*S6M-19918 Sue Webber: Dealing With the Dangerous Use of E-bikes and E-scooters—That the Parliament notes with concern reports of the growing dangerous use of e-bikes and e-scooters across Scotland, but particularly in Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Dundee and Glasgow, and across major towns; understands that some e-bike and e-scooter users are often observed showing no regard for the traffic laws, endanger other road users and pedestrians, appear to violate the legally mandated speed limit and often do not use high-visibility clothing; believes that many users often wear what can be seen as intimidating clothing, such as balaclavas and face coverings; is concerned at reports that e-bikes and e-scooters are increasingly used to commit organised crime and vehicle theft; notes calls on the Scottish Government to give Police Scotland the appropriate resources and vehicles to counter people who use e-bikes and e-scooters in these ways, such as by seizing the vehicles, and further notes the call for greater action to be taken against the antisocial use of e-bikes and e-scooters, to provide a safer environment for roads users and pedestrians.

<u>S6M-19721</u> Emma Roddick: Recognising Concerns Regarding Moray FLOW-Park —That the Parliament acknowledges the reported concerns being raised by communities impacted by the proposed Moray FLOW-Park; notes that Offshore Solutions Group plans to develop two anchorage sites in the Moray Firth for floating offshore wind assets; understands that the project is at an early stage but concerns around the impact on fishing, the environment and marine life have reportedly been expressed and, it believes, deserve to be addressed, and notes the view that Offshore Solutions Group must be upfront with communities about the consideration other sites were given for these proposals and must commit to detailed and meaningful discussions with key stakeholders and all local communities in the Moray Firth area impacted by these proposals.

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*S6M-19721.1 Fergus Ewing: Recognising Concerns Regarding Moray FLOW-Park —

As an amendment to motion S6M-19721 in the name of Emma Roddick (Recognising Concerns Regarding Moray FLOW-Park) leave out from "acknowledges" to end and insert "notes the view that the proposal put forward by Offshore Solutions Group (OSG) regarding the Moray FLOW-Park should be rejected and proceed no further; believes that the opposition to this proposal in the local Nairn and Moray communities is overwhelming and is based on strongly held beliefs that it would devastate the scenic views and beauty of the inner Moray Firth, threaten to damage marine ecology and wildlife, decimate inshore fishing and cause irreparable damage to tourism and recreation, including sailing; considers that there is no clear evidence suggesting that OSG has the substantial robust financial standing required to have the capacity to implement any such proposals, given the scale of the projects and finance required to service them, and fears that the aim of the proposal may be to procure planning permission and then sell on the rights to others."
