***[S7M-00130](#) Fulton MacGregor: Awareness and Support for People Affected by PANS and PANDAS**—That the Parliament recognises that Paediatric Acute-onset Neuropsychiatric Syndrome (PANS) and Paediatric Autoimmune Neuropsychiatric Disorders Associated with Streptococcal Infections (PANDAS) are rare, but potentially severe, conditions that can result in the sudden onset of significant neuropsychiatric symptoms, including obsessive compulsive disorder, anxiety, tics and behavioural change; acknowledges the considerable impact that these conditions can have on children, young people, adults and their families; notes concerns about the limited awareness and understanding of PANS and PANDAS across health, education and social care in Scotland; recognises the establishment and work of PANS+ Scotland in supporting affected families and raising awareness of them, and notes calls for the Scottish Government, NHS Scotland and all other relevant public bodies to engage with PANS+ Scotland and other stakeholders to improve awareness, understanding and support for those affected by PANS and PANDAS in Coatbridge and Chryston and across Scotland.

***[S7M-00155](#) Gillian Mackay: Anniversary of Single-Use Vapes Ban**—That the Parliament joins environmental and health campaigners in marking the first anniversary of the Environment Protection (Single-Use Vapes) (Scotland) Regulations 2024, which came into force on 1 June 2025, and was a crucial step towards addressing significant environmental and public health challenges posed by

disposable vapes; welcomes that a decrease in littered vapes has been recorded since the ban on the sale and supply of single-use vapes was introduced; recognises the urgent need for improved reporting by businesses on the number of vapes that are returned for recycling and the reintroduction of more frequent publishing of robust data regarding children's use of vapes to assess the extent to which the ban is helping to tackle youth vaping; appreciates continuing challenges regarding the safe disposal of vapes, improving recycling, the recovery of critical materials and eradicating harmful smoking-related litter, and supports calls from Keep Scotland Beautiful, Laura Anderson (née Young), ASH Scotland and Marine Conservation Society for further actions to improve producer responsibility measures, implement stronger recycling enforcement and efforts to reduce smoking-related litter, in particular cigarette filters, which confer no health benefit, discourage quit smoking attempts and are one of the most commonly discarded items in Scotland's streets, green spaces and coastlines.

***[S7M-00154](#) David Barratt: Congratulating Inverkeithing High School on 100% Positive Destinations for School Leavers in 2024-25**—That the Parliament congratulates Inverkeithing High School on achieving 100% positive destinations for school-leavers in the 2024-25 academic year; understands that Inverkeithing High School is the first and only school in Fife to achieve this significant benchmark, and is also number one nationally; notes that positive destinations refer to pupils who leave school in S4-6 and go on to either learning, employment or training; also congratulates Beath High School, which achieved 96.3% positive destinations, and Lochgelly High School, which achieved 98.3%, both having outperformed their virtual comparators, and pays credit to the staff and pupils of all three secondary schools in the Cowdenbeath constituency for their demonstrable efforts in achieving such significant positive destination results.

(a) under Rule 17.2.1(b) to suspend and vary standing orders as follows for the purpose of plenary debates and Decision Time—

(i) in Rule 2.2.3, for "09:15 and 17:30 on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday" substitute "09:15 and 18:00 on Tuesday and Wednesday, 09:15 and 17.30 on Thursday";

(ii) in Rule 2.2.5, for paragraphs (a) and (b) substitute:

"(a) 17:30 on Monday or Thursday;

(b) 18:00 on Tuesday;

(ba) 18:00 on Wednesday where the Parliament has not taken a decision under paragraph 4;"

(iii) in Rule 11.2.2, for "17:00" substitute "such time between 17:00 and 18:00 as the Presiding Officer may specify";

(b) under Rule 17.2.1(b) to suspend and vary standing orders as follows for the purpose of Oral Question Times—

(i) for Rule 13.3.2 substitute:

“2. Questions (other than First Minister’s Questions) shall be in writing and lodged with the Clerk.”

(ii) after Rule 13.3.3, insert:

“3A. Paragraph 3 (other than sub-paragraph (d)) applies to a First Minister’s Question as it applies to a question lodged under paragraph 2.”

(iii) in Rule 13.3.4, delete “at First Minister’s Question Time (“a First Minister’s Question”),”; and

(iv) for Rule 13.6, substitute:

“Rule 13.6 First Minister’s Questions

1. The Presiding Officer may call any of the following members to ask a question or questions during First Minister’s Question Time:

(a) the leader of a political party represented by 5 or more members of the Parliament, or a representative of that leader (“a party leader”);

(b) a representative of any group formed in accordance with Rule 5.2.2 (“a group representative”);

(c) a member who is not a member of the Scottish Government or junior Scottish Minister and who is not a party leader or group representative (“a backbencher”).

2. At the first First Minister’s Question Time in each week, the Presiding Officer shall normally call only backbenchers to ask questions, and at the second such Question Time in each week, the Presiding Officer shall normally call only party leaders or group representatives to ask questions.

3. The requirements of these Rules, so far as they relate to questions being in writing and so far as they provide for lodging requirements, do not apply to First Minister’s Questions.”

(v) in Rule 13.6A, insert after paragraph 3:

“3A. After members have been notified that they have been selected and before the deadline for lodging questions under paragraph 4, members whose names are included in those selections may arrange with other such members to swap places and notify the Clerk accordingly. The Clerk shall ensure that information about any such swaps is published alongside the information notified to members under paragraph 5.”

(vi) Rule 13.6B is suspended.

(vii) for Rule 13.7.A1, substitute:

“A1. First Minister’s Question Time shall be a period of up to 30 minutes, normally each Tuesday, and another period of up to 30 minutes, normally each Thursday. General

Question Time shall be a period of up to 25 minutes, normally each Tuesday, and another period of up to 30 minutes, normally each Thursday. Portfolio Question Time shall be a period of up to 60 minutes, normally each Wednesday.”

(viii) in Rule 13.7.1, for the words “selected for answer” substitute “asked”

(ix) in Rule 13.7.9 paragraph (a) is suspended.

(c) that the suspensions and variations of Rules set out in paragraphs (a) and (b) of this motion shall have effect from 29 May 2026 and remain in effect until 31 January 2027 or such earlier date as the Parliament may decide, on a motion by the committee established under Rule 6.4.

(a) in paragraph A1, the words “may be lodged in writing in advance, or” are suspended, and for the word “1” there is substituted the word “3”;

(b) in Rule 13.6, paragraphs 1 and 2 are suspended;
