***[S7M-01346](#) Martyn Day: Wild Animals Kept as Exotic Pets**—That the Parliament notes reported concerns regarding the welfare of wild animals kept as exotic pets in the Falkirk East and Linlithgow constituency and across Scotland; recognises that some species have complex welfare needs that can make them unsuitable to be kept in a domestic environment; notes the recommendation made in 2022 by the Scottish Animal Welfare Commission's Exotic Pet Working Group that a single list of species of animal that may legally be kept as pets should be compiled; understands that such a permitted-list approach would seek to ensure that species are assessed on the basis of animal welfare and other relevant considerations, and notes the calls on the Scottish Government to consider the introduction of such an evidence-based single permitted list.

Other new and altered motions and amendments

***[S7M-01349](#) Ariane Burgess: Celebrating Impact of ScottishPower Funding on Highlands and Islands Women's Football**—That the Parliament congratulates Clachnacuddin Women, Fort William Women, Shetland Women and Sutherland Women on being each awarded £1,000 through ScottishPower's annual funding competition, which was created to provide essential support for grassroots women's and girls' football across the Highlands and Islands region; understands that the funding will enable investment in facilities, equipment and travel to support the continued growth of the game; recognises that the initiative forms part of ScottishPower's support for the Highlands and Islands League, for which it became the first ever title sponsor through its partnership with Scottish Women's Football; notes that funding provided for these teams has brought the total number of grants awarded through the ScottishPower programme to 15 since 2023, helping clubs overcome unique challenges faced by teams across the region; understands that Clachnacuddin Women FC will use the funding to upgrade strength and conditioning equipment, that Fort William Women's FC and Shetland Women will put the funding towards travel costs, while Sutherland Women Football Club's award will go towards installing new dugout facilities at Golspie; congratulates these women's teams on securing funding, and wishes them continued success in the seasons ahead.

***[S7M-01348](#) Patricia Gibson: Megan's Space Named Scottish Charity of the Year 2026**—That the Parliament congratulates Megan's Space on securing the accolade of Charity of the Year in the £100k to £500k turnover category at the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO) Scottish Charity Awards 2026; applauds the tireless work and commitment of the trustees, volunteers, practitioners and supporters in working to prevent the needless loss of young lives to suicide and

reduce self-harm while promoting mental wellbeing for children and young people across Ayrshire; acknowledges the essential support, advocacy and therapeutic services that the charity provides to young people who are unable to access the help that they need through traditional routes, with more than 900 young people supported through counselling sessions in 2025 alone; recognises that the charity was established in 2019 following the death by suicide of Megan Copeland, a 20-year-old student mental health nurse who had struggled for seven years with mental and hormonal dysfunction; notes that, as well as offering support for classic anxiety, low mood and trauma, Megan's Space is developing expertise in areas such as personality disorder and premenstrual dysphoric disorder; further notes the charity's extensive outreach work with local schools, including a school counselling service, exam anxiety workshops and Primary 7 transition workshops, and appreciates that, from its small beginnings as a family's response to tragedy, Megan's Space is maturing into a robust, medium-sized charity, recognised and respected as a local organisation that is delivering on its promise to help save lives and improve the mental wellbeing of young people across the county of Ayrshire.

***[S7M-01344](#) Alexander Burnett: 2026 Great Scottish Squirrel Survey**—That the Parliament recognises the contribution of the 2026 Great Scottish Squirrel Survey, organised by the Scottish Wildlife Trust's Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels (SSRS) project, in encouraging people across Scotland to record sightings of red and grey squirrels; understands that the survey helps to build a national picture of squirrel distribution and population trends; notes that the information gathered through the survey supports efforts to conserve Scotland's native red squirrel population and informs action to address the impacts of invasive non-native grey squirrels; acknowledges the valuable contribution made by volunteers, local communities, land managers and conservation organisations in collecting and using this data; notes the innovative work being undertaken by SSRS, including the use of trained scent detection dogs to support squirrel monitoring and management; recognises that the eradication programme in Aberdeen will be the world's first urban mainland eradication of grey squirrels when completed, and commends all those involved in helping to safeguard Scotland's red squirrel population for future generations. **R**

[*S7M-01341](#) Kate Nevens: Solidarity with Staff and Students at the University of Edinburgh—That the Parliament stands in solidarity with members of the University and College Union (UCU) Scotland at the University of Edinburgh following its announcement of five weeks of strike action from 28 September 2026; understands that this action relates to the university management's announcement of £140 million of cuts and an estimated 1,800 job losses in early 2025; notes reports that UCU general secretary, Jo Grady, has called the university's cuts "academic vandalism"; understands that the scale of staff cuts is the largest seen in Scottish higher education, despite the university confirming earlier in 2026 that it is not in financial deficit; condemns the university's decision to close 90 programmes in its College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences (CAHSS); notes with sadness the proposed closure of a number of courses within the school of education focused on inclusive education, such as the Postgraduate Diplomas in Inclusive Education for Deaf Learners and Visually Impaired Learners and expresses deep concern about the knock-on effects that this could have on access to education for disabled learners, and commends UCU members for campaigning on behalf of their colleagues and students, and for their efforts to avoid strike action.
