings, with it winning Best Drama at the Royal Television Society Scotland 2023 awards for its 20th anniversary episode; notes what it sees as BBC Scotland's failure to inform the Constitution, Europe, External Affairs and Culture Committee of its reported plans to close the BBC studios in Dumbarton and end River City in its annual report to the Parliament in January 2025; further notes the calls for BBC Scotland to recognise its public broadcasting duty and explain how its current proposals to replace River City will provide the same good jobs, training and apprenticeships currently available at the BBC's Dumbarton studios to performers and crew in Scotland, and ensure that the reported £9 million budget will be spent on Scottish drama; considers the BBC's Dumbarton studios to be an important asset, which has been used for a number of other productions, including Vigil and Shetland; understands that the owner of the studios site is open to renewing the lease, and notes the calls, in light of this, for BBC Scotland to revisit its reported decision to end River City and close its Dumbarton studios.

*S6M-16920 Kenneth Gibson: Marine Conservation Society Publishes 2024 State of our Beaches Report—That the Parliament welcomes the publication of the Marine Conservation Society 2024 report, *State of our Beaches*, which compiles data gathered through the organisation's year-round citizen science initiative, Beachwatch; acknowledges that Beachwatch was launched in 1994; believes that it provides one of the most detailed datasets on marine litter across the whole of the UK; applauds the 4,000 volunteers who attended beach cleans across Scotland in 2024, including in the Cunninghame North constituency, which represents a 25%

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increase in volunteers compared to 2023; notes that they removed over 10,000 kg of litter from Scottland's beaches in 2024, consisting of around 527,000 separate items; expresses concern that, on average, 204 items of litter were found for every 100 metres across Scotland's beaches, which represents a 7.2% increase on 2023 and is higher than the UK-wide average of 170 items per 100 metres; understands that 22,000 wet wipes were found on Scotland's beaches in 2024, and that drinks-related litter was recorded on 95% of surveyed beaches; acknowledges that marine litter not only harms what it sees as Scotland's beautiful coastline, but can also damage marine habitats; notes the view that reducing marine litter will require not only behavioural changes, but also a range of policy changes, including the introduction of circular economy measures and the phasing-out of single-use plastic items, and further notes calls for the Scottish Government to continue its work alongside key stakeholders to drive down marine litter across Scotland's beaches.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

*S6M-16963 Murdo Fraser: 400th Anniversary of the Accession of King Charles I—That the Parliament recognises that 27 March 2025 marks the 400th anniversary of the accession to the throne of King Charles I of England, Scotland and Ireland, on the death of his father, King James VI, who had ascended to the throne of England and Ireland as James I in 1603; notes that Charles was born in Dunfermline, Fife, in 1600 and became heir to the throne in 1612 on the death of his elder brother, Prince Henry; notes that his belief in the Divine Right of Kings and his ambition to align religious practices in Scotland with those in England led to conflict with the Kirk, nobility and people, leading to the signing of the National Covenant in 1638, the Scottish Revolution and the Bishops' Wars; understands that his disagreements with the English Parliament would contribute to the Wars of the Three Kingdoms, where the Royalist forces were defeated; notes that Charles' subsequent attempt to ally with the Scottish Estates led to the Second Civil War, which ended when the Scottish invasion force was defeated by Cromwell's New Model Army at Preston in 1648, and that, thereafter, he was put on trial for treason by the English Rump Parliament, convicted, and then executed at Whitehall on 30 January 1649, the only British monarch to face judicial execution, and believes that Charles' legacy today is either as a "Christian martyr" or as "the Man of Blood", depending on one's view of history.

*S6M-16947 Meghan Gallacher: Keep Scotland Beautiful Eco-Schools Success for Greengairs Primary School—That the Parliament congratulates Greengairs Primary School on receiving its 10th Green Flag as part of the international Eco-Schools programme by the environmental charity, Keep Scotland Beautiful; understands that the Green Flag award is an internationally recognised achievement for schools and nurseries committed to Learning for Sustainability; notes that Greengairs Primary has worked extremely hard to take action on three topics and fulfil all seven elements of the award criteria, and notes that the Eco-Schools programme is currently celebrating its 30th anniversary and is the largest sustainable schools programme in the world operated internationally by the Foundation for Environmental Education and delivered by Keep Scotland Beautiful.

*S6M-16940 Jackie Baillie: Congratulating MCR Pathways on the Success of its Schoolsbased Mentoring Programme—That the Parliament congratulates MCR Pathways on its schools-based mentoring programme, recruiting volunteer mentors to support care-experienced young people and others facing ongoing instability; understands that it has been operating across Scotland for almost 20 years, becoming a charity in 2015; notes that, in 2024, it supported 5,109 young people in urban and rural areas across the country; believes that its mentoring intervention is effective in reducing and alleviating the impacts of child poverty, social isolation and adverse childhood experiences: understands that 83% of mentored care-experienced young people stated that having a mentor improved their confidence and helped them understand their talents and strengths; believes that these statistics are due to the early intervention mentoring model, which helps break cycles of inequality and increases wellbeing, giving young people the tools to succeed as they transition into adulthood; understands that the programme has wider societal impacts, such as developing a skilled workforce, helping communities thrive by feeding into Best Start, Brighter Futures programme, enhancing wellbeing, delivering The Promise for care-experienced young people and, overall, contributing to a more fair and equal society, and welcomes MCR Pathways' commitment to continue to work towards engaging with every young person across the whole of Scotland who needs support, wherever they may be, with the help from what it sees as the charity's incredible volunteers, schools and partners.

*S6M-16939 Stephanie Callaghan: University Health and Social Care North Lanarkshire Marks Successful First Year of its Frailty Strategy 2024-29—That the Parliament commends University Health and Social Care North Lanarkshire (UHSCNL) on celebrating the first year of its Frailty Strategy for 2024-29, which it believes has been successful; recognises the strategy's focus on empowering older people across North Lanarkshire to preserve independence, health and the ability to live safely and comfortably in their own homes for longer; believes that frailty is an agerelated condition, affecting approximately 12% of over-65s and over half of those aged 85 or over, as the body gradually loses its reserves and has heightened vulnerability to health challenges; welcomes the range of innovative initiatives, such as dedicated frailty units in Lanarkshire's hospitals, prioritising timely, specialist care, the Carers Academy, which is run in partnership with Alzheimer Scotland and offers what it sees as invaluable guidance to dementia carers and families, the Motherwell Independent Living project, which has an emphasis on reablement and restoring confidence after illness, and the Active Wards programme, which counters physical and mental decline among hospitalised patients through personalised activities; highlights the strategy's commitment to early detection via technology and collaboration and fostering proactive support; expresses its profound gratitude to all staff whose efforts underpin what it sees as this transformative work, to enrich the lives of older residents across North Lanarkshire, including those in Uddingston and Bellshill, with dignity, respect and independence, and wishes UHSCNL every success with its aim to build on what it sees as these successes through community engagement, enhancing access to frailty resources and delivering sustainable, person-centred care.

*<u>S6M-16938</u> Kevin Stewart: Construction Industry and SAMH Collaboration—That the Parliament welcomes the news that Barratt and David Wilson Homes North Scotland have joined forces with Scotlish Action for Mental Health (SAMH) to create a new suicide prevention training programme tailored to the Scotlish construction industry; notes that the bespoke training and

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resource programme, which is backed by £239,000 in funding from the Construction Industry Training Board's (CITB) Industry Impact Fund, will be designed specifically for the unique pressures faced by construction workers, aiming to equip companies and individuals with the tools necessary to identify colleagues facing mental health challenges and provide meaningful support; understands that the programme is scheduled to launch in Autumn 2025, and will be available to individuals and companies across Scotland, ensuring the whole industry has access to help; believes that this initiative will play a vital role in tackling mental health challenges in the construction industry, and wishes those involved every success in the developmental phase of this programme and its resources.
