***S6M-20361 Kevin Stewart: Labour Ignoring and Abandoning Aberdeen and the North East**—

That the Parliament condemns the UK Labour administration for, it considers, ignoring and abandoning the north east of Scotland; notes that the Scottish Local Growth Fund, which was recently announced by the Secretary of State for Scotland, Douglas Alexander, completely excludes the north east of Scotland, as well as various other regions outside Scotland's central belt, including the Highlands and Islands, Argyll and Bute, and Dumfries and Galloway; believes that this is evidence of the UK Government's narrow central belt focus, and betrays a total lack of interest in helping people and communities in areas such as Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire; calls on the UK Government to respect the devolved settlement, stop trying to bypass the Scottish Parliament, and allow Scotland's elected government to decide how such funds should be allocated in Scotland, and posits that the only way to ensure that Scottish funding is spent properly is with the full powers of independence.

***S6M-20360 Fulton MacGregor: Recognition and Support for Outdoor Arts, Circus and Spectacle in Scotland**—That the Parliament welcomes the publication of *Beyond the Stage: Understanding the Benefits of Outdoor Arts, Circus and Spectacle in Scotland*, commissioned by Articulation; recognises the report's evidence of the significant cultural, social and economic contribution made by outdoor arts, circus and spectacle to communities across Scotland, including their uniquely accessible, participatory and place-based nature; notes that the report highlights the role of these artforms in widening cultural engagement, strengthening community cohesion, supporting health and wellbeing, contributing to placemaking and enhancing Scotland's international cultural reputation; further notes the structural and systemic barriers identified in the report, including limited artform recognition, inconsistent funding pathways, gaps in infrastructure, training and safe working spaces, and a lack of visibility within national cultural policy; acknowledges the report's call for outdoor arts, circus and spectacle to be formally recognised as distinct artforms and as part of Scotland's intangible cultural heritage; welcomes the recommendation for the development of a dedicated national strategy for outdoor arts, circus and spectacle, and calls on the Scottish

Government, Creative Scotland, local authorities and other relevant bodies to work collaboratively with the sector to ensure appropriate recognition, sustainable funding, safe infrastructure and strategic support, so that these artforms can flourish and continue to benefit communities across Scotland.

***[S6M-20359](#) Foysol Choudhury: Tale of Tawaifs Launched at the Parliament**—That the Parliament congratulates Chandra Chakraborty on the launch of her book, *Tale of Tawaifs*, at the Parliament on 18 December 2025; understands that the tawaifs were women who performed at the courts of the Indian nobility; notes that the book seeks to repair the reputation and historical understanding of tawaifs by documenting their significant contribution to Indian art; acknowledges that the book is the product of significant research, including extensive fieldwork, analysis of oral histories and archival material, and use of musicological study; recognises that historians such as Ms Chakraborty, play an important role in shaping people's understanding of each other in the present day; commends Ms Chakraborty for her dedication to restoring the tawaifs to their rightful place, and wishes her every success in the future.

***[S6M-20358](#) Finlay Carson: Dumfries's People Project, Community Clean-up of the A75 at The Glen**—That the Parliament congratulates members of Dumfries's People Project on their exceptional community effort in collecting no fewer than 65 sacks of rubbish from the roadside verges of the A75 at the stretch known locally as "The Glen"; acknowledges the pride and dedication shown by volunteers in tackling roadside litter that blights local landscapes, harms wildlife, blocks drains and watercourses, and detracts from the visitor experience on one of the region's key trunk routes; notes with concern the ongoing scale of littering from vehicles and the costs borne by taxpayers and local authorities to address it; recognises the significant safety risks faced by volunteers and operatives working adjacent to high-speed traffic, including limited refuge space, poor sightlines, and variable weather conditions; commends the group's collaboration with relevant authorities to conduct the clean-up safely; thanks all involved for their civic leadership, and calls on Transport Scotland, local authorities, Police Scotland and roadside operators to enhance deterrence and enforcement against littering, improve signage and driver education, schedule verge maintenance to minimise hazards, and provide clear, safe protocols for any permitted community clean-ups, so that communities are not left to shoulder this burden alone.
